Ms. Reds' Students Give Presentations About Wild Animals

March 23rd, San Lorenzo Elementary, parents and friends were invited to "A Wild Animal" event and presentations

at San Lorenzo Elementary. Students in Ms. Red's (Rosella Escobedo DeBusk) Academic Support Class, researched New Mexico animals to find which animals do or do not hibernate. The students created poems, wrote reports, used new vocabulary, learned animal names in Spanish, AND met Sir Rodly a real hawk that visited the school.



The kids spent many hours learning about a wild animal of their choice and wildlife habitats. They wrote reports and poems. At their event, they shared what they had learned with their guests. Everyone was invited to take part in "An Animal Feast." The food, including the cake, had to do with animals and the food they eat—meat for carnivores and omnivores, veggies for the plant eaters, nuts, and grains, worms (Gummy) for the fish, and more. It was a true feast!

The motto of Ms. Red's class is "Create-Enjoy-Motivate!" Paul Moore brought his red-tailed hawk, Sir Rodly, to school and gave the kids the opportunity to learn about raptors up close, as well as a little about falconry, and hawkers and austringers (people that raise and fly



hawks). One of the kids said, "I really liked the hawk. We could see different kinds of feathers."

The students also created math word problems using addition, subtraction and multiplication. The kids helped create a bulletin board display in the hall so they could share what they were learning with other students and teachers. They had a word wall for new vocabulary including a new word for everyone, even Ms. Red "granivore"- an animal that only eats grain!

When giving their presentations, the students stood in front of a white board full of words like selfesteem, science, math, history, research, re-



spect, career development, and confidence. And they had what Ms. Red calls their "security system"—after a student finished their presentation instead of returning to their desks, they went to a spot at the back of the room, where the next presenter could see them, so they could give a "thumbs up" or the sign to "slow down a little"—to give the speaker support and "security." 

The beginning of this season's Three Sisters Garden at the school found the students planting seeds that would germinate in the greenhouse and be ready for planting when the weather warms up. They planned the layout of the garden in the Native American style, and learned about the needs and benefits of the Three Sisters style of gardening.

There was a recent Spanish spelling bee held at the school, complete with trophies. The 3rd and 4th graders made a return visit to the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site where they had last fall became junior site stewards. They continued their education through activities at the site and their field trip was a continuous and fascinating learning experience.

Students Work On Three Sisters Garden at San Lorenzo School

Aldo Leopold Youth Conservation Corps Archaeology and Garden Crew students worked on getting the Three Sisters Garden ready for planting and helped the San Lorenzo students plant corn and beans.

The students in Pat Ross' third and fourth grade class are planting a "Three Sisters" garden and are growing traditional Native American crops of corn, beans and squash – and will put the plants in the ground as soon as the weather warms up enough and fear of frost is gone. The students are learning about the ancient farming method in which corn, beans and squash are planted together in a "waffle garden."

Marilyn Markel, YCC Garden and Archaeology students, and Amber Shay, PE Teacher, helped the children plant seeds in peat cups which were placed in the greenhouse near the school's nature garden. The Grant County Archaeological Society provided the seeds — Hopi blue corn and Tarahumara beans. On another day, the kids will plant pumpkins (a kind of winter squash).



After the seedlings get a good start, the plants will be placed outside in the garden laid out in a waffle-like grid, a technique used by puebloan peoples to conserve moisture. Corn, beans and squash are all planted inside each square of the waffle. This method of planting takes advantage of the structures of the three plants which complement one another. Once the plants are established the leaves of the squash will shade the roots of the plants, so the soil near the plants will stay a bit moister, and the bean vines will climb the corn stocks.



In addition to working together structurally, corn and beans form a complete protein, making both plants an important part of the pueblo diet. The beans also put needed nitrogen back into the soil.



Farming has a long tradition in the Mimbres valley, a tradition continued by the students. School staff and volunteers will help make sure the Three Sisters waffle garden gets enough water and, in the fall, the kids can harvest their crop.

San Lorenzo 3rd and 4th Graders Make a Return Visit to the Mattocks Ruin

Last fall, Pat Ross' class at San Lorenzo took part in a program to become Junior Site Stewards at the Mattocks Ruin (Mimbres Culture Heritage Site). The 3rd and 4th Graders visited the archaeological site, filled out preservation handbooks, and received certificates and site steward ID cards.

