TAXES, TAXES, TAXES and MORE TAXES
THERE IS MUCH THAT IS NEW THIS YEAR



As volunteers for the AARP Tax-Aide Foundation, we are starting to get calls and questions regarding 2018 taxes. YES, we are going to be preparing tax returns this year, and NO we don't have all of the answers yet!

SOME OF THE CHANGES

One thing we do know for sure is that they **HAVE NOT** simplified the tax return. Upon finishing the first tax return on my qualifying certification test (required for all who volunteer for AARP Tax-Aide), it was a mere 61 pages long! And, there was nothing unusual about the return. Everyone will now file a new version of the 1040 (but not as short as the 1040 EZ which has been eliminated), but they have added new schedules (#1 - #6) that need to go with the 1040 this year.

The other thing we do know for sure is that there are a few changes that will affect most everyone who is filing a federal return. The **three most important changes** that will affect most taxpayers are:

All low and most moderate-income taxpayers will now have **no need to itemize deductions**, so all those receipts you have been saving you probably will not be able to use. Your qualified receipts would have to add up to \$12,000 for single, \$18,000 for Head of Household (HOH), and \$24,000 for married filing jointly before it would be worthwhile to itemize deductions. Also, a lot of the items you may have used in the past, no longer qualify. Tax preparation fees, safety deposit boxes, moving expenses, and investment fee expenses for example.

However, don't throw away those medical and drug receipts, because they may help you on your NM State Taxes – be sure and bring them when you get your tax returns done even if you can't itemize.

 All Personal Exemptions (\$4,050 for each taxpayer and for over 65 and blind) have been eliminated. If you are

- over 65 or blind, it has been replaced with a \$1,600 additional standard deduction for single or (HOH) and \$1,300 for married filing jointly.
- New Tax Rates: Basically, the lowest rate at the 10% level remains the same as last year, the middle brackets have been lowered between 0% and 3% and the highest tax bracket was lowered from 39.6% to 37%.

Unless you are in a high tax bracket, most of the other changes will not affect your tax return.

GETTING YOUR TAX RETURN PREPARED IN GRANT COUNTY

Volunteers, in conjunction with the AARP Tax-Aide Foundation and the IRS, will be preparing tax returns in your area. Starting in the beginning of February through April 11 you can get your tax return prepared for FREE in Grant County at three locations: Mimbres Senior Center on Mondays from 9 am to 12 noon; Bayard Public Library on Wednesday and Thursday from 9 am to 4 pm; and Watt's Hall in Silver City from 9 am to 2 pm on Tuesday and Wednesday. But, to get your returns prepared for FREE, you MUST have an appointment.

If you want your returns prepared in Mimbres or at the Bayard Public Library, you will need to call Anna or

Mary at 575-536-9323. Please don't call on Monday morning, or Wednesdays and Thursdays because we are busy doing taxes and cannot answer the phone!!! Call at other times between 10 am and 8 pm. Please DO NOT call the Bayard Public Library.

If you want to have your returns prepared in Silver City, you must go to the Silver City Public Library or the Silver City Senior Center and sign up. Someone will return your call and make your appointment.

This year there are 11 volunteers which are all certified by the IRS, and eight of which are trained to do returns. Even though we give preference to seniors, and the AARP Tax Aide Foundation funds and operates this program, you do not have to be a member of AARP or a senior to take advantage of this service. If you are not a senior, your income should be less than \$75,000. If you have a small business, your expenses will have to be less than \$25,000 for the year. Or, if you have very complicated returns we ask that you see a paid preparer.

As some of the tax laws are still up in the air, and many of the tax computer programs are not ready, just look for the flyers that will be posted around town for the starting dates.

WHY WE DO IT

All of our preparers are very dedicated and conscientious unpaid volunteers, who donate a lot of time to provide this service to the community. Many people ask us why we do it? Even though written by a 17 year old, the following article pretty much sums up the way we all feel.

From a high school student's college essay in the NY Times:

This coming year will be my third volunteering every Saturday during tax season with AARP's Tax-Aide Program. In the basement of the Morningside Heights Library in Manhattan, we help the elderly and low-income individuals file their taxes. During my first season, I handled organizational tasks and assisted intake counselors with the initial interview process.

When I told the AARP manager that I wanted to return the following season and do actual tax preparation, she was skeptical, especially since the next youngest tax preparer at my location was 37. That, however, did not deter me: Though I would be just 16 before the start of the season, I diligently studied the material and passed the advanced I.R.S. qualification test.

