Meet Your Neighbors--- Scott and Peggy Hulet By Marilyn Markel

If you have driven up the Mimbres Valley on your way to the post office or beyond, you have probably noticed the new business, *The Little Shop of Hoarders*, now open on Sage Road – on the turn-off to the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. The owners, Scott and Peggy Hulet, moved here a few months ago from South Dakota. Meeting Scott and Peggy, the first thing that caught

my attention is their wonderful sense of humor, certainly evident in the name of their shop, but also in their plans for the business, the names of their animals, the items for sale in the shop, their artwork, it all brought a smile to my face and the desire to know more about this creative couple.

When the Hulets decided to move away from the Black Hills they made a choice—Alaska? or New Mexico? They visited New Mexico, looked at Lordsburg and Silver City and when the real estate agent showed them the property in Mimbres at night, in

the dark, they liked what they saw. Scott and Peggy are both interested in the Old West and Native American history and culture and they were excited that the property was down the road from the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. And, of course, even in the dark, they were struck by the beauty of the Mimbres Valley.

Scott grew up in South Dakota, got an education in geology (his love of rocks and minerals is on display inside and outside the shop), and has moved here and there across the west. He worked as a geologist but also spent time in New Mexico working in a fly fishing shop in Santa Fe, finding Santa Fe "a little too artsy and too

cold." He lived in Tombstone, Arizona for awhile, and as a re-enactor, took part in gun fights at the OK Corral. He eventually returned to South Dakota to care for his aging mother. Scott is a writer, currently working on six books. "All at the same time!" says Peggy. Scott writes western fiction and has had articles published in western magazines. But one of the novels he's working on is about Key

West, Florida, and pirates.
Peggy is from Key West,
where she grew up, her
knowledge of that area, so
different from the dry southwest, undoubtedly helped
spark Scott's imagination and
interest in tales of piracy on
the high seas. Scott has created a character he named
Prickly Pear Pete, that comes
up with witty western sayings. Be on the lookout for
Prickly Pear Pete in the
Mimbres Messenger!

Peggy, an artist, says she has been interested in art since childhood. She took art clas-

ses at a community college but is mainly self-taught. Her Dad was in the military in Florida, but each summer the family spent time in South Dakota, in the Black Hills, "it was the best of both worlds" says Peggy. She moved to South Dakota eleven years ago and met Scott at an art gallery in Custer. Peggy quickly realized she, "wasn't in Florida anymore" and her art changed to reflect the change in place and circumstance. She helped paint a buffalo—buffaloes are a big deal in South Dakota—Custer hosts the annual Buffalo Stampede, an art fair, and a buffalo chile cook-off. Much of her artwork now reflects her interest in the West, but some still retains a touch of her Key West upbringing. Scott

says Peggy is a great cook—she admittedly makes up her own recipes. And already has cooked up some Mimbres Valley Chili— made with chocolate!

Both Peggy and Scott expressed their appreciation in the "welcome to the community" they have received here in Mimbres. To their surprise and delight, members of the Rio Mimbres Baptist Church, driving by and noticing the moving van, helped them unload their belongings.

The Hulets also brought lots of animals with them, a true menagerie. They own two horses, Lazy Daisy, a pinto, and Sybil, the palomino, "A horse with multiple personalities", says Peggy. They have three dogs-- Leroy Brown, a chocolate Lab/ sharpei mix; Boots, a Chihuahua/ mini pinscher; and Vinnie, an Italian greyhound. Multiple cats and Pandora the Double yellow headed Amazon parrot that can imitate Peggy's laugh as well as talking non-stop when she wants to, rounds out the family.

"It's been wonderful", say the Hulets, when talking about becoming part of the community. So far, they have participated in a rock painting class at the Roundup Lodge, attended the Valentine's Dinner, gotten to know the local veterinarian because of a sick horse, and are looking forward to enjoying all that it means to be a Mimbreño.

The Idea to build a "dinosaur" came to them while still in Custer, and now they live in just the place to build it. FOREST SERVICE NEWS

Silver City Ranger District opens campgrounds

Silver City Ranger District personnel opened four campgrounds for the season on Friday, March 25. The campgrounds are:

- Iron Creek Campground, in the Black Range off N.M.
 State Highway 152
- Railroad Canyon Campground, in the Black Range off N.M. State Highway 152
- Upper Gallinas Campground, in the Black Range off N.M. State Highway 152
- Cherry Creek Campground, off N.M. State Hwy 15

District personnel are working to open Lower Gallinas and McMillan campgrounds in the near future. Gila National Forest officials remind visitors that weather and conditions can change suddenly in the high country and to be aware of potential hazards in campgrounds and on forest roads.

