Mimbres Artist Marilyn Gendron

Artist, teacher, parent, t-shirt maker, and community volunteer, are all ways to describe long-time valley *artist in residence* Marilyn Gendron. The famous New Mexican light, the beauty of the landscape of southwest New Mexico, and traces of their culture left

behind by ancient
Mimbreños, all inspire Marilyn's artwork and fuel her
efforts to share the joy of art
with others.

Marilyn grew up in Sacramento, California, attended university in Oregon, became an art teacher and, fresh out of college, was recruited to teach art at a boy's high school in Sydney Australia, a daunting experience lasting a year and a half. Back in California, Marilyn worked in interior and architectural design,

met and married her husband Joseph, and began the journey that led the couple to Mimbres. Using their "wedding money", Joseph and Marilyn spent six months on the road, looking at various locations that appealed to them, ending up with jobs in Santa Fe. In the late seventies, the Gendrons moved to Mimbres, built their own home, and had a daughter, Marya, and son, Patrick. The family became Mimbreños—embracing a rural lifestyle and developing a deep apprecia-

tion of the people of Mimbres-- past and present.

As soon as motherhood was not taking up all of her time, Marilyn returned to her artwork and teaching as a volunteer at San Lorenzo Ele-

school teacher, a Deming elementary school art teacher, and also giving adult art classes. Marilyn began her tshirt business, shirts with Mimbres pottery designs, in the early 1980s. Over the years, thousands of area residents and visitors to southwest New Mexico have purchased Marilyn's T-shirts—her well-known Tour of the Gila bicycle race shirts, shirts made for the WNMU Museum, shirts sold at the Azurite Gallery in Silver City, and made each year for the

Mimbres Valley Harvest Festival.
Marilyn has designed logos for the
Tour of the Gila, the Gila Conservation Education Center, and the
Mimbres Messenger. She has been
the lead artist on mural projects,
and taught hundreds of children
about Mimbres pottery for the

program. Marilyn has generously donated
her artwork, t-shirts, and
paintings to
community
projects—like
the Harvest
Festival and

the Messenger. She

also painted a wooden rabbit she named "Conejo Mimbreño" for a fundraiser.

Many art collectors in the Mimbres area, and elsewhere, happily display Marilyn's colorful paintings in their homes. Some of her landscapes feature scenes from the valley, or are works that reflect Marilyn's interest in Mimbres Indian art and culture. She often incorporates pottery and petroglyph designs and

CURANDERISMO

There are many different ways to find healing for ourselves and our families. Curanderismo is a practice of holistic methods that have been a tradition in the Americas for centuries. It is also known as Mexican traditional medicine, or "medicina del campo."

The Mexican leader Montezuma I grew thousands of varieties of plants in order to research their medicinal properties. In the sixteenth century the Spanish conquistadors came to Mexico, destroyed the garden and all of the research, as they considered it "blasphemous." Although the written knowledge was destroyed, the healing traditions were passed down orally by the native peoples. Some anthropologists (including Alberto Villoldo) think that curanderismo goes even further back—to the Indus valley in India. Thousands of years ago the Indus valley gave birth to the powerful healing techniques of Ayurveda, to which curandersimo has many similarities. There exists to this day a tribe remnants of a people known as the Naga-Maya for ten thousand years. These Maya are referred to in the Mahabharata, an Indian

scripture, as a tribe that left the Indian subcontinent. Perhaps to settle in Mexico? Ancient Sanskrit texts have been found in Yucatan, Mexico.

Curanderismo is a combination of many cultures, as well as wisdom from the curandera's (or curandero's) own background. Curanderismo (coo-RAHN-deh-REES-moh) is from the Spanish word, curar, - "to heal." The New Mexico State legislature recognized the value of this healing technique and made it legal to practice in our state years ago.

Curanderas only do healing work with the person who requests healing, or that person's small children. Trying to force change on someone who has not given their permission is known as sorcery. Even if that person is an adult child of the client requesting help, an ethical curandera will not work on anyone without their permission. Traditionally the curandera has a commitment to her community and to the Earth; often working out of her home where she grows medicinal plants.

