# Meet Your Neighbor - Barbara Wright By Marilyn Markel

Growing up in New Mexico I've always known our state truly is the "Land of Enchantment"— the natural beauty of

the landscape, an incredible mix of cultures, and an exceptional history has all resulted in a place like no other. And the Mimbres Valley is especially enchanted—and seems to attract and hold a unique collection of people that somehow found their way here—people that search for that special place to call home and end up in Mimbres. People like Barbara Wright.

Barb grew up in Long Beach, California. Barb's father was the superintendent of the Long Beach schools. Her mother was a teacher and actively involved in civic and community projects. Barb has an older sister and a younger brother (and a younger sisterher brother's wife). Barb, always interested in history and people from other cultures and places, got a degree in anthropology from Cal State, studied Meso-American and Native American cultures, and continued taking classes at several L. A. area universitieslearning about Rock Art and other topics of interest.

Barb worked in retail, for a non-profit dealing with exceptional children, and for law and accounting firms, all in the L.A. area. She started planning for re-

tirement in the mid 1990s—and began looking for just the right place to move to. She visited small towns in

the Gold Country of California, Southern Arizona, and Northern New Mexico, before expanding her search to places like Datil, Socorro, T or c, and Deming. She had learned a little

about Silver City, years before, when she read about a job opening at the Silver City Museum—the kind of job she had always thought she might enjoy. At that time, she decided to remain in the L.A area, close to family. But Silver City stayed in the

back of her mind and, eventually, she came to check it out, liked what she saw, and drove around south-

west N.M. — up to Reserve and Mogollon, through Pinos Altos, to the Gila Cliff Dwellings and through Mimbres—always on the lookout for affordable property that would suit her needs— property with an important requirement— room for horses.

Barb is an animal lover and says she wanted a horse by

the time she was three. She grew up riding horses, and says her father "indulged" her passion. She took riding lessons and often rode a horse owned by a family friend. Barb laughs as she tells the story of the time her father hid a comic strip from her, "Priscilla's Pop"—when Priscilla's dad gave

### RECRUITING FOR A VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

I'm sitting here behind my computer trying to figure out how to write an article on recruiting volunteers for our fire department. Maybe I should list the myths about joining our fire department...

Myth #1) You have to be a firefighter. Sapillo has the same needs as many other businesses have. A third of our members are not firefighters. These people work as dispatchers, cooks and bakers, vehicle drivers, etc. They help keep our station clean, help with office work, help with

vehicle and building maintenance, cut our grass, and just generally support our members and make life a lot easier for us.

Myth #2) You have to be a full-time resident here. Our fire district has a number of residents who are part timers. We are fortunate to have six members who live as far away as Deming, Las Cruces, and Tucson who are active members of our department. Three of those members are trained firefighters and regularly travel to Lake Roberts each month to join our training sessions and meetings.

Myth #3) The pay is lousy. If you're looking to become the next Warren Buffet by joining the department, you've come to the wrong place. If, however, you are looking to meet some really great people who enjoy spending time together, we have a place for you. You'll be hard pressed to find a member of Sapillo's department who does not feel richer from their sense of belonging, purpose and fellowship from being member.

## GILA NATIONAL FOREST NEWS

#### Assessment Phase Starts the Gila Forest Plan Revision

The Gila National Forest is notifying the public of the initiation of the Assessment Phase of the Gila National Forest Land Management Plan Revision. The Assessment is the first phase in the multi-year Forest Plan Revision process. The Forest Land Management Plan describes the strategic direction for management of forest resources for the next fifteen years on the Gila National Forest.

The Gila National Forest is inviting the public to engage in a collaborative process to identify relevant information and local knowledge to be considered for the assessment. Public participation opportunities are coming in the future to discuss the assessment process. The trends and conditions identified in the assessment will help determine the current plan's need for change and aid in the development of plan components. Once the assessment is completed, the

Forest will initiate the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) process to prepare a revised Forest Plan.