Always practice fire safety and follow these campfire guidelines:

- Clear all flammable material away from the fire for a minimum of five feet in all directions,
- Make a fire only if you have a shovel and sufficient water to put it out,
- Have a responsible person in attendance at all times,
- Never leave your campfire unattended,
- Do not make a campfire during the windy part of the day,
- To make sure your campfire is out, drown with water and stir with dirt, making sure all burned materials are extinguished. Feel with your hand to make sure it's out cold,
- Every campfire will be put <u>DEAD OUT</u> before leaving it.

WHAT ARE YOU READING?

MISSOULA by Jon Krakauer



During an office party, police arrive to talk to Allison. Her dad is also there and the police inform dad and daughter that Beau Donaldson has been arrested and is in jail. Beau and Allison had grown up together in Missoula and had been close friends since childhood, but not romantic.

Football is a major activity in Missoula, a town of 70,000, in

western Montana where the University of Montana "Griz" play in the Big Sky conference. Like many other small college towns it is hard to exaggerate how football is exalted.

In late 2010 it is alleged that four Grizzly football players gang raped a female student when she was too drunk to resist. The players alleged that the sex was consensual and were not charged with rape.

The next year, in 2011 three Grizzly football players sexually assaulted two female students after rugging them. These players were also not charged.

These events motivated the president of the university to appoint a female juror to investigate. The investigation brought to light 9 sexual assaults, although not all were committed by football players. This in turn, led to national attention and investigations by the University and the US Department of Justice, and the branding of Missoula as the "Rape Capital" of America.

Beau Donaldson had raped Allison while she was asleep. She pretended to remain asleep to avoid sexual violence.

Jon Krakauer has written several books that I have enjoyed, *Into Thin Air; Into the Wild*; and *Under the Banner of Heaven*. I have read these books and consider Krakauer a great writer.

I also learned something about rape. It is estimated that 110,000 women of age 18-24 are raped yearly. In 2011 the CDC estimated that 19.3 % of all women have been raped in their lifetimes.

Mamas, don't let your babies go up to Missoula!

ence. Even though La Esperanza Vineyard and Winery is the 3rd smallest winery in New Mexico, they won the **Gold Medal in the sweet red wine category** with their "**Dolcetto**" dessert wine!

There is no greater honor than those bestowed by your fellow colleagues and we are very proud of our local winery. If you haven't tried the Dolcetto because you don't care for sweet wines, try it. A glass of Dolcetto with same nice chocolate after a meal will make you a convert!

December 30, 1892

They are all found with an earthen bowl over their heads. A great many flint arrowheads and stone implements are found with the skeletons.

October 26, 1893

Two pumpkins raised on the Franks' ranch on the Mimbres were shipped to Deming Wednesday to be place on exhibition at the irrigation convention. The smaller of the two weighted 130 pounds and measured 72x84 inches, the larger one weighted 157 pounds and measured 92x105 inches.

coffeehouse will be open if you'd like to purchase food or drinks. I will be so pleased to see you all there.



DINOSAUR WORLDS By Don Lessem



They were the tallest and heaviest animals that lived when our earth was young.

They lived on the land, in the sea, and in the air.

They are plants and stones (!) and sometimes each other!

They lived in deserts, forests, swamps, and lagoons on land from the Arctic to the South Pole.

Red-Tailed Hawk

With its reddish brown tail, this large hawk is commonly seen in open country along roads, perching on telephone poles, fence posts, and flying high above the Mimbres Valley. It feeds mainly on mice, rabbits, insects and snakes and plays an important role in controlling rodent populations. The red-tailed hawk nests in trees or cliffs, and courts its mate by soaring and making high-pitched cries. Males bring most of the food to the young and the mother tears it into small pieces for them until they are 4-5 weeks old. Like all hawks and owls, the red-tailed hawk is completely protected by law from hunting or harassment.

They are still being discovered and studied. At the present the longest dinosaur discovered was a 100+ft., 40+ton seismosaurus (earth-shaker lizard) found here in New Mexico! Their names are almost as long as their bodies and present a fun challenge to pronounce and spell...a good practice if you are studying for a spelling contest.

All of these interesting details and more can be found in this book which contains amazing color illustrations, almost as exciting as digging up the real thing!

Conejo Mimbreño in March




Last month I saw my roadrunner friend catch a big, fat lizard to eat. The roadrunner is the state bird of New Mexico and there are lots of roadrunners running along



Mimbreño Pets ~ Meet Cynthia's Elmo & Ellie

Meet Elmo and Ellie, not your typical pets, but working animals. However, since Elmo, at 35, has retired from his packing career and Ellie, at 33, has cut back to semi-retired status, they can be considered pets for their personalities alone. They have actually retired twice. When Elmo was 8 and Ellie 6 Cynthia



purchased them from a Hollywood movie stunt coordinator who wanted red mules for his string. So they retired from the movies, where they had appeared as "extras".

Cynthia trained them to ride and to pack and in their new careers they were anything but extra. They have packed into the wilderness on numerous wildlife projects, water quality monitoring projects, fish release projects and for numerous outfitters.