Ancient cultures understood that we live in a delicate balance with Nature. Illness occurs when we are not in tune with our own nature and Spirit. Curanderismo helps bring people out of a diseased state and back into harmony.

There are many different types of curanderos. "Yerberos" are primarily herbalists. "Hueseros" work to heal bones. "Sobaderos" are muscle therapists. "Parteras" are midwives. "Oracionistas" work with the power of prayer. Although many curanderos do have a specialty, most practice a couple of these techniques. As an example, an oracionista may also be a powerful yerbera and so on. Using limpia (energy cleansing), diet, prayer and herbs one can one find resolution to many illnesses.

These are some traditional words used to describe ailments. Empacho refers to an intestinal blockage and is believed to be caused by eating spoiled food, eating too much, food getting stuck in the stomach or other causes. Mal de Ojo has been referred to as the 'evil eye'. This illness is believed to mainly affect babies and is felt to be a result of adults paying too much attention to a child. Envidia is translated as an illness caused by envy. Like mal de ojo, the bad intent must be neutralized by physically touching the person who is envious or envied. Susto, sometimes called PTSD, can be caused by our reaction to traumatic

events. Curanderas may also help to remove curses and to clear houses of entities.

A recent study by the National Institute of Health says, "...curanderismo involves a coherent world view of health that has deep historical roots... Just as it would be erroneous to assume that urban Western medicine is rational and scientific in all its aspects, so it is also clear that cuandersimo contains many elements based on empirical observation and shares certain scientific concepts and procedures with Western medical practice." http:// www.ncbi.nlm.nih.gov/pmc/ articles/PMC1011018/

Black-Tailed Jack Rabbit

This rabbit isn't really a rabbit at all, but a hare. Hares differ from rabbits by being larger, not using a den or burrow and having young that can move about very quickly after birth.

Its ears are very long, and its tail is tipped with black. In very hot weather they can send more blood flow into their ears and use that to carry heat away from their body. Their ears also act as antennas. This hare can get most or all of its water directly from the food it eats. The black-tailed jack rabbit can leap across distances up to 20 feet and jump six feet high straight up in the air! Many predators such as coyotes and bobcats feed on jackrabbits, making them an important part of food in the food web. They are fast and can run 45 miles per hour.

The Mimbres Indians hunted and trapped jack rabbits and cottontails, used nets and rabbit sticks, and left behind lots of painted bowls depicting rabbits.

Last month, I went back in time and visited a Mimbres pueblo from a thousand years ago. Long ago, there were Mimbres villag-



es every few miles along the river. I like to think about how rabbits, and people,

lived way back then. In the February Messenger, Aunt Mary recommended reading a book called When Clay Sings by Byrd Baylor. What a great book! It starts out, "There are desert hillsides where ancient Indian pottery still lies half-buried in the sand and lizards blink at other dusty lizards that were painted on those pots a thousand years ago"—that could be the Mimbres Valley! And the book has pictures of rabbits like those painted by Mimbres artists on their pottery bowls!



A "NEWCOMER" REFLECTS ON THE VALLEY EXPERIENCE

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PRODUCE OF THE MONTH

By Frankie at Valle Mimbres Market

BEETS (Beta vulgaris)

Related to Swiss chard, beets were originally cultivated for their greens in southern Europe and northern Africa 4,000 years ago, the roots were developed much later for their sugar. Beets can be found fresh most of the year.

Selecting and Storing: Beet roots come in red, yellow or white, and may have their leaves still attached. The tops should be cut right away to extend the life of the root. The roots should be firm, without soft spots or cracks. Large roots will usually have thicker skin. The leaves should be used right away but can be stored like lettuce. The roots will keep for a few weeks in a sealed container in the refrigerator.

Nutrients:

Beet are considered a great blood purifier and a tonic for the liver. Beets roots are high in fiber, vitamins (especially folic acid, B3, B5 and B6), minerals (iron, boron, manganese, copper and magnesium), antioxidants and Betaine, an antiinflammatory. Extensive cooking will reduce the level of B vitamins. Beet greens are high in vitamin A and C, but they also contain oxalic acid, which should be avoided by people who suffer from kidney stones. Although low in calories, beets are high in sugar but it will be slowly released. The red pigment used as a food coloring, may pass harmlessly in the urine, indicating low stomach acid levels.

