The Results of the 2017 Census of Agriculture shows the Face of the American Farmer

It Found Old White People

However, New Mexico is doing better than most states in many areas

In April, the Agriculture Department released the 2017 Census of Agriculture. The census comes out every five years and is the most accurate and detailed look at agriculture in America today. This 820 page document is full of graphs, tables and statistics and is not only used by those who serve farmers and rural communities, but it also shows who farms and what challenges they face.

The data does not paint a rosy picture, although there are pockets of growth. All categories of midsize farms declined over the past five years. The number of farms dropped 3.2 percent to 2.04 million. Nationwide, total acreage farmed dropped 1.6 percent while the average farm size increased by the same percentage to 442 acres.

Almost as a backlash to the get-big-or-get-out trend, this census revealed a surge in the number of farms below nine acres. These small farms increased about 22 percent from 2012 to 2017 and number about 273,000 farms.

There were some areas of real growth in the census. Organic farmers went from about 14,000 to 18,000 and


total sales of domestic organic product more than doubled.

New Mexico is one of the few states where the number of farms are increasing. According to New Mexico Secretary of Agriculture, Jeff Witte, "New Mexico had 15,170 farms in 2012 and in 2017 there were 25,044. Female producers play an important role in the state's family farms. Female producers accounted for 41% of the producers in New Mexico in 2017."

The number of farmers and ranchers below the age of 35 is also up, rising 11 percent to about 385,000. Young producers are those age 35 years or younger and beginning farmers and ranchers are those with 10 years or fewer on any farm. New Mexico had 10,628 new and beginning producers which was 26 percent of the states total number of 40,850 producers.

However, nationwide, young producers are still outnumbered by the 396,000 producers aged 75 and older, leaving questions about what happens when they age out.

MIMBRES CULTURE HERITAGE SITE

ALCS 6th an 7th Graders Visit MCHS

Aldo Leopold Charter School 6th and 7th Graders spent a day of service, education, and fun at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. Volunteers from MCHS and the Grant County Archaeological Society (GCAS) joined the ALCS

teachers in directing a work-day—the kids did needed jobs like cleaning and dusting, raking leaves out from under the lilac bushes, and re-painting the blue rocks lining the handicap parking space. Students also painted Mimbres pottery designs on the propane tank and constructed a memorial garden that is in honor of MCHS volunteer JoAnn Ayala. JoAnn passed away a few months ago and is dearly missed.



The kids ate lunch by the river and had time to do a little exploring and contemplation. Later, out on the Mattocks Ruin Archaeological Site, students learned about site survey techniques and sketched artifacts. On the veranda of the Gooch House, students sorted pottery sherds, broken pieces of pots, and learned about all the different types of Mimbres pottery. ALCS high school students on

the Youth Conservation Corps Archaeology Crew gave presentations on preservation and demonstrated how to make clay pots. The younger students created clay animals and pots, and "lucky rabbit" pieces stamped with an image of Conejo Mimbreño, the Mimbres

Preservation Rabbit. The rabbit pieces will be given away-- along with Conejo Mimbreño's message reminding people to help preserve and protect our cultural heritage.

The day ended with popsicles on the porch and stories about the Territorial adobe house and homesteaders like Ben Gooch and the "Murder on the Mimbres."

Farmers are overwhelmingly white. Ninety-five percent of producers are white, 3.3 percent are Hispanic and 1.7 percent are Native American or Native Alaskan.

In addition to female producers, young producers and beginning producers, New Mexico saw a shift in farmers and ranchers with military service. The number totaled 5,366 which was 13 percent of New Mexico's total and was higher than the national average of 11 percent.

An area that needs improvement in New Mexico is internet access for farms. Only 60 percent of farms have internet access which is only a 4 percent increase since 2012. New Mexico lags behind the national average which is 75 percent.

New Mexico State Statistician, Longino Bustillos, reiterated the importance of responding to the census. "The census gives voice and opportunity to all farmers and ranchers to tell the changing story of agriculture over the years and identify emerging trends and needs. We thank each and every person who took the time to respond."

Mimbres Valley Health Action League By Kathy Overholt

This year, 54 non-profits in Grant County are participating in Give Grandly – and MVHAL is one of them. What is MVHAL you might ask? The Mimbres Valley Health Action League, based in Mimbres, helps finance the production of this very magazine, the *Mimbres Messenger*, backs the Saturday Farmers' Market, organizes the Harvest Festival, supports the San Lorenzo Elementary School garden, holds the monthly food bank, and hosts the free annual community dinner that will be held on May 8th (everyone's invited). These activities are costly and Give Grandly is one of our major fund-raising initiatives.