On a bright, sunny day in March, the San Lorenzo students returned to the Heritage Site to learn more about the ancient Mimbres People and how we can take care of our Mimbreño heritage. Under the guidance of Aldo Leopold Charter School Youth Conservation Corps Archaeology students and Grant County Archaeological Society and MCHS volunteers, the San Lo students located and sketched artifacts at the Mattocks Ruin.



Bill Hudson, Kathy Hill, and Barb Wright took photos watched as the grade schoolers and the Aldo crew did a "site survey" – the students lined up and walked across a part of the Ruin, looking for any changes due to animal or human-caused damage to the site. They flagged artifacts and sketched some of the potsherds.







The fieldtrip ended with a walk down the hill for a quick visit to the Mimbres River, where the students learned about the Chiricahua leopard frog and the Chihuahua chub,

two endangered species that live in the river. The kids did not see any fish or frogs; the water flow was pretty fast. But they did get to step on to some highly water- saturated sand at the water's edge – it felt like – jiggled

San Lorenzo Elementary Gila Trout Report: Follow up on last month's article

How are the Gila Trout doing? "Great", says teacher Pat Ross. "Fantastic", says Mr. Koury, school principal. The school is raising Gila Trout, a threatened species of fish. All the students, even the 3 and 4 year olds, are helping with the project. "This is the way science should be taught", says Mr. Koury.

The students take turns feeding the fish; they have charts and record data about the fish. Recently, Dustin Myers, Gila National Forest biologist, and his helper, came to the school to check on the trout. The students watched Myers measure and weigh the fish—so the students can calculate how much food the fish need. The kids have been concerned about the littlest fish, George, afraid he was not eating enough. But, according to Myers, George is doing fine. Mr. Koury says the whole project is such a "Positive experience for all the kids, the older kids mentor the younger ones." Mr. Koury watched one day as some 3 and 4 year olds were feeding the trout, helped by some

older students and says, "There was lots of laughing and giggling going on."

When kids are having fun while learning they are motivated to learn more! What a great project!

FOREST SERVICE NEWS

Construction on three bridges on Forest Road 150 beginning March 22

The Gila National Forest, Wilderness Ranger District wishes to notify the public that bridge work will begin on Forest Road 150 on March 22.

This project will replace two aging bridge structures on Forest Road 150; one at Indian Creek, the second at a small tributary to Black Canyon; and the third bridge, which will be rehabilitated, is the main bridge at Black Canyon.

Contractors will be mobilizing equipment, begin prepping the sites and working on the road surface. Detours around the bridges will be made available and will be 14' wide. The road will be signed to alert drivers to the construction work. **The public is urged to exercise caution on the road and comply with traffic controls.** Delays of up to 15 minutes should be expected. The construction work is expected to go through September 2017.

I am ready to do my taxes. Oh, but first I really need to clean my garage.


Ok, now I can get started. But I won't be able to find my tax information until I go through all of this mail. Yep, that was fun. Now I can sit down at a clean desk and get to work.


Conejo Mimbreño March





THE AVOCADO by Frankie GOOD FOOD HANDLING PRACTICES

Avocados can have a round or a pear shape. Florida grows the larger smooth skinned fruits, which have a big pit but are not too rich in oil, while California and Mexico mostly grow the most common avocado: the Hass, with a dark bumpy leathery skin, a high oil content of the good fat - Omega 3, and it also has the best shipping qualities. Most avocados will start with a green skin that turns dark or black as it ripens at room temperature. When the stem end just start to give in to pressure, the fruit is perfect for eating. For faster ripening, the avocado can be put in a brown paper bag with an apple or a banana in a warm spot. Once ripe, it can be kept refrigerated for a week. Avocados should never go in the freezer or be nuked as this will oxidize the flesh and turn it black.

The fruit is best used raw to keep all of its nutrients intact. To prevent short term oxidation, it can be sprinkled with lemon or lime juice. Its own pit should be kept in the unused half of the fruit, or the middle of a bowl of guacamole, or inside any other raw preparation and refrigerated until ready to use. If keeping avocados in the fridge, smooth the surface and cover with a plastic wrap or a thick oil film to slow down oxidation.

Some of the ways targeted to do that are by improving communication and social networks, providing preventive health education, improving access to health and social services, increasing financial and economic stability, increasing recreation opportunities, increasing education opportunities, and promoting a safe and healthy environment.

"Let's go play on the road" said Swift Road Runner to Brash Jack Rabbit in particular. They both went jogging on a wide dirt lane.
