Why Are Some Fence Posted Painted Purple? If you come across one of them, beware!

In many remote and rural areas across America, you might find yourself running into a curious sight: a fence post painted purple. Though this may seem strange, but is probably not cause for concern in the minds of most passersby, even though it should be...

These purple fences are far from an aesthetic choice. People paint the tips of their fences and metal posts for a good reason-- because it serves as a warning to people who are unfamiliar with the property they've come across.

It turns out that property owners paint their fences purple when they want to tell people that there is "no trespassing" on a specific property---and it is the law in some states. This little-known law is being enforced by many state legislatures. It is done for convenience and cost effectiveness for those people who own large plots

of land. This important warning is much easier than posting a series of "no trespassing" signs all over their property, both in terms of expense and not having to have the signs made and installed.

Strangest of all, while this practice and warning may seem new to you, it is not new by any means. In fact, the law has been in effect for upward of 30 years! That's

why it is extremely important to pay attention to your surroundings if you find yourself in an unknown area. If you cross those lines, you're actually breaking the law and can be prosecuted the same as if were a No Trespassing sign.

If you're wondering why the color purple was chosen, the answer is pretty simple. According to Ashley Pellerin, an agent at the Prairie View A&M, she believes it was chosen, because there are a lot of people who are color blind, but most can see the color purple.

States with purple paint laws: Maine, Texas, Illinois, Missouri, North Carolina, Florida, Idaho, Arkansas, Montana, Arizona, and Kansas. So if you are out hunting or exploring a new area in one of these states, Beware of the Purple Post!

Temporary Closures Ordered for Public Safety

Due to recent rainfall and rapid snow melt, the **Head of Ditch Campground** has experienced flooding and road
damage and is temporary closed.

As of the printing of this publication, the temporary closure order for the **Catwalk National Recreation Area** remains in effect. The Whitewater Creek currently does not have a streamflow monitor, but the <u>USGS Current Conditions for Streamflow</u> is indicating that stream flow discharge rate is 30-40 cubic feet/second (CF/S) and the flow is normally below 5 CF/S. The water in this area is coming from the western slopes of the Mogollon range which has received quite a bit of snow this winter. In addition, the last crossing into the Catwalk's parking lot is in a streamflow channel, and the water brings down a lot of sand, gravel, and other forms of large debris.

Per the National Weather Service's NOAA website, "Each year, more deaths occur due to flooding than from any other thunderstorm related hazard. The Centers for Dis-

ease Control and Prevention report that over half of all flood-related drownings occur when a vehicle is driven into hazardous flood water. The next highest percentage of flood-related deaths is due to walking into or near flood waters.

People underestimate the force and power of water. Many of the deaths occur in automobiles as they are swept downstream. Of these drownings, many are preventable, but too many people continue to drive around the barriers that warn you the road is flooded. A mere 6 inches of fast-moving flood water can knock over an adult. It takes just 12 inches of rushing water to carry away a small car, while 2 feet of rushing water can carry away most vehicles.

It is NEVER safe to drive or walk into flood waters." Please "Turn Around Don't Drown"!

Then the market moved a few miles up Highway 35 to another rented place, offering more fresh produce and dry goods. At that time, ground was broken for a new building in front of the Casas Adobes subdivision. Five years ago, the Market opened at its current location: 2739 Highway 35. A wide assortment of dry goods, fresh produce, teas and coffee, breads, dairy, frozen meat and fish, spices, bulk items, pet foods and much more can be found at the market three days a week: Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday from 11:00 am until 6:00 pm.

The mission of Valle Mimbres Market is to bring good food to the valley, while following its three principles: 1] Quality, 2] Integrity and 3] Community.

- 1] The products offered must be of the best grade available both locally or from responsible wholesalers. All the food, fresh, refrigerated, frozen or packaged is free of GMO [Genetically Modified Organisms], and most of it is organic.
- 2] The market follows strong moral principles, never buying from companies who do not respect their employees or our planet, do not support organic standards, and/or have misrepresented their products.
- 3] The market also follows many of the cooperative principles. 

Raising Gila Trout at San Lorenzo Elementary

Stop by San Lorenzo Elementary School and take a look at the



Gila Trout the students and staff are raising. What beautiful fish! For the third year in a row, the kids are learning about the habitat of the trout and

how to take care of them. The plan is to watch the fish grow, until May, then release the fish in Sapillo Creek.

