# MIMBRES MESSENGER

In 1978, the Airline Deregulation Act was passed and gave US airlines almost total freedom to determine which markets to serve and what fares to charge. In response to deregulation, the **Essential Air Service** (EAS) program was enacted to guarantee that small communities (like southern NM) which, before deregulation, were served by certificated airlines, maintained commercial service. Its aim is to maintain a minimal level of scheduled air service to communities that otherwise would not be profitable for any airline to service unless tickets were in the hundreds of dollars.

The Grant County airport is part of the EAS program. Airlines make proposals to the Department of Transportation (DOT) to provide this service and they are subsided by the DOT. Boutique Air was granted the contract in 2015 and has been the airline to service Grant County ever since.

The Grant County Commissioners recently voted to recommend to the DOT to replace **Boutique Air** with another air service, **Advanced Air**. The Commissioners cited cancelled and delayed flights; inadequate response for better service; and a smaller marketing budget than Advanced Air proposed, as their reason for the new carrier recommendation.

Apparently, on May 31<sup>st</sup>, both airlines gave presentations at the Grant County Convention Center. Everyone we have spoken with in the Mimbres was unaware that there were any presentations or recommendations regarding who would receive the EAS contract for Grant County. Therefore, we asked both airlines to comment on why they should be awarded the contract so our readership could make up their own minds and voice their opinion to the DOT. Both air services that have submitted proposals responded to our request for an article. They are printed below.



Zack then led the mule to Sapillo Creek, followed by the San Lorenzo kids. The trout were taken out of the panniers, one by one, with nets and released. Later in the day, Zack and Betty were stationed at Lake Roberts.





Zack answered questions about Betty and packing in the forest. Many of the kids noticed that Betty had "bells" on her tail - the hair having been cut in the shape of bells. Zack says the tradition of bells on tails began when mules were used in the army . ### Kids' Archaeology Camp at MCHS

Local kids joined archaeology field-school students from the University of Nevada Las Vegas for a 2-day overnight field school experience at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. On day one students learned about the Mattocks Ruin and the historic houses. They learned how to do a site survey, pin flag and document artifacts. They spent time in the "lab" with the archaeology lab director. They washed potsherds and lithics (stone tools and flakes). The kids hiked to the Mimbres River where they learned about the riparian ecosystem and the endangered species, the Chiricahua Leopard Frog and Chihuahua Chub, that live in the river. The students each had a field journal to record their experiences. That night, after eating dinner with the field crew and playing chase with the dog Duke, the kids slept in tents just like the university students. The next morning begin by planting the "Three Sisters" garden -corn, beans, and squash. Then, out on the Mattocks Ruin, everyone took part in a site survey. Next, it was off to join the field school students at the "dig". At the Elk Ridge Site, the kids worked alongside archaeologists and volunteers from the Grant County Archaeological Society, screening dirt and searching for artifacts; they learned about how artifacts are discovered and preserved for analyses and future research. They listened as Dr. Jon Carroll showed them a drone and explained how drones are used to map archaeological sites.

Back at MCHS, the archaeology camp kids painted an "archaeology mural" using their field journals and their newly-gained knowledge for inspiration. The mural will be displayed at the 2019 Annual State Meeting of the Archaeological Society of New Mexico in Silver City. When parents arrived to take them home the students received a certificate of accomplishment from the Grant County Archaeological Society. Hopefully, these students will become "archaeology ambassadors" and teach others about stewardship and the importance of preserving the past. The Kid's camp was funded by a grant from the Grant County Community Foundation and the Grant County Archaeological Society.



# Duke the Mimbres Dog Finds a Home in Vegas

For about six weeks this summer an archaeology field school, archaeologists and students from the University of Las Vegas Nevada (UNLV), stayed at the Mimbres Culture Heritage site (MCHS) while they were working on a project in the valley. Often times in the evening, at dinner time, a charming little dog would show up and mingle with the archaeologists, getting fed tidbits of hamburger, or whatever the cook fixed for the crew. They called the dog "Gooch", named after Ben Gooch, a homesteader at MCHS in the late 1880s. The dog seemed to respond to the name. One of the archaeologists gave the dog a bath, sending him home smelling of *Head and Shoulders* shampoo. During the Kid's Archaeology Camp, the younger students spent a fun evening playing ball and chase with the friendly, energetic dog. Everyone became attached to "Gooch". Then, one day, the dog appeared with a note taped to his harness. The note said, "My name is Duke. I like to roam." The owner's name and phone number were on the note.

