Christmas Traditions Around the World

United States of America

We are all pretty familiar with the many and diverse traditions in the US. Although a religious holiday, the US courts have upheld that Christmas is a legal federal holiday. The mainstays of traditions in America are Christmas parades, Tchaikovsky's *Nutcracker* ballet, tree trimming, shopping and gift giving, Christmas cards, Midnight Mass, Santa Claus, manger scenes, poinsettia plants and mistletoe, Christmas lights and decorations, just to name a few.

The different climates of the US and individual family traditions usually dictate how Americans celebrate Christmas. Many parts of the US have some unique traditions of their own. It is a long-standing tradition for Southerners to leave an orange in their children's stocking. In the South, they love anything fried, and their turkey is no exception. This deep-

fried turkey tradition seems to be spreading to other parts of the US as well!

In Alaska, there is a tradition called "Carrying the Star". Young and old carry elaborately decorated wheels about the size of umbrellas with an eight point star decorated with an angel or nativity scene in the middle. They are carried for three nights from January 7th over icy snow-topped roads. The stars represent the angels who announced the birth of Christ. Families lovingly maintain the stars. Some are more than a hundred years old! Since Christmas in Alaska is almost inevitably white, ice skating and building snowmen are traditional activities. ¹

Antarctica

There is no permanent population in Antarctica, It is a continent, not a country. Antarctica is far too hostile for humans to live all year around. There are however research facilities and similar structures in the Antarctic, which are operated by people (mainly scientists) from all over the

world. So they all celebrate the traditional celebrations of their country of origin. ²

Since it is summer in Antarctica this region enjoys 24 hours of daylight on Christmas Day. Christmas in Antarctica is mainly celebrated by people working in the various research centers. They do what they do every day but with decorations and presents!

At McMurdo Station, the largest on the continent with

about 1,200 people, they have to sign up ahead of time for the Christmas dinner celebration. Imagine that, having to make reservations for a Christmas buffet. Celebration activities include singing Christmas carols, parties and some outdoor activities. ²



Australia

In Australia, Christmas comes to-

wards the beginning of the summer holidays! Children have their summer holidays from mid December to early February, so some people might even be camping at Christmas.

When he gets to Australia, Santa gives the reindeer a rest and uses kangaroos or 'six white boomers' (a popular Australian Christmas song!). He also changes his clothes for less 'hot' ones!

Most families try to be home together for Christmas and the main meal is normally eaten at lunch time. Most people now have a cold Christmas dinner, or a barbecue with seafood such as prawns and lobsters along with the 'traditional english' food. On Christmas Eve, fishmarkets are often full of people queuing to buy their fresh seafood for Christmas day.⁴

China

In China, only about one percent of people are Christians, so most people only know a few things about Christmas. Because of this, Christmas is only often celebrated in major cities. More young people are celebrating Christmas in cities where Christmas parties are becoming popular and it's also a time where young couples exchange gifts with each other, a bit like Valentine's day. A tradition that's becoming popular, on Christmas Eve, is giving apples.

Only a few people have a Christmas Tree. If people do have a tree it is normally a plastic one and might be decorated with paper chains, paper flowers, and paper lanterns (they might also call it a tree of light). The Christmas Trees that most people would see would be in shopping malls. The strange thing is that most of the world's plastic Christmas Trees and Christmas decorations are made in China, but the people making them might not have decorations like them in their own homes at Christmas! ⁴

Christmas Island

It's called Christmas Island because it was discovered on Christmas Day.

Well, on an island where it is about 86 degrees every day of the year, it's not surprising that on the 25th of December each year, locals flock to the beach for a traditional Christmas BBQ lunch and swim. ³

Columbia

In Colombia, Christmas celebrations and preparations start on the evening of the 7th of December which is known as 'Día de las Velitas' or 'Day of the little Candles'. Houses and streets are decorated with candles, lanterns and lots of lights. There are also big fireworks displays and music to dance to and foods like 'buñuelos' and 'empanadas'. This day is celebrated by Catholics around the world as The Feast of the Immaculate Conception but is especially popular in Colombia.

The main Christmas meal is eaten on Christmas Eve night and it's called 'Cena de Navidad'. The dishes often include 'lechona' (pork stuffed with rice and peas), ham, turkey or a chicken soup called 'Ajiaco Bogotano'. Other popular foods around Christmas are 'Buñuelos' (cheesy fritters), arepas (a thick dish made from corn) and 'hojuelas' (a fried pastry with sugar and jam). A very popular Christmas dessert is 'Natilla' which is a set custard.

After the Christmas Meal, many people will go to a Midnight mass Church Service. Some people stay up all night, so Christmas Day is a day for relaxing and eating up leftovers! ⁴

Croatia

In Croatia, preparations for Christmas start on 25th November which is St Catherine's day. People also celebrate Advent. Over 85% of people in Croatia are Catholics so Advent is an important time for them.

