If you read last month's *Messenger*, we relayed a short story about Mr. Acklin from the Acklin Hill Store that was given to us by Elsie Roman. We alluded to the fact that there would be more to come from Elsie in this month's issue.

I don't know this for a fact, but would venture a guess, that Elsie is the oldest resident in the Mimbres Valley and San Lorenzo.

In April we learned that Elsie had just turned 100 years old, and we wanted to interview her for a story. She said that many people had asked her to write an autobiography, so knowing that she would do a much better job than we would, we decided to wait —here it is!

It is with great pleasure and humility that I write as requested by so many individuals.

I, Elsie Galaz Roman, was born to Manuel and Margarita Galaz on April 18, 1919, in the territorial home in San Lorenzo, New Mexico. I grew up in the Galaz Ranch bought by Grandpa Gorgonio in 1904 from Menard. My dad and five tenants ran the ranch and worked with crops and cattle.

The Galaz family, Castilian French, emigrated to Socorro, Texas and Mesilla, New Mexico. Great Grandfather Gregoreo and two men founded San Lorenzo, New Mexico in 1869. Grandpa Gorgorio grew up, ran a mercantile and

post office in San Lorenzo. He was called "the Frenchman" because of his brownish-red hair and light complexion. He was always armed because these were dangerous times.

At 14 years of age, my father enrolled and boarded me at St. Mary's Academy in Silver City, New Mexico until my graduation. My mentor and supervisor was St. M Borromeo. I was always overwhelmed by her wisdom and knowledge. I learned much about life from my peers, families, and faculty.

Working from 5 pm to 8 pm daily paid for tuition, dorm, etc., plus dad's help. The cleaning of the dining room, setting

tables and food was done according to regulations. Upon graduation as Valedictorian, I received a scholarship to Marymount College in Kansas City.

The 1930s were very difficult depression years. I attended Western New Mexico University and worked with professors to pay tuition.

Transportation to Silver City schools was done in an old small bus from the Acklin Store. Permission was given me to ride the bus and attend college. Bruce Leake and I walked two miles in freezing weather to ride the bus to school.

While at Western, I was tapped into the Cardinal Key women's Educational Fraternity by David Darling who was a member of the Cardinal Blue, men's Educa-

tional Fraternity. Upon completion of intense three years of teacher training classes, my requirements were met.

Mr. C.O. Prevost was Grant County Superintendent with offices in Grant County Court House in Silver City. He was an outstanding educator. He hired me and I started teaching at 18-19 years of age. Instantly, the most important subject for us was to teach speaking English.

The basics were taught with no state guidelines. Programs were implemented gradually throughout the years. The pledge was always said and America was sung.

I taught K-8th grades,, special education, bi-lingual, physical education and was one of the first women coaches in Cobre Schools. I earned a B.S. degree and a Masters in elementary education and became Principal after obtaining a Masters in Administration Degree. I taught in San Lorenzo, San Juan, Truth or Consequences, Las Cruces City Schools, and in Bayard. I was inducted into Hall of Fame Western New Mexico University in 1995.

Upon retirement, I volunteered at the Senior Center under Becky and at our church to help visit the sick. I also had my elderly mother for 35 years.

Life as an educator an historian has been blessed and filled with beautiful people and memories, especially in the education and welfare of all children.

I still do historical research and do daily routine work.



I meet Elsie 6 or 7 years ago. I remembered her as being very well-spoken and a very impressive 93 year old, although she didn't look her age. She was impeccably dressed, immaculately coiffured, and her nails brightly painted—just to come out to a rummage sale! Since then, I have had the pleasure of speaking at length with her on the phone. She is so delightful and knowledgeable, and a joy to speak with. If you ever have the pleasure of meeting her.

She obviously loves Mimbres, and loved being an educator and teaching her students, and her students' children and their children! This story does not accurately depict the way her students, the community and her friends feel about her. Mostly the comments revolve around

the fact that she is a great lady and everyone loves her as much as she loves them.

She credits her love of people to her father. She relayed a story to me that she remembered about her father when she was about eight or nine years old.

Across from the intersection in San Lorenzo, there were vacant houses that they used to call the Teal's houses. Sometimes they were occupied by transients traveling through. He father used to try and keep a watch on them. One cold winter evening there was a beat-up old car parked there and her father went to investigate. He found a family, after having driven through a harsh dessert storm, taking shelter for the evening but with no food or fire wood. Her father took care of that. Any stranger that needed food or fire wood he was always there to help.