The archaeologists called Duke-Gooch's owner, concerned that when they left, the field season was ending, the dog would no longer have his new friends to visit, and might miss his handouts. As it turned out, the owner could not keep the dog home, and he worried that when he had to leave Mimbres for a few days at a time due to health reasons the dog would find his owner gone when the dog returned from roaming. His owner loved the dog but decided another home might be better for Duke.





So, one of the UNLV students took Duke with her to Vegas where he now lives with his new friends, including a five-year-old girl who gives Duke all the hugs an love he needs.

### WATCH OUT FOR CAMELS!.....

.....plodding their way to Sharon Simpson's backyard oasis in Casas Adobes. While there are no towering palm trees there yet, almost everything that grows in and out of the ground, is. No ground soil supports this collection of familiar and lesser known plant varieties, all of which are growing in plastic tubs, buckets, and raised beds.

The decision to try container gardening was not difficult after some attempts to dig in the colorful but challenging native soil, a proven winner historically for producing pottery but with limited good results for filling those pots with tender food varieties.

Having experienced a couple of seasons of the unique weather patterns in the Mimbres Valley, another decision to offer reliable protection for young plants was accomplished with the construction of a 6' high wooden fence which enclosed 720 sq. ft. of space. In the center, an 8'x12' greenhouse was erected and a 10'x10' yellow fabric dome which affords gardener R&R (rest and review). Along the perimeter of the fence is a candy stripe of 50+ buckets and tubs holding flowering plants and vines. No empty space remains with the addition of two, 4'x4' raised beds where tomatoes, carrots, potatoes (white and purple), green beans, okra, green chile and strawberries thrive. Watering the entire collection is easily accomplished by hand with a 75' hose connected to a frost-free faucet adjacent to the fence.







This glowing and growing collection is nourished by a supplemental mix of earthworm castings, bat guano, and vermiculite all of which is sparsely replenished at the beginning of the season. First steps in container gardening are preparing for drainage, accomplished by drilling a few holes in the container bottom to prevent the soil from escaping. Sharon installs a segment of blue air-conditioner filter mat material, porous enough to let water out while keeping the rest intact. Good quality potting soil is essential. Spend more on soil than on pots or plants.

Once preliminary work is done, then 'water and watch' become the foremost activities. Old favorites surface again and new seeds are planted for 'wonderment' watching. Cleome, nigella, datura, ornamental "pumpkin-on-a-stick", castor bean, are a few of the heirloom varieties she buys form a mail-order source; R.H. Shumway. A rainbow of colors appear at various times, weeding is non-existent, picking blooms for indoor enjoyment is ongoing.





### Grant County Archaeological Society Celebrates Its 90<sup>th</sup> Birthday

The Grant County Archaeological Society (GCAS) had a "birthday party" at the Society's monthly meeting held at the Roundup Lodge in July. GCAS is celebrating 90 years as an organization whose members are dedicated to learning more about the prehistory of southwest New Mexico and sharing what they know with others.

GCAS was formed in 1928 by the many people interested in the incredible and unique archaeology in and around Grant County. In 1938 the Society incorporated as a non-profit. Over the decades, GCAS helped protect and preserve the Gila Cliff Dwellings and helped obtain the Eisele Pottery Collection now housed at the WNMU Museum. GCAS participated in projects like recording rock art at

the Dragonfly Petroglyphs and removing paint from vandalized petroglyphs at a site in the lower Mimbres. GCAS members work with universities, museums, and agencies such as the Forest Service on excavations, archaeological surveys, and preservation education programs.

GCAS, in partnership with the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site, has a research library and archives room, gives tours of the Mattocks Ruin, and provides education to school groups.

In May 2019, GCAS will host the Archaeological Society of New Mexico's annual conference, bringing over a hundred affiliated society members to Silver City. Many conference attendees will come out to Mimbres for a tour at MCHS.

The Mimbres River begins in the high country of the Gila  $\underline{\mathbf{W}}$  ilderness, once home to the Mimbres and Apache Indians. The Mimbres Indians lived in southwest New Mexico about  $\underline{\mathbf{o}}$  ne thousand years ago and made beautiful pottery. The Apache were living in the Gila country when the first Spaniards came to New Mexico in the 1500s.

In 1924, a forester named Aldo <u>L</u>eopold convinced the Forest service to set aside an area within the Gila National Forest as wilderness, preserving the land and animals for future generations to

enjoy. Black bear, mountain <u>l</u>ion, wolves, coyotes, deer, elk, turkey, and many other animals live in the wilderness. The Mimbres River flows d<u>o</u>wn from the mountains, bringing life -giving <u>w</u>ater to the valley below.