The trout arrived at the school a few weeks ago. This project, *Native Fish in the Classroom,* is a cooperative effort between the school, U.S. Fish and Wildlife, and the Gila National Forest

to provide hands-on educational opportunities for the students and teachers. Raising a species "threatened" in the wild is a great way to learn the science of ecosystems and habitat. The teachers are incorporating the fish-raising experience into the school curriculum and the students learn about data collection and record keeping. Students also learn all kinds of information about fish and other wildlife while practicing writing and math skills and expanding their vocabulary.

Students observe the trout, write about their observations, test the water and record data about the water temperature and chemical balance. Gila National Forest Fish Biologist Justin Myers teaches the kids about weighing the fish and how to determine how much food to feed them.

"The hard part this year", says Mr. Koury, was seeing the disappointment on the faces of the little kids, the 3-4 year olds and kindergarteners, as they walked by the fish tank each morning and asked, "When is our fish coming?" The tank was set up, Ms. Carpenter, the librarian, had created a background border using colorful Mimbres fish painted by the kids; the bulletin board was filled with info about the trout. All was ready. But where were the fish? The government shutdown caused a delay in getting the fish delivered from the hatchery in Mora. And only five fish finally arrived. One of those jumped out of the tank one night and, sadly, expired. The four remaining fish are growing, fed and cared for daily, and, in May, the students will watch as the trout find a home in the wild.

ROUNDUP LODGE NOTES

You may have noticed that the old Roundup Lodge is slowly looking better all the time. Much of the work has been going on behind the scenes, but some of it is readily visible. Over the past few months, thanks largely to member, Barry Gray, we have a new, sealed roof, a new handicapped ramp, and most of the inside and outside cracks have been filled.

Other, less readily visible upgrades and repairs include the needed upgrade to the septic system – which is still in progress.

Many planned improvements must be prepared for before they can be accomplished. The Boosters have been allocating as much money as possible from fundraising activities over the past 7 or 8 years and are finally ready to accomplish some of the previously unaffordable upgrades.

The most badly-needed up-grade is the electrical system. That is a major project, involving replacement of the current 70 amp (inadequate) service going into the building. This is a complete upgrade, involving a new utility pole, transformer and installation. This project is already in the works, but like most such similar undertakings, it has been fraught with details – usually something that has to be changed or redesigned. But we are gaining on it and look forward to the day we can tell PNM to go full steam ahead. We are ready.

After that, upgraded electrical wiring inside the building will be required. Part of the new electrical plan concerns heating and air conditioning.

It is well known that winter meetings and gatherings at the Lodge suffer from noisy and ineffectual heating. In summer, air conditioning simply does not exist. Plans are in the works for the best heat and air conditioning systems we can find for a building such as the Lodge. Once the electrical work is done, it will be heat and air conditioning. We hope there will be money left for a new hot water system, too!

For the past few years, the Lodge has been used more often than ever before. That is a positive thing, but it also means that operating costs (such as heat and electricity) have risen, along with more work for the Boosters keeping the place clean. The volunteers are consistently there when needed to keep things moving smoothly. Nothing would happen without them.

The community is fortunate to have a facility such as the Lodge for gatherings, meetings, and other events. The community is generous in supporting the Lodge. We are grateful for the support of the community and those who enjoy the use of the Lodge. It is just going to keep getting better!

On March 23rd, the Dave Morgan Bank from Buckhorn provided music for an evening of fun and dancing at the Roundup Lodge. Booster club members are planning more live music and dances—just like the good old days, but with a modern flare! Watch for future dances at the Lodge.



Conejo Mimbreño Visits Petroglyph National Monument

Created in June 1990, Petroglyph National Monument, known for its cultural and natural resources, preserves over

seventeen square miles along Albuquerque's West Mesa for the benefit and enjoyment of present and future generations.

The monument Includes five volcanic cones and 24,000 images carved by Ancestral Puebloan Indians and early Spanish settlers. The petroglyphs were made over a span of thousands of years first





by hunters and gatherers, and later by Pueblo people. Some historic petroglyphs are thought to have been made by Spanish sheep herders. Present-day Pueblo Indians still use the area for religious purposes.