The Forest hosted a series of Community Conversations in March 2015. Input from these sessions helped develop the Forest Plan Revision Public Participation Strategy. In a time of pain it is good to know what's important and in order to do this sometimes you need to escape. Some choose books or music as an escape, but I choose home, where my roots are. I escape into a land of endless peace and possibility. The Mimbres



River. The stream crinkles by thirsty in the desert land. And I stand idly by and watch the day roll away. In the Mimbres River you are who you are. Clear your mind and fly with the birds who nest in

the tress above. Lose yourself in the sound of the water and float away with the buckeye and sleepy orange butterflies. An expedition into the depth of the woods is an exploration of the mind. The sky is the limit in the Mimbres River all you have to do is go. Go to the river.

#### **Black Bear**

The Black Bear, New Mexico's state mammal, are creatures of the forest and are found in mountainous areas like the Gila. The will eat just about anything (omnivorous), from nuts, berries, roots, fish, other mammals, insects, and carrion. But about 70 percent of their diet is plants. Bear cubs stay with their mothers for about two years and are born in the winter in the den. Black bears in the western states are just as likely to be brown, from cinnamon to almost black. There are no grizzly bears in New Mexico—the last grizzly in the Gila country was killed in the Black Range in the 1930s. Black bears can run very quickly; up to 30-40 miles per hour for short distances. Don't try to run from them and become prey. Never feed a bear and always store garbage in a proper way—that will help prevent bears from getting too close to a human and winding up in trouble.

The Mimbres Indians painted images of bears on their pottery bowls—including pictures of men fighting and hunting bears. Archaeologists have found bear bones in Mimbres sites.

In May, I met up with a family of javelina out in the desert. They sure are funny-looking creatures and they like to eat cactus! Did you know javelina have poor eye sight



but have a keen sense of smell? We rabbits can see much better—and try to stay out of the way of javelina!

#### The Ford Model T


The first production Model T was produced on August 12, 1908 and left the factory on September 27, 1908, at the Piquette Plant in Detroit, Michigan. The Model T was Ford's first automobile mass-produced on moving assembly lines with completely interchangeable parts, marketed to the middle class. On May 26, 1927, Henry Ford watched the 15 millionth Model T Ford roll off the assembly line at his factory in Highland Park, Michigan.

On the back of each ticket is a map to guide you to all eight locations in the most efficient manner. However, it is a self guided tour, and you can adjust your route to suit your time and interests.


#### Carol Hall's home located at 286 Manzana Rojo fea-

# San Lorenzo Kids "Field trip in the Woods" By Marilyn Markel

A long-standing tradition, students and staff of San Lorenzo Elementary School celebrate the end of each school year with a field trip to the Sapillo campground in the Gila National Forest. This year Ms. Alcorta's class, the  $\mathbf{4}^{th}, \mathbf{5}^{th},$  and  $\mathbf{6}^{th}$  graders, camped out on a Thursday night. The students learned about animals that live in the forest during a presentation given by Jason Quimby of the Forest Service. Older students helped the little kids carry a brightly painted twenty foot long "rattlesnake" around the campground, rattling a warning whenever they got close to anyone by shaking the snake's tail and shaking some gourd rattles.

After enjoying the picnic lunch of grilled hamburgers prepared by school cook Debbie Dominguez and her helpers, Ms. Alcorta's class gave a presentation to the other classes about what they had learned the night before.

After a little more fun in the forest, everyone returned to

school, tired, but happy. It was a great field trip to the woods!



Paul Kenny and Joe Zamora from the Sapillo Creek Volunteer Fire Department showed the students their fire truck, talked to them about fire prevention, then made it "snow" in the forest-- spraying foam up in the air, giving the kids a thrill.

Peter Crum and Marilyn Markel, Archaeological Society volunteers, demonstrated an atlatl (spear thrower),

helped students make paint from charcoal and paint brushes from blades of yucca. The kids painted a pictograph mural. They also created "nature sculptures" using clay, pine cones, pine needle, pebbles, and other things found in the forest.



The San Lorenzo students thanked Mr. Koury, the school principal, for giving the okay for the field trip and for sharing the experience with them. The kids said the following about the trip:

#### PRODUCE OF THE MONTH

By Frankie at Valle Mimbres Market

#### KALE (Brassica Oleracea Acephala group)

From the time of the Greek and the Roman empires until the 15th century, kale - a close relative to wild cabbage - was one of the most common vegetables throughout Europe. Making a comeback in the recent years and prized for its green to purple leaves, it is a plant that cool weather renders sweeter.