On St Nicholas's Eve (5th), children clean their shoes/boots and leave them in the window. They hope that St Nicholas will leave them chocolates and small presents in their boot. If children have been naughty, Krampus (a big monster with horns who sometimes travels with St Nicholas!) leaves them golden twigs to remind them to behave.

Christmas Trees are very popular and are normally decorated on Christmas Eve. They're traditionally decorated with ornaments in the shapes of fruits. There's an old Croatian tradition that young men gave their girlfriends a decorated apple at Christmas. Many people like to go to a Midnight Mass service. 4

Democratic Republic of the Congo

Christmas in the Democratic Republic of the Congo is more of a religious festival rather than being commercial. Most people won't have any presents.

Christmas Eve is very important with Churches having big musical evenings (many churches have at least 5 or 6 choirs) and a nativity play. These plays last a very long time. They start at the beginning of the evening with the creation and the Garden of Eden and end with the story of King Herod killing the baby boys.

The birth of Jesus is timed to happen as close to midnight as possible and after that come the shepherds, the wise men and the slaughter of the innocents. This means the play normally finishes about 1 am. However, in some places there will be further singing until dawn! The Christmas day service then starts at 9 am with lots more singing.

On Christmas day, most families try to have a better meal than usual. If they can afford it, they will have some meat (normally chicken or pork). The rest of the day is spent quite quietly, maybe sleeping after a busy and late night on Christmas Eve! ⁴

Russia

In the days of the Soviet Union, Christmas was not celebrated very much. New Year was made into the important

time. Following the revolution in 1917, Christmas was banned as a religious holiday in 1929 and Christmas Trees were banned until 1935 when they turned into 'New Year' Trees! If people did want to celebrate Christmas, they had to do it in secret just in their families.

After the collapse of the Soviet Union in 1991, people were free to celebrate Christmas again. But it's still a quieter and smaller holiday in Russia after the big New Year celebrations. The official Christmas and New Year holidays in Russia last from December 31st to January 10th. Christmas in Russia is normally celebrated on January 7th (only a few Catholics might celebrate it on the 25th of December).

Some people fast on Christmas Eve, then eat 'sochivo' or 'kutia' a porridge made from wheat or rice. Kutia is sometimes eaten from one common bowl, this symbolizes unity. Other popular Christmas Eve foods include, beetroot soup (borsch) or vegan potluck (solyanka) served with individual vegetable pies (often made with cabbage, potato, or mushroom); sauerkraut, porridge dishes such as buckwheat with fried onions and fried mushrooms, salads often made from vegetables like gherkins, mushrooms or tomatoes, and also potato or other root vegetable salads. The meal often consists of 12 dishes, representing the 12 disciples of Jesus. ⁴

Switzerland

Christmas in Switzerland shares many of the customs from its neighbors Germany and Austria. But it has many traditions of its own!

Advent marks the start of the Christmas preparations. Advent calendars and crowns are both popular. In some villages, there are 'real' advent calendars with different houses decorating an 'Advent Window'. On the day when it's your house with the advent window, you hold a party for the villagers in the evening. There's food, mulled wine (called Glühwein) and music.

Christmas markets are very popular in towns and cities where you can buy all kinds of Christmas foods and decorations. There are big light displays and you can enjoy some more hot Glühwein!

In Switzerland St Nicholas is known as 'Samichlaus' and he might visit you on 6th December. You might also be fortunate enough to have some presents from the baby Jesus (or Father Christmas) on the 25th and on Epiphany (6th January) you might be visited by the Befana (in South Switzerland) and/or the Three Kings (in the rest of Switzerland). That's a lot of present bringers!

Christmas Trees are popular in Switzerland and are often bought and decorated on Christmas Eve. Some people use real candles on the tree, which are traditionally lit on Christmas Eve (when the presents are being opened!) and on New Year's Eve (for good luck).

The main Christmas meal is eaten on Christmas Eve and popular foods include a Christmas ham and scalloped potatoes with melted cheese and milk baked into it. Desert is often a walnut cake and Christmas cookies. 4

Zambia

Many churches in Zambia have nativity plays and a crib in the church. One or two days before Christmas, Zambians like to go carol singing around the local streets for charity.

On Christmas day, children are encouraged to bring a present to church for children who are in hospital or might not get a present because they are less fortunate. After church, on Christmas day, it is a custom that all the children go to one house and all the adults go to another house to have a party and to eat! ⁴

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FOREST SERVICE NEWS



It's Time to Purchase your Christmas Tree Cutting Permit

Permits for cutting Christmas trees on the Gila National Forest are available at all ranger district offices. Permits sell for \$5.00 each (for any species) with a limit of one permit per household. Free permits are available for the aromatic pinon trees. Any tree species up to 10' high may be cut.

