### THREE STORIES FROM A SCHOOL BUS DRIVER

My name is Linda Carr and my husband is Bob Carr, who I'm sure everybody knows was regional supervisor for Echo Trucking for many years and now works for Fowler Brothers Construction Co. We have lived in the Mimbres Valley since 1971, except for a brief six years spent in Texas. We have a daughter and a son who have blessed us with wonderful families.

I was an elementary school bus driver for thirty years. I started out in a little town called Smyer, twenty miles west of Lubbock, TX. I drove for two years there and then we moved back home to the Mimbres in 1981 and I started driving for Montoya Transportation in August,

1981. My route was from San Lorenzo Elementary School to the Ponderosa Ranch, one mile this side of Lake Roberts, and back to the school.

Every day was a new day of different events on that bus run. I have herded deer, elk, turkey, cattle, horses, mountain lions, bob cats, chickens and goats with the school bus; and I have braked for many others including coatimundi,

javelina, wolves, coyotes, cars, bicycles and people.

One morning I had picked up kids at the Ponderosa Ranch and the GOS Ranch and was starting to pull out of the flat at the GOS, entered the curve there and a young elk jumped off the bluff right in front of the bus. (They have since widened the road there and sloped the bluff.) One little girl who lived at the GOS always sat sideways in the seat, backside to the aisle. We had already had many discussions about how to sit in the seat. Anyway, I slammed on the brakes to keep from hitting the elk and she hit the floor, jumped up and demanded to know why I had done that. When we cleared the elk, I said "If you'd been sitting right, you would have seen the elk jump off in front of us." She exclaimed, "What elk?" We never had to have the dis-

cussion about how to sit in the seat again.

One of the kids had a long-haired, long horned goat that would meet the bus every afternoon, looking for his kids. They all had advanced from elementary school to junior high and high school, so the goat was confused as to which bus he needed to meet. When his kids didn't get off of the bus and I would start to take off, he would get in front of the bus and trot along a few feet, stop, turn and look back at me, go a little way, stop, turn and look back at me again. He would do that all the way to his house, then he'd go into the driveway, stop and wait. I guess he waited for the high school bus. That went on for quite some

time until he figured out the right time and right bus.

The high school bus went up to the Ponderosa Ranch about ten minutes ahead of me in the morning. One year a big bull elk would wait for that bus at the cattle guard above Camp Thunderbird. When the bus went across the cattle guard, the elk would bugle and chase the bus. Several years later, I had a young bull elk that would

wait for me at the sharp curve below the Continental Divide above Camp Thunderbird. He would stand in the highway and challenge that big yellow school bus on his road. He would put is head down and paw at the pavement. Driving a bus without a nose on it, I could see him up close and I had several heart-stopping moments. I would squall my air brakes at him and he would really get upset and, of course, I was upset sitting in the middle of a curve. The elk would finally relent and reluctantly move over and I would go around him. That went on every morning for three weeks. The last morning before the elk hunt started, the bull elk was really belligerent. I sat in the curve a good five minutes or more until he moved over far enough that I could go around him. The next morning, he

wasn't there waiting for me. I was relieved, but also sad

I have driven through snow, fog, fires, smoke and floods, to name a few road perils. I can tell you when the water starts coming off the bluffs between Ewell Ranch and Allie Canyon, you are not going to be able to get up or down Highway 35, because the canyons are going to flood.

One year, we had a new principal and assistant principal at San Lorenzo Elementary. It had rained all night and was still raining the next morning. When I got to the school that morning I didn't unload the kids and I sent one of the older ones into the school to get the principal. He came to the bus and I told him I needed to leave and take the kids back home or I would not be able to get back to Ponderosa Ranch if I waited. This was 7:45 a.m. The principal decided I needed to unload the kids and go with him and the assistant principal to check the roads first. We got in his little Toyota car and made it to Allie Canyon, which had started to flood. He turned around and we barely made it across Shingle Canyon. We got back to the school and the principal called the superintendent and he said we couldn't take kids home until every child's parent had been contacted. The buses didn't leave the school until 10:45 a.m., three hours later. I knew it was too late. I got to Shingle Canyon and it was running three to four feet deep with fast rushing water, boulders and tree limbs. Parents were stuck on the other side and we were stuck on this side. The dad of three of the kids on the bus decided he would try to cross this flood in his pickup. It got hung up and started washing off the road. The dad opened his door and someone threw him a rope, but the pickup hung up again and stopped washing away. The kids on the bus had been excited, but when this all unfolded they got quiet and some started crying. The

