Mimbreño Pets ~ Meg Streams and Birdie

Meg and Dale Streams have lots of pets, a real menagerie of dogs, horses, chickens, and more—including Birdie a Congo African Gray parrot. Birdie is a soft gray with a bright rosy red tail. She is twenty-two years old. Meg has had her since the bird was only a year and a half old. Meg is a little concerned that Birdie will outlive her owner, and Meg plans to be around for a long time but parrots can live to about eighty years old!

In the wild, African Grays live in tree top groups with up to one thousand birds in a flock. These parrots are one of the smartest birds, "They are brilliant", says Meg, "But they are a ton of work. They need to be kept busy, and they pull out their feathers if they get nervous—they'll pick themselves naked—and any change can do it, like when we move the Christmas tree in or we change a picture on the wall. Birdie has lots of toys. She likes bells and loves to tear apart pieces of string and toilet paper rolls. She makes a big mess in her cage and elsewhere!

Birdie is a *powdered feather* bird- she has white fluff feathers and sheds a powder that's like falling snow. Birdie eats dark green vegetables like Swiss chard, mashed up egg shells for calcium, and apples. "When she wants an apple

Birdie says 'Want an apple, yummy, yummy.' She also likes spaghetti and hard-boiled eggs. Once in a blue moon I make Birdie cake—cornmeal mix with added eggshells, calcium and dandelion greens. Once I had the cake cooling on the counter and Dale came in and ate a piece! He said it tasted great."

"These parrots need high humidity", continues Meg, "I was a little worried how she would do here in New Mexico, but she is thriving. She is very shy. Her wings are not clipped but she was not taught to fly. She has free rein in the house and we leave her cage open. She likes to play in the dog's water bowl. We think she is a she, but we are not sure. In Twenty-two years you'd think she would have laid an egg. These birds do not make good pets. My rule is—never put her on your shoulder—she

might take your ear off!"

"Birdie mimics whistles and knows how to whistle songs like Happy Trails, and the Sleigh Ride song and Pop Goes the Weasel. She yells 'Dale' in my voice", says Meg, "and calls the dogs- she knows all their names. I don't know how she does that—birds have no lips, so how does she say Patsy", questions Meg. "She likes to be tickled and she will say, 'likes to be tickled'. She whistles the theme from Star Wars—she heard it on the TV. Birdie moos like a cow and clucks like a chicken and when she poops she says 'What a mess!' and when I'm working in the kitchen", says Meg, "she dings like the microwave."

When Meg's friend Mary had a missing dog, "The bird heard us yell-

ing the dog's name 'Tuffy, Tuffy" so she learned that, too. But she doesn't say curse words, which is amazing because I know I said a lot of those words when the girls were young!"

What an entertaining Mimbreño Pet!

Now in its eighteenth year, MVHAL is proud to be holding its ninth annual business and membership meeting. This is a time to see old friends and make some new ones. Come and sign up for the year, dues are \$10 per family. All paid members can vote for the new slate of directors.

The only requirements for membership are that you are a resident of the Mimbres area, which we define by living on NM highways 152, 35 & 61 and are 21 years of age or older.

This year, we have four vacancies on our Board of Directors. The Board of Directors meets monthly except in December, makes decisions about what projects will be funded, guides expenditure of MVHAL funds, abides by our mission statement and by-laws, seeks grants and other fundraising opportunities and supports the projects and their managers.

Our garden has several varieties of sage, two varieties are a blue-green color and two are red sage. The red sage are dark green with red flowers which the humming birds love. I believe that natural plant nectar is healthier than sugar water for hummingbirds and insects.

The Bird of Paradise is a great Mimbres plant. It reseeds itself to form nice groups and looks spectacular when it blooms. We have several in the front yard and Guy marks new ones with a flag along with the other plants

we are caring for so we can identify them for speical watering while they are young.

Cactus Is a natural for this area, and there are many beautiful species.

I bought a beaver tail



# Local Gourd Artist Meg Streams Wins 'Best in Show' Award By Marilyn Markel

Each year there are hundreds of gourds entered in the "Running of the Gourds" art show in Casa Grande Arizona. This year Mimbres area artist Meg Streams entered three of her incredibly detailed and beautiful pieces of gourd art. Her Tropical Fish creation received the top prize- 'Best in Show' and her Polar Bear on Ice Flow won the 'Sponsor's Choice award'! Meg says, "This is the first time all the judges were in unanimous agreement" as to who the top award should go to. Last year Meg's Gila Trout gourd art piece won first place in the intermediate division, which meant that she moved up into the advanced division this year. For her *Tropical Fish* piece Meg asserts that she "stuck with her strengths"- for many years Meg created wood carvings with fish as her inspiration, once taking the "Best in World" prize at a show in Georgia.

How do you turn gourds into tropical fish? Well, Meg used small banana gourds for the fish bodies, with cut, ground down, wood-burned- for- detail strips of gourd for fins. Spiral slices of gourd painted green became kelp. The stem and top of a small gourd was carved to look just like a starfish. The fish are held together and attached by wires that can't be seen. It's amazing!

