

The December Challenge

The holiday season can be one of the happiest times of the year. It can also be one of the most difficult times of the year for many people. The pressure of planning, shopping, and making the holiday meals; decorating, going to or hosting parties, and then there is the proverbial shopping. Some love it, some dread it. Whether you are the person who loves the holidays and thrives on all the activities, or you are one of the people, for whatever reason, who suffer from depression during the holiday season, the December Challenge will help you.

The Challenge is: every day during the month of December, do one small random act of kindness for someone, whether it is a relative, friend, stranger, or volunteer organization. You may think that this is just something else to add to the stress of the season, but it doesn't work that way. Once you start, you will find that it will not only will make you feel good (and lower your stress), it will surprise and delight and make someone else very happy.

We aren't talking anything big here. Just pick things that will make someone else feel good and whatever your personal time and/or money will allow. You don't have to spend any money at all, and this would probably make for the best challenge of all!

For many of you, you probably already do many things without thinking about it being a small act of kindness. If you are out and about and see someone struggling with their grocery bags, you just naturally offer to help.

These are just a few other ideas that come to mind.

- Thank the UPS or FEDEX driver by surprising them with homemade cookies or sweets.
- If you have parents, grandparents or greatgrandparents that don't reside in the area and you don't see or communicate with them as often as you

should, write them a letter and mail it. Don't e-mail it, trust me it is not the same (although it is better than nothing). A letter or note in hand is something they will cherish. Or, you could also call them, they would love to hear your voice, but a letter is something they can save.

- Clip some coupons and tape them next to the product in the store for someone who can use them (like diapers or laundry detergent, which are very expensive).
- Find out where they serve meals for the homeless or people in need and volunteer to help prepare or serve the Christmas meal.
- If you have an elderly neighbor who lives alone or doesn't eat as well as he or she should, make a meal for them. This doesn't have to be something special you have cooked, just cook a little extra of the meal you are making for your family and make a plate for them. Better yet, just invite them to share the meal at your house.
- Pick a small community project you can volunteer to do. Such as, picking up trash along a stretch of road that you have noticed needs attention. You don't have to notify anyone, just go do it.
- Bake a homemade pie or some cookies and give them to someone special in your life or someone who can't make them for themselves.
- Offer to baby sit for a single parent who could really use an afternoon or evening off. Or offer to baby sit for a couple who could use a date night.
- Write an article for the *Messenger!*
- Go visit a friend or relative who is in a nursing home. Even people you don't know love to talk to strangers who come to visit.
- Read a book to a younger sibling.
- Offer to help do a little yard work for an elderly

neighbor who can't clean up around his or her property by themselves.

- Play a game with a child.
- Write a Thank You note to someone you don't say "thank you" to often enough—your teacher, your yoga instructor, your parents or anyone who has helped you.

If you have a little money to spend, consider these things.

- Next time you are filling up your gas tank at the service station and you see someone who looks in need, or is only asking for \$5 worth of gas, offer to fill his or her tank.
- Purchase a warm winter coat and donate it to one of the many coat drives that are available. Include a knitted hat and gloves in the pockets.
- If you know a family that needs help with their food, put together a basket of food and leave it on their doorstep (they don't have to know where it came from).
- If you are a regular at a restaurant and eat there frequently, give the waiter or waitress a couple of extra \$ to remind them that you appreciate their service.
- Buy a bouquet of flowers for your spouse or friend, just because.
- Next time you are in line at a drive-up window, offer to pay for the persons lunch in line behind you.

I am sure you can think of a lot of acts of kindness it would be fun to perform. What would you like to have someone do for you?

Getting a friend to buddy up with you (and maybe even perform some kindness together) might help motivate you to take The Challenge. Or, maybe keep a written log of the small kindness you perform each day. By the end of the month you will find this probably isn't even necessary.

Once in a while something unexpected happens to cause laughter and smiles and brings people together. It happened to me at the dollar store. The holiday season can be stressful. We get impatient, irritated at fellow shoppers, frustrated by long lines. But now I smile at the thought of standing in line.

