Still in its infancy, the Indian Springs Ranch is a haven for Veterans. Owner and operator, Bill Mize, usually referred to as "Sheriff Billy" around the Mimbres, had a vision and a purpose that is slowly becoming reality.


Bill is a Navy veteran who spent 13 ½ months in the middle east during Desert Shield and Desert Storm. He got out of the service in 1993 and admits he had a hard time readjusting after he returned to civilian life. He

went from being in charge of 40 milliondollar planes on aircraft carriers to not being able to get a job "flipping burgers". He can empathize with returning veterans and wanted to help them. Hence, Indian Springs Ranch was conceived.

Bill had his eye on a piece of property off Forest Road 150 in the Mimbres. He had written to the owners and had never received a re-

sponse. As luck would have it, he responded to a call in his official capacity with the Grant County Sheriff's Department at the very piece of property he had inquired about. During that call, Bill encountered friends of the owners who had been given permission to change the locks on the premises that had been vacant for 13 years. While meeting with Bill, the couple spotted a Bible in his unit, and they asked him why he carried it. He responded "You never know when you might need it. It is the law I live by." One thing led to another, and he walked away with a lease on the very property he had wanted for so long.

## LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

Remember all those things I have recently said about the joy of welcoming warmer, spring weather? Well, I take it all back. Current local weather has not been a joy of any sort. It has been chilly (cold), damp (but no rain) and windy. Sadly, we are not the only area in the country where the weather has been less than perfect.

Friends on the west coast have lamented the damp, rainy conditions. And they feel they have had more than ample rain lately. In the northeast, other friends' weather comments run from "planting spring flowers" after they have spent 3 or 4 nights indoors (the flowers, not the friends). One day in May, finally came when one could put on a pair of shorts and go out for a walk. That same week, there was snow in Catron County.

Friends and family in Oklahoma bid May farewell amid seriously intense, deadly tornadoes. These storms spread into Missouri, and other neighboring states, along with flooding and other destructive menaces. To my direct knowledge, there have fortunately not been any weather-related deaths in our area. That is unless you count the loss of young fruit in local orchards and around homes fortunate enough to have apple, peach, apricot, and pear trees. Hummingbirds came back early this year, and quickly resumed their usual volume of visitors to the feeders, although it is a wonder they didn't freeze in the early days. The wind has consistently blown them about and spilled the nectar on the outside walls close to where they are located. So in addition to cleaning up spills that happen on the way to hang them up, we now get to hose off the front of the house.....

The one thing that all of us are entitled to complain about and dislike intensely is the seemingly constant and ener-

vating wind. All those allergy sufferers who were walloped by the early onset of juniper pollen are still suffering. The more timely arrival of other pollens has not really helped.

Wind is a pernicious, ephemeral pest. In the nighttime it howls around corners and creates enough noise to disturb your sleep – and that of your pets. The same thing occurs during the daytime but doesn't usually disturb your sleep. Leave the garage door open and the dust and other undesirables blow in. Try to work outside and the wind will beat you to death with its sporadic and constant pounding. Delay outside work and the northern half of your barn blows down, the actual damage can be seen at my house.

As I write this, the forecast was that the wind would calm down at 7:00 pm. It is 7:08 and the trees are still blowing a gale.

All of this is **FREE** for veterans. Their spouses are welcome to come free of charge as well. However, Indian Springs Ranch is open to the public and everyone is wel-

come. The cost for non-veterans is \$320 per day with a two-day minimum. All money from non-veterans goes back to the ranch. They take reservations for individuals or groups. The Indian Springs Ranch is a 501(c) (3) non-profit and relies on sponsorships and donations to support the ranch and fund the veterans' adventures. What happens when there is no money in the coffer to fund the veterans' adventures or pay the bills? You guessed it, Bill and DaLue fund them out of their own pocket!

The Indian Springs Ranch has hosted veterans and guests from all over New Mexico, Arizona, Texas, Georgia and even the Carolinas. How does all this help veterans make the transition from military to civilian life? Equine

therapy methods are designed to reconnect families, help the veteran decompress and help prevent suicide. They do this by providing a welcoming and safe place where the veterans can talk freely and share experiences with each other. The typical adventure is a maximum of 5-6 people.

*DAY 1 is an Intro to Horsemanship*. Bill says approximately 85% of the veterans have had no experience with horses.

DAY 2 is Communication with Horses. Leaning to communicate with the horse helps them translate these communication skills to everyday life.

*DAY 3 is Trust*. More adventures out riding helps the rider trust his horse and work as one unit. This translates to dealing with people as well.

The veterans are very grateful for their experiences at the Ranch, and Bill says he can usually see a change in their stress levels. "When you see the amount of decompression and how emotional they get, then you know you did a good job."

Indian Springs Ranch is planning on being around for a long, long time. They are committed to their mission and to the men and women veterans they host. As money permits, their plan is to build a nice lodge and some cabins for their guests to enjoy sleeping and eating indoors. They would also like to build a shower house so their guests can clean-up and relax before bed. There will always be plenty of outdoor activities to enjoy.






The 5<sup>th</sup> graders flagged and sketched potsherds. Potsherds are pieces of broken pottery left behind by the Mimbres Indians a thousand and more years ago.

The students used a metate and mano to grind corn, whirled bullroarers to call in the rain, watched an atlatl-spear-throwing demonstration, learned to drill holes with a pump drill, and made pots with clay.

They hiked to the river, ate pizza for lunch, learned about the endangered fish and frog species, and had some good old-fashioned fun in the water, including a game of tug-of-war.



Back at school, the Hurley students wrote about their day in Mimbres and created a bulletin board to share their day of fun experiences with the rest of the school- and to say "Thank you" to volunteers and the ALCS students at MHS.

Mimbres Culture Heritage Site joins other museums nationwide in the Blue Star Museum Program which provides FREE admission to active-duty military personnel and their families. The 2019 program began on May 18th (Armed Forces Day) and will end on September 2 (Labor Day). www.arts.gov/bluestarmuseums have the complete list of all participating museums. Military ID holders and up to five family members are eligible. The ID holder can be either active duty service or other dependent family members with an appropriate ID card. 

Dustin Myers, Forest Service biologist, thanked the students for doing an "awesome" job raising the fish. This year, the students raised four



fish, carefully nurturing those fish along with about two hundred "fry", the size of minnows, that the students watched hatch from eggs. "From eggs to fish in the lake," says Mr. Koury, "How awesome is that."

The older students camped out the night before and told scary stories around the campfire. Mr. Koury "pranked" the campers by howling like a coyote causing kids to run for their tents! 
Carlsbad Caverns was declared a National Monument in 1930 and is world renowned for its huge caves with limestone formations. Large colonies of Mexican free-tailed bats live inside the caves, which are dark, stay a constant temperature, providing a perfect place for them to roost. At night when the bats fly out of the caverns it is a spectacular sight to see. Each bat eats hundreds of insects in one night, a great help to farmers.



## **Mimbres Bats**

The Mimbres Indians left behind several painted pottery bowls with images of bats, one of which was found at the Mattocks Site, now the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site, by archaeologists from the Logan Museum, Beloit, Wisconsin in 1930.

Mexican Free-tail bats are often seen in the Mimbres Valley flying the summer night skies in search of insects. The ancient Mimbreño farmers undoubtedly appreciated the bats and their appetite for pests that harm crops.