dad's kids were screaming and crying. Some scary moments! The Upper Mimbres Fire Chief arrived with the largest fire truck they had and took as many kids as he could fit in the cab and drove across the flood. He came back three times and I had one little boy left that he couldn't fit in the cab, so he stayed with me. The fire chief delivered the fourth load and came back for the last little boy.

The principal showed up, told the Chief that he couldn't take the boy across without parental permission. After much discussion, the Chief finally said, "Watch me!" and loaded the little boy in the fire truck and started across, and almost didn't make it. The water had risen higher. The Chief went on and took kids across to their waiting parents at Allie Canyon, Little Cottonwood Canyon and Soldiers Canyon and got all the kids safely delivered to their parents. There was not one upset parent. Thank you firemen!

I want to tell one more story from many that I have to tell. One year I was doing three runs a day. The second run was for kindergarten children that got out of school at 11:30 a.m. I had six kindergarteners on the bus and when I got to the Grijalva Cemetery, they were holding a funeral. There were cars parked everywhere and the highway was blocked. A police officer came to the bus and said it would be about twenty minutes or so before the funeral was over. I told the officer I could not wait that long, I had parents waiting for their children and no way to contact them. This was before cell phones and most of the parents were at the stops already waiting for the bus.

The officer said he would see if he could get someone to move enough cars so I could get through. In the meantime, I am trying to explain to the kids about the funeral. I had told them that a man had died and that was where they were burying him. About that time, the military men shot off the first round of a twenty-one gun salute. The kids were standing beside me with one little girl in the seat directly behind

me. At the first round of shots, she fell over in the seat crying and screaming, "And he died!" She sat up, they shot again and she fell over in the seat crying and screaming, "And he died!" and repeated this with the third round of shots. By this time everyone was crying. The officer came to the win-

dow, saw the kids and all the tears and said, "I'm trying to get the cars moved, ma'am." It didn't take but a few minutes that time and he had men moving cars out of the way.

I was strict with my school kids. I had to be for their safety. The highway was and is a dangerous road for a busload of kids. There were so many close calls. I have hung out the driver's side window screaming and pounding on the bus to stop vehicles from hitting kids crossing the highway. Apparently some drivers believed the flashing red lights and stop sign means they should pass the bus while children are being unloaded. My advice to parents then and now is be out there to load and unload your children on the buses. You don't realize how dangerous it is – ask a good bus driver, they will tell you.


We have kept bus driving in the family. My husband has driven as a substitute bus driver. Our daughter, Shannon White is still a bus driver. This is her eighteenth year of driving. Our son-in-law Wesley White drove for several years for Montoya Transportation in Silver City. Our son drove a bus transporting prisoners several years ago. I spent thirty years driving a school bus, and what makes it all worthwhile, the 20, 30 and 40 year old kids still come up and give me hugs when they see me. I hope they know I tried very hard to be fair with them. And most of all, I




# **Bald Eagle**

The Majestic bald eagle is a success story for endangered species. The eagle's spectacular recovery from only 417 pairs in 1963 to over 11,000 pairs by 2007 resulted in removal from the endangered

species list. An adult eagle can be easily identified by its striking white head and tail. Wintering bald eagles in New Mexico can be found near rivers and lakes, perching in tall trees that provide look-out sites for prey. Although eagles feed primarily on fish they also eat rabbits, prairie dogs and other small animals, carrion, and waterfowl. Both parents bring food to the nest; tearing into small pieces and feeding it directly to the young. Primary threats to bald eagles include loss of wintering habitat, nest disturbances, poisoning, shooting, and electrocution by power lines.



#### CHARLOTTE'S WEB