They were first in New Mexico in the winter of 1995-96, when they were the only working animals Cynthia had and she discovered the Gila Wilderness with them. They now share her and her projects with another mule and two horses.

Elmo and Ellie have seen more of this country and the wilderness than most people. They have visited seven states and a large section of Canada. They traveled from New Mexico to Alaska one summer where they worked for an outfitter in back country Alaska. If their trailer travel could be counted as frequent-flyer miles, they could travel the globe for many years. They have packed in the Teton Wilderness to the most remote spot in the

US – the farthest point in the country from any roads.

These mules have had multiple experiences over the years in addition to packing for wilderness projects, they have packed on forest fires, private excursions for adults and children and educational programs. They have given packing



demonstrations for Expand Your Horizons, Leave No Trace and other educational projects for adults and children. They have performed at several parades and Ellie participated in Bishop Mule Days, a Bishop, California competition in trail class and halter. They are accomplished in many areas, and Elmo is a

self-taught master of gate opening, very Houdini-like.

They have packed many things over the years, camping gear, food and the like, but they have also hauled some unusual items. Probably the most unusual "cargo" was a cat which they packed in its carrier for 30 miles for

volunteers in the back woods. They have also packed timber for use in wilderness trail maintenance and building. Cynthia's 9 year old goddaughter was introduced to and transported into the wilderness with the mules. Several other youngsters have been introduced to wilderness riding and camping with their help.



Children are drawn to Elmo and Ellie, despite the fact that they are quite large animals. One of the first things Cynthia tells a youngster (or an adult) first meeting them is that if they back up to you, they are not going to kick – they like to have their butts scratched, and are quite shameless about requesting this particular attention (see photo above). They are outgoing, sociable and respond to attention and affection. In addition to their preference for butt-scratching, they like to have their ears scratched and they are particularly fond of apples and carrots. Plain old pats are also welcome.

Elmo and Ellie have been with Cynthia for half of her life, they are clearly like family. She has observed that "kids grow up, but mules just grow old". These two may be old, but they are prized and cared for and loved like the magnificent creatures that they are.

PRODUCE OF THE MONTH ~ By Frankie at Valle Mimbres

CARROT (Daucus carota sativus)

The carrot was originally domesticated from the wild carrot which was used for its seeds and leaves in Eastern Europe and Persia, then selectively bred to increase sweetness and minimize the woody core of its taproot. The root is now grown throughout the world, most are orange colored but can be purple, white, and yellow. Close relatives grown for their leaves and/or seeds are cumin, dill, fennel and parsley.

Selecting and Storing: Choose roots that are crisp and without soft or black spots. Carrots can be stored for several months in the refrigerator or in a moist, cool place. For long term storage, unwashed carrots can be placed in a bucket between layers of sand. Young carrot greens are sometimes used as a leafy vegetable but may cause allergies in young adults.

Nutrients: The carrot gets its characteristic orange color from B-carotene which is metabolized into vitamin A. But only 3% of the B-carotene is released from raw carrots vs 40% when they are cooked, steamed or juiced. Carrots are also a good source of vitamin B6 and K, as well as Lutein and Zeaxanthin.

Serving Suggestions: Raw, this versatile vegetable can be grated in salad with raisins and a mustard dressing or juiced with cucumber and ginger. They can also be

steamed, braised, roasted alongside beets, turnips and/ or parsnips, stir-fried with onion, celery, and zucchini, glazed with honey, candied, pureed, or made into cake or pudding. They are a great addition to soups and stews especially with lentils. Pineapple, coconut, ginger, cilantro, dill and parsley are great compliments to carrots.

Recipe: Thai Carrot Soup

In a thick bottomed pan, warm up 1/2 Tbsp coconut oil or 1 tsp toasted sesame oil and sauté 1 small onion till translucent. Add 1 lb. carrots, scrubbed and cut into 1 inch slices, 1 quart water or veggie stock, 3/4 cup cashews, 1/2 cup coconut flakes and 1 tsp to 2 Tbsp spicy Thai seasoning* (to taste). Bring to a boil, and remove from heat. Blend mix until pureed. Serve hot, topped with finely chopped cilantro or Italian parsley. *Spicy Thai seasoning: a spicy paste or dry mix. When using all fresh ingredients, the sauce will be a paste or when using dried vegetables and spices, the mix can last for months in a covered jar. Blend the following: 6 to 12 fresh whole de-stemmed or 1 Tbsp ground Thai hot pepper or Serrano chile; 6 scallions or 1 Tbsp flakes onion; 3 fresh cloves or 1/2 tsp dried garlic; 1 walnut-sized fresh chunk or 1 tsp powder ginger, 1 stalk lemon grass and a few kaffir leaves or 3 Tbsp juice and 1 Tbsp zest of lemon or lime; 1 Tbsp paprika; 2 Tbsp black or white pepper; 1 1/2 Tbsp ground coriander seeds.



Volunteering with Mike Stewart