Included with the permits are a Christmas tree tag, an information sheet on cutting regulars, and maps of designated cutting sites. You may pay by credit/debit cards, check or cash (exact change please).

Also, all fourth graders with a Kids in the Park pass or paper voucher are eligible for a free Christmas tree permit. For information about how to obtain a pass, visit www.everykidinapark.gov All fourth graders must be accompanied by a parent or guardian and present their pass or paper voucher.

Gila National Forest Fuelwood Permits

Fuelwood permits are good from January 1 or date of purchase through December 31. Each permit holder is issued tags and a Firewood Guide explaining rules about fuelwood cutting on the forest.

The permits will have a new price structure beginning January 1, 2019. Currently, the permit costs \$10/cord with a two cord minimum. As of January 1, 2019 the price will be \$5/cord with a four cord minimum. The 2019 Fuelwood Cutting Guide will indicate all of the fuelwood cutting areas. It is also available on the Gila National Forest website under Passes and Permits/Permits/Permits/Permits/Permits/Woody Materials.

Personal use permits are available to acquire a wide variety of forest products such as permits for latillas and vigas, as well as various live species transplants sold under "wilding permits". Permits are available with current identification at any of the six USDA Forest Service offices, Monday through Friday, except for federal holidays. For more information and the availability of permits, cost and office house,- contact your nearest Forest Service Office. Wilderness Ranger District - 575-536-2250.

Check with your local ranger district for current weather and road conditions before going the forest. Please

respect forest and private lands, dispose of litter in trashcans or "pack it out", and close all forest gates.

The Gila National Forest has published its <u>Motor Vehicle</u> <u>Use Maps</u> (MVUM) designating what roads and trails are open for motor vehicle use. The MVUMs are free at any one of the ranger districts. All permit holders are responsible for adhering to the MVUM and any directions for motorized use in the Firewood guide.

Seasonal Campground Closures

For safety concerns during inclement weather, the following campgrounds will be closed until March 31.

- Iron Creek Campground, the Upper Gallinas
 Campground and the Railroad Canyon Campground
 all located in the Black Range Mountains off NM State
 Highway 152
- The Cherry Creek Campground and the McMillan Campground, both located off NM state Highway 15.


To find out about the roads that are typically closed during the winter season or more information about any of the campgrounds, please contact the local ranger district.

Wilderness Ranger District and Closing the Gates

The Wilderness Ranger District is turning out their Forest Service horses and mules into the Fort Bayard Administrative Site. This pasture is part of Barrel Springs. The Forest Service horses and mules may be seen adjacent to the Fort Bayard Hospital Road. There are multiple hiking and mountain biking trails in this area.

It is vitally important, to both the health and safety of the public and the health and safety of the livestock, that all gates are closed when you exit the pastures. If the gates are left open the horses and mules can wander onto the roads and may wander into parking areas, and curious animals tend to chew on things. This area is open to the public. All gates are identified with signs referring to the livestock in the pasture.

Wilderness is that land "that is rare, wild places where one can retreat from civilization, reconnect with the Earth, and find healing, meaning and significance." Wilderness areas provide for an opportunities for solitude or a primitive and unconfined type of recreation.





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

Board members of the Site Steward Foundation spent a few days in southwest NM—visiting archaeological sites like the Mattocks Ruin and learning about the amazing people that lived in Mimbres a thousand and more years ago. Local residents Bill Hudson and Linda Pafford, along with other members of the Grant County Archaeological Society (GCAS) and volunteers at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site (MCHS), gave tours and presentations to the group, most of whom drove down from Albuquerque and Santa Fe.

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



Mary Willhite also entered a raspberry pie and Jan Tripp made a blueberry pie. Mr. Flanders entered a green grape walnut habanero. Jennie Reynolds submitted an apricot tapioca pie and Katie Dunum a pear calfoutis. The Elk Crossing brought a sweet potato pie with apple and a squash pie. We had the winners' announcement at noon and by 1.30 all the pieces of pie were gone. You have to come early.

I'd like to thank our three judges, Dale Streams, Ramona Orton, and Frank Waid. They took their responsibilities seriously and their votes could not be swayed – hence the tie for third place. Kate Brown saved the day by generously donating an additional prize. Thank you Kate! Also a big thanks to Mary Willhite, who was a boundless source of energy and broke her back leaning over to cut endless slices of pie.

To all the entrants, I can personally say that your pies were delicious. They were rated according to: appearance (5 points), crust (5 points) and taste (10 points). Each judge awarded a score out of 20 and we added the scores of the

three judges for a total of 60. Only 2 points separated the first and second place winners, and two more points separated the second from the thirds. The remaining 13 pies scored within 5 points of third place. The bottom line is – all the pies were great.
