#### CURRENT TRAVEL DIARY FROM VISITORS TO THE MIMBRES

After the warm reception our travel diary from 1904 received, we began soliciting our readers for other such writings that might be of similar interest. Here is a modern day version which will describe travels to our area and some familiar places. Ed.

Travelers from Albuquerque write to their friends in the Mimbres: Here are a few notes on our journey to the Gila National Forest and Wilderness in southwest New Mexico that may be of interest.

Monday, March 28, 2016 we drove south on Interstate 25. Near Belen, we saw hundreds of acres of trees with white painted lower trunks. Wonder if they were fruit or nut trees? There was also a very large vineyard.

The winding highway through the Black Range of the Gila reached 8,500' at Emory Pass where we could see Caballo Reservoir on the Ro Grande to the east. A few of the higher north-facing deep canyons had small fields of snow.

At noon we met our friends from the Mimbres Valley for lunch at the Restaurant del Sol in Mimbres. Their home a few miles to the north in Six Shooter Canyon is delightful. Black walnuts, ponderosa pines with vanillascented bark and alligator junipers shade their property. Native flowers (including huge masses of columbines) cactus and shrubs are in terraced beds.

Our friends' hospitality is exceptional. The dining area with large windows provides a great view of their many bird feeders, including a finch sock. They remarked that they would soon be seeing hummingbirds. As we were enjoying a delicious brown sugar Bundt cake we looked up and saw a hummingbird at the feeder. This was the first of the season.

They told us of the Living Harvest Bakery, a few miles to the south, operated for 14 years by a local family. Tuesday through Saturday a bountiful buffet breakfast and lunch are served. We sampled a bit of their spelt bread which had a delicious nutty flavor. The owner brings the nutritious spring wheat from Colorado and grinds the flour. They also use sunflower oil in their baking.

They told us about an impressive Mimbres museum in Deming which shows many pictographs in the surrounding area. Sounds interesting!

We then drove to the Gila Cliff Dwellings visitor center. Our night was spent in the Woody's Corral parking area which is the trailhead for Trail 160.

While waiting for the cliff dwelling tour on Tuesday, we went to the Lower Scorpion camping area to walk to the Trail of the Past two-room cave dwelling and saw the rock art.

The cliff dwellings, reached by walking over a footbridge over the West Fork of the Gila, consisted of five interconnected alcoves that were inhabited in late 1200 AD. Along the trail we saw a large scaled lizard. We took a photo, which our friends later identified as a crevice lizard.

Later we drove to see the Middle Fork and East Fork of the Gila River and their confluence. As we drove the narrow, winding road toward Silver City we stopped at the 1870's Pinos Altos Buckhorn Saloon. Today a 3 star restaurant shares the building.

After a drive through a Silver City residential area, we managed to locate "Dutch" Salmon's High Lonesome Bookstore. That was of great interest. We spent the night in the truck near Pinos Altos where the Continental Divide trail (CDT) crosses the highway.

Wednesday we stopped a few times to inquire about the location of the Western New Mexico University museum. The fine collection of mostly black and white Mimbres pottery often decorated with animals/birds/geometric and associated information was excellent. It was especially interesting to

As fall approaches, folks have been sharing the bounty of their gardens with their non-growing neighbors – another aspect of local life for which we should be grateful - I know I certainly am.


Soon the influx of migrating hummingbirds will be over. The first of October is

learn that their corn ears were only about 4 inches long. Excavations of local sites found burials in which the body was in an upright, crouched position with a bowl placed over the head. The bottoms of bowls were pierced with a sharp object leaving a "kill" hole. It is suggested that having the bowl over the head of the deceased allows the spirit of the deceased to escape. Large fired clay vessels were found that were used to make corn beer.

On the West side of the Gila, we drove through the town of Gila with large green fields irrigated from the Gila River. After more than 8 miles up and then down a very narrow, steep, winding road we reached the Gila River. Huge alligator juniper, live oak and sycamore trees lined the river and we met an Outward Bound group who were completing a 20-day backpack in the Gila. The nearby river had a hot spring. We noticed many thistles and a large paintbrush flower along a cliff.

We had planned to spend more time hiking, but the strong winds with dust changed our minds. The devastating fires and floods of the last three years were evident.

On the way back to Albuquerque we had a chiles rellenos dinner at a Mexican restaurant in Reserve, and were stopped in Soccoro by a patrolman because one of the headlights on the truck was out. Fortunately, we only received a warning.

# MERRIAM-WEBSTER DICTIONARY ADDS 250 NEW WORDS

In September, it was announced that the Merriam-Webster Dictionary had made its annual addition of new words. (Not all 250 will be listed here!) Many of these additions are from old terms now imbued with political meaning (dog whistle) to newer terms (frogo). Here are a few examples.