Meg is already planning her next creations. Last year, she made a whimsical *Ring-Tailed Cat* with a curly-shaped

gourd tail, "Which sold just like that", says Meg with a snap of her fingers. Now she has a half-dozen or so orders for gourd replicas of people's cats! Also envisioned is a



### OPEN BURNS By Sherry Simpson

If you're planning to burn debris on your property this spring, keep in mind these guidelines from the Upper Mimbres Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department:

Grant County doesn't require a burn permit for grass or brush, but burning trash is a violation of county ordinances.

Check for local burn bans beforehand with County Fire Management Officer Randy Villa at 575-313-3460 or <a href="mailto:rvilla@grantcountynm.com">rvilla@grantcountynm.com</a>. See <a href="https://firerestrictions.us/nm/">https://nmfireinfo.com</a> for other restrictions on county, state, or federal lands.

- Pay close attention to weather forecasts. Remember that relative humidity is usually at its highest early in the morning.
- If high winds, gusts, shifting winds, or dangerously dry conditions are predicted, postpone burning or haul your brush to the burn site provided courtesy of John Fowler near the Elk Crossing Café at about Mile 11.
- Notify Central Dispatch of your plans in advance at 575-388-8840. This helps prevent false alarms.
   Alerting your neighbors is a good idea, too.
- Place the burn site a safe distance from buildings, tree branches, fences, overhead lines, awnings, and other potential fire hazards.
- Clear the ground to bare soil for at least five feet around a burn barrel and proportionately wider around debris piles.
- Cover burn barrels with a screen or metal grid to contain flaming material.

- Keep open burn piles small and manageable.
- Be prepared to stop a spreading fire with a garden hose, shovel, rake, water buckets, and/or a fire extinguisher. Keep a phone handy in case you need help.
- Never let a fire burn unattended, and make sure it is completely extinguished before leaving.

#### FOREST SERVICE NEWS





Every campfire should be put **DEAD OUT** before leaving it. Remember, Smokey says "Only you can prevent wildfires"

"Fire safety is everyone's responsibility," said Gabe Holguin, Gila NF Fire Management Officer. He added, "Please be extremely cautious with any activity that may cause a wildfire."

Follow these guidelines and you will keep your forest and public lands safer:

- Clear all flammable material away from the fire for a minimum of five (5) feet in all directions
- Make a fire only if you have a shovel and sufficient water to put it out
- Never leave your campfire unattended and put it out at night
- Avoid making a campfire during the windy part of the day
- To make sure your campfire is out, drown with water and stir with dirt, making sure all burned materials are

extinguished. Put your hand in the ashes to make sure it's cold. If it's too hot to touch it needs more water and more stirring.

The Gila National Forest, Silver City Ranger District personnel will be opening five campgrounds for the season on Thursday, March 29. The campgrounds are:

- Iron Creek Campground, located in the Black Range Mountains off NM State Highway 152
- Upper Gallinas Campground, located in the Black Range Mountains off NM State Highway 152
- Railroad Canyon Campground, located in the Black Range Mountains off NM State Highway 152
- Cherry Creek Campground, located off NM State Highway 15
- McMillan Campground, located off NM State Highway 15

Gila National Forest officials remind visitors that weather and conditions can change suddenly in the high country and to be aware of potential hazards in campgrounds and on forest roads.

# **STARTING IN APRIL** everyone on Medicare will be receiving new Medicare Cards.

The Social Security Administration will issue everyone with Medicare a new card. The mailings will begin in April and will be staggered in 6 groups depending on the state where you live. New Mexico resident mailings are presently scheduled to begin in June.

The new cards will no longer have your Social Security Number printed on them. This is being done for identity theft protection. It is a move to protect seniors, but it is having unintended consequences. It is creating another ewdvenue for fraud calls asking you to update your social security number. Instead of a Social Security Number, everyone will now get an HICN (Health Insurance Claim Number).

Since most people have their social security checks directly deposited into their bank accounts, the Social Security Administration urges everyone to make sure their mailing address is up-to-date so you will receive your new card. You may call the social security at 1-800-772-1213 or go to your on-line account at ssa.gov/myaccount to update your address before the mailing starts.

#### Gila Trout Are Back At San Lorenzo Elementary By Marilyn Markel

Last year's trout raising project was so successful the students and staff at San Lorenzo Elementary have once again taken on the challenge.

The Gila trout arrived a few of weeks ago and found a temporary home in a tank in the school library. The fish project is a cooperative effort of the school, the Gila National Forest, and U.S. Fish and Wildlife, and provides engaging and fun educational opportunities for the kids. The fish project is incorporated into the school curriculum and students learn about habitats and ecosystems, data collection, and record keeping. The students use writing skills and expand their vocabulary--while learning all kinds of information about this special species of trout. Students spend time observing the fish, writing about those obser-



vations, testing the water and recording data about the water temperature and chemical balance. Justin Myers, a biologist with the Gila

National Forest, is heading up the project. He and his helpers teach the kids about weighing the fish and how to determine how much food to feed them. Ms. Alcorta, the 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade teacher, says, "The fish are a little bigger this year, they are eating more, and pooping more, so we are having to change the water more often, so that the nitrate level will stay low."

The trout will live at the school until the middle of May. On May 17<sup>th</sup>, the students will release the trout into Sapillo Creek, giving their fish a new home in the wild.