Archaeologists Survey, Map, and Document a Site in the Forest

As in most summers, archaeologists used the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site as a base camp while working in the Mimbres. This June, archaeologists from the University of Nevada Las Vegas and volunteers from the Grant County Archaeological Society surveyed, mapped and recorded a site in the Gila National Forest. The site, located next to the highway, is a Mimbres Pueblo dating to about one thousand years ago

and has been badly damaged by looters over the years—even though it should be protected under the Antiquities Act of 1906 and several other more recent preservation acts.

Sadly, sites on public lands, and owned by all Americans, are still being damaged and artifacts are still being stolen. The stolen artifacts may be sold on E-Bay, or end up in some one's closet, or discarded and thrown in the trash. Some people think it's OK to steal artifacts from sites—places that are outdoor museums, unique and priceless

remains of past cultures, sites that all Americans should value and take care of. Each artifact is a puzzle piece, a clue to the past that can be used to interpret how long-ago people lived and what they made and used.





On the last day of the mapping project, the field crew learned firsthand how important it is to let the public know why all archaeological sites are important, valuable resources. Two men, a Mimbres resident and his visiting guest, walked up to the site, aware of the presence of the field crew, and began collecting—stealing—artifacts. When one of the archaeologists reminded the men that it is illegal to take artifacts from public lands, one of the men said something to the effect of,

"It's only illegal if you get caught." Posted on a tree, clearly in view, is a sign that says, "Enjoy but do not destroy your American Heritage."

The Mimbres Valley is the homeland of an ancient people whose pottery is world- renowned, recognized as one of the most

unique and sophisticated artforms found anywhere. Fortunately, most Mimbreños are proud of and val-

ue the history of our valley and want to preserve and protect our heritage for future generations to enjoy.

HOW THE STOCK MARKET HAS PERFORMED UNDER EACH PRESIDENT FOR THE LAST 100 YEARS

While the American economy is very complex and many factors are at work to create a healthy economy, the performance of the Dow Jones Industrial Average Stock Index (DJIA) is usually considered one of the most reliable indicators of economic health. The DJIA is the best-known stock market index and tracks the value of 30 publicly owned companies based in the U.S. that together represent all major American industries (except for transportation and utilities).

While the Dow's performance is not always directly linked to decisions made by the sitting President (obviously, there are many factors beyond a president's control), when it comes to the health of the economy, the buck often stops at the Commander in Chief's desk.

The 24/7 Wall Street Newsletter reviewed the change in the DJIA under every president since the end of World War I. Under some administrations, the Dow fell considerably and in others it more than tripled. This is what they found:

The Dow's performance was measured by calculating the percentage change of non-inflation adjusted month-end closing values from each president's first month in office to his last.

Archaeology Kid's Camp at MCHS

Six children, ages 8 to 12, from Mimbres, Silver City, and Tucson participated in an archaeology camp at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. The kids had dinner with archaeologists, camped overnight, and slept in tentsalongside the archaeology crew from the University of Nevada Las Vegas and the Grant County Archaeological Society. Each summer archaeologists use the old territorial houses as a base camp when working in the Mimbres, a tradition that started way back in 1929.


The first day of camp, the kids learned about the Mattocks Archaeological Site and the ancient Mimbres Indians that left behind the remains of their villages and their beautiful, world-renowned black and white pottery. The kids also listened to stories about the early homesteaders. Kathy Hill, the president of IFWEF, the volunteer organization that takes care of and manages the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site, showed the kids the replica 1800s doctor's office.


The camp kids found, flagged and learned to identify and sketch artifacts, and measured rock walls, all in preparation for a day of field experience at a site in the forest the next day where they joined archaeologists from UNLV and GCAS in a survey and mapping project at a Mimbres pueblo.

The archaeology camp ended with fun with humming-birds—Kathy Hill showed the kids how to use hand-held sugar-water feeders. The little birds hovered around the feeders, zipping around the heads and hands of the kids, some taking sips, while the holders kept as still as they could. What fun!

The camp kids received a certificate from the Grant County Archaeological Society, a MCHS t-shirt and hat, a water bottle, and more. They also left with a greater appreciation of the amazing and unique history of the Mimbres Valley. The camp was funded by a grant from the Grant County Community Foundation and the Grant County Archaeological Society. "Thanks" goes to all the MCHS and GCAS volunteers that helped and the UNLV Field Crew, and the kids!

The Mimbres Valley Farmers Market is held every Saturday morning from 10 a.m. to noon outside the Valle(y) Mimbres Market on Hwy 35. Stop by to sit on the picnic tables in their shady pavilion and chat with friends and neighbors.