As a volunteer, my goal is to help my clients obtain every credit they are entitled to and place vitally needed money in their pockets. To do this, I need much more than just technical knowledge. It is also essential to connect on a human level. I make it a point to put each person at ease by actively listening to his or her story.

For example, the young woman, who is a recently minted United States citizen and barely speaks English, mentions that her disabled grandmother lives with her. Her story allows me to determine she can claim a dependent care credit for her grandmother and a \$1,000 earned income credit. These credits represent approximately 20 percent of her income and will go toward buying her grandmother's medications and other necessities.

I am saddened at times by the palpable stress of those living on the edge of economic subsistence. Basic necessities such as sneakers and dental care, which I had never thought twice about, are out of reach for many. I vividly remember the single mom from Queens who works at Target and spent \$400 (a week's paycheck) at H&R Block last year. By not having to pay for tax preparation this year and the credits she can claim, she confided she will be able to buy her son, who is my age, new shoes for track and hopefully see a dentist for a tooth that has been throbbing for months.

As a volunteer, I have learned the importance of empathizing, listening and communicating complex and technical matters simply. Making my clients feel at ease allows them to understand my explanation of how their money is being taxed. I have also gained insight into how tax policy affects the financial and physical health of the working poor and elderly. While I have not changed the tax system (though someday I plan to), I have changed how my clients interact with it.

Beyond Benjamin Franklin's two certainties in life of death and taxes, I would add a third: the enduring power of the human spirit. I remember an octogenarian man with a cane who waited two hours in line on a bone-chillingly rainy Saturday in February. He is somehow able to survive in Manhattan on \$15,000 of Social Security earnings a year. Even though his income is below the filing requirement, together we claim \$77 of school tax and rent credits, which translates into two weeks of groceries.

When we finish, he says to me, "See you next year." It is at that moment I know I have made a tangible difference.

drove it because it was so special she didn't want to risk it getting hit or scratched just tooling around town and running errands, but one day not long ago when her everyday car was in the shop she decided what the heck and drove the Thunderbird to work here in Mimbres (Janie

lives in Silver City). On her way in that morning a deer jumped out of the brush and there was nothing she could do not to hit it and it totaled her favorite car! This was pretty recently, because as we know she hasn't been with us in Mimbres very long yet, and it still makes her sad to think of her beautiful Thunderbird.

In spite of the terrible commute that morning Janie is excited about being here and absolutely loves living in Silver City. She moved there from Las Cruces because Las Cruces was getting too big for her taste and said that Silver City suits her and her husband perfectly.

We are so glad to have Janie here in the HMS Mimbres clinic, and on behalf of the entire community I welcome her and want to let her know how much we love having her here.


peared to have a really good time, and everyone was very complimentary about the food.

The Imogen F Wilson Education Foundation at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site had a good 2018. Our guestbook registered over 1200 visitors to the museum last year. That number does not reflect people who visit when we're closed, who just walk the interpretive trail, or who forget to sign in while visiting. It also doesn't reflect the total number of people on field trips in 2018.

Visitors represented 40 different states and five different countries including France, Germany, the Netherlands, Japan and Canada.

We picked up some new volunteers and sadly we lost our wonderful volunteer JoAnn Ayala.

The July annual Hummingbird Festival was a success - the poor weather didn't start until we were tearing down on Sunday.

We have raised over half the funding we need to replace the roof on the 1882 Granville Wood House which is on the National and NM state historic register.

We hope to do even better in 2019. Since education is our priority we will continue to host field trips for students of all ages. The annual hummingbird festival will be July 27 and 28, 2019.





New Mexico's National Parks and Monuments

Did you know that New Mexico has fifteen National Parks, Monuments, and Cultural-Historic Sites, places that make our state unique? In 2019, Conejo Mimbreño, the preservation rabbit, is taking a road trip and will visit the amazing monuments, parks, and forests across New Mexico—starting with our near-by Gila Cliff Dwellings National Monument.

President Teddy Roosevelt declared the Cliff Dwellings

a national monument in 1907, one of the first archaeological sites to be preserved, a place where all Americans can visit and learn about the past. The Dwellings, built in the late A.D. 1200s in caves high above the West Fork of the Gila River, were homes of Mogollon Indians. These people were farmers, grew corn on mesa tops, and made a beautiful black and white pottery. The Mogollon people left the area in the 1300s, leaving behind evidence of their time in the Gila—the dwellings, artifacts, and other footprints of the past for us to discover, enjoy, wonder at, and take care of.