Serving Suggestions:

Beets can be used raw or can be steamed, boiled, roasted, baked or

pickled. Raw, they can be juiced with carrots, apples, ginger and lemon or grated in salad with carrots, cilantro, onions and a creamy dressing. The roots are delicious steamed and cooled into a salad with goat cheese and walnuts, or served as a cold soup with yoghurt, lemon juice and dill, or blended into a hummus with tahini, olive oil, lemon juice and zest, garlic and cumin. They can be roasted or baked like chips then marinated in olive oil. A hot soup (borscht) combines vegetable or beef broth, onion, cabbage and parsley.

Recipe: Beet Carpaccio (beets with caramelized onion)

4 to 6 medium beet roots, cleaned and trimmed

2 Tbsp coconut oil or 3 Tbsp olive oil 2 medium onions, quartered and sliced thin

1 Tbsp balsamic vinegar;

1 tsp agave syrup or honey

1/4 cup dry red or white wine a pinch smoked paprika salt & pepper to taste a few curls of thinly sliced Parmesan

or extra sharp cheddar cheese (vegan substitute: 1/4 cup toasted walnuts, coarsely chopped); optional garnish: a few sprigs of parsley or a few capers.

Wrap each beet in parchment paper, then in foil and bake in a 375*F preheated oven until tender, 1 to 1 1/2 hour according to size. Meanwhile in a thick bottom pan sauté onions in coconut oil until translucent, then add vinegar and sweetener, cover and stirring often slowly simmer the

onions until caramelized, about 30 minutes. Add wine, bring to a boil then add seasonings and reduce for a few minutes. Onion jam can be blended if desired. After the beets have cooled down a bit, peel and cut them into thin slices. Beets should be served hot topped with the onions then with the cheese.

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

ITALIAN SAUSAGE SOUP

6-8 sweet Italian sausages (or hot)

- 1 large onion sliced
- 3 beef bouillon cubes
- 1 green pepper diced
- ¼ tsp. basil
- 2 sm. Zucchini, cubed
- 1 T. butter or margarine
- 6 c. water
- 1 (28 oz) can crushed tomatoes
- ½ tsp. oregano
- ¼ tsp. pepper
- 2 oz. macaroni
- 1 T. grated Parmesan cheese

Fully cook sausage, pierce skin and drain on absorbent paper. When cool, cut into ½ inch rounds – set aside. Melt butter and sauté onions until slightly soft, add water, bouillon cubes, tomatoes, green pepper, oregano, basil and pepper. BRING TO BOIL. Then add sausages, zucchini and pasta. Cover and continue to cook until pasta is done and soup is simmering. Stir occasionally to prevent pasta from sticking. Add cheese last, otherwise it will stick to the bottom of the pan.

UPPER MIMBRES VALLEY FIRE AND RESCUE

MESSAGE FROM THE FIREHOUSE

Unusually warm temperatures in January and a February month that seemed to last only days remind us that spring is here, like it or not. With spring, the winds that fan the flames of wildfires return as does this seasonal request from your volunteers at UMVFR: please contact the fire department if you are planning to burn brush. We will arrange to have members on stand by at your place, if possible. We will also encourage you to take your debris to the community burn pile at Fowlers Lumber yard instead of burning in your own yard. Safer for you and safer for everyone in the Mimbres Valley. Call fire chief Marty Mize at 536-3234 or Thunderbird Battalion Chief, Will McConaha at 536-9845 to discuss your needs.

Although warmer weather is more consistent now, wood stove and pel-

let stove fires are still necessary for most homeowners. It's a good time to check your chimney flues for creosote buildup, especially if you have burned all winter without a chimney cleaning. Be aware -- pellet stove flues also need to be checked and cleaned regularly. We responded to a chimney fire in a pellet stove earlier this year. So, like the unknowing Easterner that I was, I killed it with my shovel. I paid heck for that one!! I killed lots of copperheads back home so I thought "diamond head" – poisonous snake, I was wrong. I saw my first black widow spider here, although they areIN in most areas, this was my first. I was prompted not to kill her but to move her to the other side of the road!