**Selecting and Storing:** Select crisp looking leaves with good uniform color. Kale will stay fresh for a few days in the coolest spot in the fridge or can be quickly blanched and frozen.

**Nutrients:** Kale is very high in vitamins A (beta-carotene), many of the B complex especially B6, C and K as well as the minerals manganese, copper, calcium and iron. It is a great source of two carotenoids: lutein and zea-xanthin as well as the phytochemicals sulphoraphane and indole-3-carbitol (both reputed for their cancer fighting properties).

**Serving Suggestions:** Baby kale greens are delicious raw in salads with toasted almonds, peanuts, sesa-

me seeds and/or garlic. If the bigger leaves are strong-tasting, mix them with olive oil and lemon juice. When cooked, kale should not be boiled to prevent loosing its nutrients, but it can be steamed, stir-fried, microwaved or dried. Great in soups and stews. It goes well with mashed potatoes, corn, Parmesan cheese, cream, spicy sausage, beef or lamb. A natural for juicing with carrots and/or apples.

#### **Recipe: Kale Chips**

Wash and drain one bunch of kale (curly green works best). By hand, tear leaves from their stems into bigger than bite size, place into a large bowl. Discard stems or use in soup stock. Drain water again if any. Blend 1 Tbsp olive oil, 1/4 tsp sea salt, 1/8 tsp garlic powder. Variations: add 1/2 tsp smoked paprika + a pinch of chipotle powder; or add 1 Tbsp grated Parmesan cheese; or forgo the olive oil, use instead 2 tsp toasted sesame oil + 1 tsp sesame butter. Pour seasoned oil over kale and gently massage into leaves. Spread loosely onto either a couple of dehydrator trays and slowly dry until crisp at 110 to 120 degrees F for about 5 hours or on cookie sheets in preheated oven at the lowest setting

(250 \* F) turning once until crisp. Serve as finger food. Store in airtight container (if not eaten all at once!).

# San Lorenzo 2nd and 3rd Graders Plant the Three Sisters Garden By: Marilyn Markel

The last week of May, the weather finally warmed up enough to plant Hopi blue corn, Tarahumara beans, and pumpkins (a kind of winter squash) in the Three Sisters Garden near the greenhouse at the San Lorenzo School.

Sponsored by the Grant County Archaeological Society, Mrs. Ross' class learned about the ancient farming method in which corn, beans and squash are planted together in a "waffle garden" – a garden laid out in a waffle-like grid, a technique used by puebloan peoples to conserve moisture. Corn, beans and squash are all planted inside each square of the waffle. This method of planting takes advantage of the structures of the three plants which complement one another. Once the plants are established the leaves of the squash will shade the roots of the plants, so the soil near the plants will stay a bit moister, and the bean vines will climb the corn stocks.

In addition to working together structurally, corn and beans form a complete protein, making both plants an important part of the pueblo diet. The beans also put needed nitrogen back into the soil.

The Mimbres people that lived along the river in ancient times may have used this technique. The Indians left behind artifacts like metates and manos (grinding stones) which tell us that corn was grown and ground into corn meal. Farming has a long tradition in the

Mimbres, a tradition continued by the students. Volunteers and summer school students will make sure the waffle garden gets enough water over the summer. And, hopefully, the Mimbres Valley will get some of the much

needed rain to ensure all Mimbres gardeners have a good harvest this year.

# ARROZ CON POLLO (Chicken with Rice)

2 T. butter

2 T. olive oil

Serving-size pieces of chicken

for 6 persons

salt and pepper to taste

1 (3.5 oz.) jar Spanish capers with juice

1 sm. jar small Spanish olives, drained

1 onion, chopped

1 clove garlic, chopped

1 green pepper, chopped

1 ½ cup raw rice

3 cups hot chicken broth

1 (8 oz.) can tomato paste

In 6-qt. pot that can be used in oven, heat butter and oil. Brown chicken and season with salt and pepper. Remove from pot. In the same oil, cook capers with juice, onion, garlic, green peppers and Spanish olives. When vegetables are cooked, add raw rice and brown. While chicken broth

is heating, add tomato sauce. Place browned chicken over browned rice, pour liquid over chicken and rice. Cover tightly with cover or aluminum foil, bake at 350 for 1 hour.