For twenty-four hours, beginning at midnight on 5/11/2019, donations made to MVHAL will be matched by the Grant County Community Foundation. It will be a fun event with live music and great food. This year there will be two food trucks: the Duck Stop and the Mint Truck. Other local restaurants will also provide snacks that will be available for a donation. We are especially appreciative of the Living Harvest Bakery and Three Questions Coffee House for contributing their delicious cinnamon rolls and other tasty treats to this event. We're all in this together, doing what we can to support our community. A little goes a long way, especially when it's





FOREST SERVICE NEWS



Update on the Catwalk National Recreation Trail

The Catwalk National Recreation Trail, located on the Glenwood Ranger District, is open. There continues to be high water at both low water crossings.

Please heed the following precautions:

- Navigate the low water crossing with four-wheel drive, high-clearance vehicles only
- **Do not** attempt to cross the road on foot.
- Look out for large debris in the channel. If there are large rocks or debris in the channel, do not attempt the crossing.

The Glenwood Ranger District is visually monitoring the water flow and the USGS Current Conditions for Streamflow. The weather predictions for the upcoming weekend includes warm, dry weather which could contribute to the snow pack melting and add more water to the streams.

Wilderness Ranger District opens Mesa Campground

The Gila National Forest, Wilderness Ranger District has opened the Mesa Campground.

The Mesa Campground is nestled among the junipers and pinon trees on the mesa above Lake Roberts. It is a first-come, first served campground, with 12 sites with water and electric hookups and 12 tent camping sites. Remember that there is no longer a RV dump station at the Mesa Campground.

Gila National Forest officials remind visitors that weather and conditions can change suddenly in the high country and to be aware of potential hazards in campgrounds and on forest roads.

Always practice these campfire safety guidelines:

- Clear all flammable material away from the fire for a minimum of five feet in all directions
- Make a fire only if you have a shovel and sufficient water to put it out
- ♦ Never leave your campfire unattended
- Do not make a campfire during the windy part of the day
- Drown your campfire with water, stir with dirt making sure all burned materials are extinguished. Feel it with your hand to make sure it's out cold
- Every campfire will be put DEAD OUT before leaving it.

Royal John Mine and Mill Cleanup

The Royal John Mine and Mill environmental cleanup is now well underway on the Silver City Ranger District of the Gila National Forest. The repository for the waste has been constructed in Cowboy Park and trucks are now hauling waste rock from the mine and placing it in the repository.

Fifty-ton articulated dump trucks are being used to transport the waste material on a narrow single lane road. The Royal John Road is closed to the public about 7 miles up from its intersection with Highway 61 during the construction work week. It is open from Saturdays at 6:00 p.m. to Sundays at 9:00 p.m. for public travel. Access to the businesses and private property on the lower portion of the Royal John road is not affected by project activities. However, it is vital that the public respect the road closure as several near misses were reported last Saturday by people ignoring the closure and driving around the barricades.

The cleanup will remove waste rock and tailings containing elevated levels of lead from the Royal John Mine and Mill and transport to a high and dry flat ridge located on National Forest System land where it will be encapsulated in an engineered clay and topsoil repository. This will prevent the migration of lead and other heavy metals from being transported downstream and is expected to improve the water quality of Cold Springs Creek which has been impaired by past mining activity. This first phase of environmental cleanup is expected to be completed by June 28th with the second phase being planned for next year.

Conejo Mimbreño Visits El Morro National Monument

The fourth in our series highlighting New Mexico National Parks and Monuments

The great rock of El Morro is a cuesta—a rock formation that gently slopes upward then drops off. El Morro is a Spanish word for "the peak." At the top of the great rock lies an ancient Pueblo, an Indian village, that dates from about 1275 AD to 1350 AD.

Indian and Spanish explorer petroglyphs, carved images and inscriptions, can be found at the site along with a beautiful surrounding geological landscape and a hidden natural water pool. Pueblo Indian rock art, images and symbols, appeared long before the Spaniards entered New Mexico. El Morro is also known as "Inscription Rock" because explorers like Don Juan de Oñate

(1605) left their names in the sandstone, a kind of history book in stone.