Like other Mimbreños, I avoid "going to town" and wait until I have a long list and need necessities, like bananas, before I drive to Silver City. Recently my list included a stop at the Dollar Store—for one item, just a quick in and out. Or so I thought. I quickly found what I wanted and hurried to the checkout. Oh, No!! The one person in line, at the one open checkout counter, had a shopping cart overflowing with items, and a pile of items already on the counter. "But,' I thought, "What the heck?" I wasn't in a great hurry, and I did not want to come back, so I stayed in line. Soon two young women queued up behind up. More people got in line. In a couple of minutes, the line stretched way down the aisle. Word spread, customer to customer, about the hold-up. Grumbles and groans could be heard. The women caus-

San Lorenzo Resident, Chris DeBolt, Receives National Rural Health Award

The National Organization of State Offices of Rural Health sets aside the third Thursday of every November – **November 21, 201**9 – to celebrate National Rural Health Day. National Rural Health Day honors the spirit of rural America while bringing to light the unique health challenges that rural citizens and their health providers face. Rural communities are wonderful places to live and work, which is why nearly 60 million people – one in five Americans – call them home.

The National Center for Frontier Communities has named Chris DeBolt of San Lorenzo as its 2019 "Frontier Health Star" for her work bettering the health and welfare of her neighbors in a rural area of America.

Chris has lived in San Lorenzo for more than 12 years. She has been an advocate for her neighbors' health and wellness by bringing services to the small community that it might not be able to access otherwise.

San Lorenzo is a small censusdesignated Far and Remote Level 4 area, which means it is an hour or more travel time from urbanized areas - 50,000 or more population and 45 minutes or more from Urban Clusters - 25,000-49,000 population.

One of Chris's major successes is running and organizing the annual Health Fair that is in partnership with the

Mimbres Valley Harvest Festival and is sponsored by the Mimbres Valley Health Action League. The Health Fair is always a huge success and welcomed and needed by the community. Many people depend on the Health Fair as their annual health exam. Often people are referred for problems they didn't even realize they had, which could be life threatening. The Health Fair offers a variety of health checks and exams for such things as blood pressure check, skin cancer exams, and many other vital exams all free to residents.

This September, the Health Fair serviced more than 400 people. 275 flu shots were administered. Many health

care providers and support personnel are there to offer literature and point clients in the right direction to receive services they might not otherwise know about.

Chris also serves on the Western New Mexico University's School of Nursing Advisory committee as well as the Grant County Extension Office Service Advisory Board as a voice for frontier residents' needs.

The National Center for Frontier Communities Executive Director, Susan Wilger, has this to say, "Chris loves living in the Land of Enchantment and is dedicated to promoting the well being of her community and New Mexicans. Her wisdom, compassion and commitment have benefited countless individual, organizations and initiatives."







Bug of the Month

By "The Bugman"

This is a new column that will focus on insects and their close relatives that are found in southwestern New Mexico.

The first bug of the month is the red harvester ant, an insect commonly found throughout the Valley. The name harvester ant refers to their foraging behavior - they collect seeds and carry them back to their nests.



Although harvester ants are only about 3/8" long, they can carry as much as 50 times their body weight. If people were equally strong, a 200-pound man could carry 10,000 pounds, the weight of 3 average-sized cars!

The nests of harvester ants are easily spotted by the absence of vegetation around the entrance, leaving a large clearing up to 30 feet in diameter. Some nesting sites are so large they can be seen in Google Earth! It is thought that the area around the nest is cleared in order to decrease shading, and therefore increase solar heating of the colony. Nests are up to 20 feet deep, consisting of a maze of underground tunnels and chambers, where seeds are stored for future dining pleasure.

Harvester ants are social insects, meaning that they care cooperatively for their young and have a division of labor with reproductive and non-reproductive groups. During most of the year, all individuals in a colony are female, but only one, the queen, produces eggs. The queen is the mother of all the other ants in the colony, which can include more than 10,000 individuals! After a colony is about 5 years old, the queen will produce winged males and females once a year, which fly out of the nest and mate. After the females are mated, they

Beware around harvester ants! They will both bite and sting to defend their nests. When stinging, they inject one of the most poisonous of all insect venoms, with a toxicity nearly 8 times greater than that of a western diamondback rattlesnake. However, they are reluctant to sting, and when they do, inject very little venom. Their stings are painful and may hurt for several hours, but are typically not life threatening except in extremely sensitive individuals. Interestingly, horned lizards (a.k.a. horny toads), which love to feast on harvester ants, are completely immune to the ants' venom!

Now, when I stand in line, I can't but help think of the time I became, just for a few minutes, one of the Dollar Store People.








San Lorenzo School Honors Our Veterans