"Dog whistle" – Primary definition – a way to call a dog. Secondary definition – "an expression or statement that has a secondary meaning intended to be understood only by a particular group of people".

"Word Salad" – originally "unintelligible speech related to a mental disorder". In September, Merriam-Webster tweeted: "We now enter 'word salad': a string of empty, incoherent, unintelligible or nonsensical words or comments."

"Troll" – the primary definition remains: "a dwarf or giant in Scandinavian folklore inhabiting caves or hills." In 2014 the new secondary definition was an "antagonizing person on the Internet" especially one who keeps "posting inflammatory, irrelevant or offensive comments or other disruptive content". The latest definition says that troll is "the kind of disparaging behavior that happens in real life."

"Alt-right" (new) "a right wing, primarily online political movement or grouping based in the U.S. where members reject mainstream conservative politics and espouse extremist beliefs and policies typically centered on ideas of white nationalism".

"Portmanteau" – traditionally a large trunk or suitcase. Secondary – "word blending the sounds and combining the meanings of 2 others (e.g. motel from motor and hotel).

Also new "frogo" - "frozen yogurt."

"Siracha" (new) "type of hot sauce or chili sauce made from paste of chili peppers, distilled vinegar, garlic, sugar and salt".

"Bibimbap" – "a Korean dish, word literally means 'mixed rice'. Served as a bowl of warm rice topped with *namul* (wild grass or greens) and *gouchujang* (fermented soybean paste) a byproduct of soy sauce production." The national dish of Korea.

There are 243 others – but you will be spared in this publication.

# Hopi and Japanese Elders and Artists Visit MCHS By Marilyn Markel

Volunteers at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site recently gave a tour of the Mattocks Ruin and the museum to a unique group of visitors. Archaeologist Fumiyasu Arakawa, professor and director of the University Museum at New Mexico State University, is working on a project with artists and elders from Hopi Pueblo and from Japan. The group is studying Mimbres pottery and interpreting images on pots from their own cultural perspectives and visited MCHS to learn about the people that made and painted the world famous pottery. The Hopis and Japanese were quite impressed with what they saw. As they toured MCHS, the visitors were video-taped by Atsunori Ito, PH.D, from Japan's National Museum of Ethnology. A book is planned at the completion of the project.





#### YUCCA


The beautiful yucca is the state Flower of New Mexico and it's also a very useful plant. The leaves of yuccas were used by the ancient Mimbres People for baskets, sandals, twine and rope, and paint brushes to paint their pottery. Yucca flowers are edible, and the roots were used for soap and shampoo. The narrow leaf yucca or palmilla (because the Spaniards thought it looked like a small palm tree) is also called the soap tree yucca. Yuccas are also important to animals- deer eat the blossoms, javelinas eat the leaves, birds and insects make their nests in the plants.

Broad-leaf Yucca





# MANZANITA RIDGE STORY UPDATED By Mary Willhite

Last month we published an article about Manzanita Ridge returning a stolen work of art. We have had an overwhelming response to the article. First of all, everyone wants to know if we have any updates on the story—who did it, etc. I spoke with David at Manzanita Ridge and he told me that there was nothing he could tell me at the moment, but he expected to be able to tell me something in a couple of weeks. So, we may have more to report next month. He also directed me to the most recent article in the *New York Times*, which gives us more information than previously.

The following is a summary of the rather lengthy *New York Times* article. This is what the *Times* reports. The investigators are pursuing several theories. One of which is rather extraordinary and is focused on a retired teacher, Jerome (Jerry) Atler, and his wife, Rita (both deceased), of Cliff, NM and his son, Joseph, of Silver City, who relatives say suffers with mental problems and is presently in the hospital.

Authorities theorize that Mr. Atler engineered the heist, stole the painting with the help of his son, and hung the masterpiece in the bedroom of his own rural NM home, where it remained. In other words, "...they are examining whether he stole a painting now valued at in excess of \$100 million simply so he could enjoy it."

People in Cliff said that the couple largely kept to themselves. They were avid travelers, having visited more than 140 countries on all seven continents, according to a book of fictionalized short stories based on their trips that Mr. Alter self-published in 2011.

"If Mr. Alter had a role in the theft, he may have hidden clues in his writing." In his book, *The Cup and the Lip*, based on the couple's travels, he included two stories about thefts from museums in the United States.

"In one story, *The Eye of the Jaguar*, a grandmother and granddaughter steal a 120-carat emerald from a display case in broad daylight, striking when a guard's attention is focused elsewhere." Atler wrote "having made their escape with no witnesses present, the

Some of the ways targeted to do that are by improving communication and social networks, providing preventive health education, improving access to health and social services, increasing financial and economic stability, increasing recreation opportunities, increasing education opportunities, and promoting a safe and healthy environment.
