Here are some examples:

Mimbres Valley Health Action League (MVHAL)

- Mimbres Harvest Festival Committee: Eleven people comprise the Committee, which coordinates a vast number of volunteers to accomplish everything involved in producing the Festi-
- Farmers' Market: All volunteers, including vendors who bring locally-grown fruits and vegetables to the Valley during growing season.
- Community Garden and Greenhouse: Many periodic volunteers who fluctuate with seasons and growing needs assist the San Lorenzo Elemen-

TENTH ANNUAL MIMBRES VALLEY HARVEST FESTIVAL

The Mimbres river has supported agriculture and communities since the Mimbres Indians built pueblos along the river starting in A.D. 1000. The Apache Indians continued agriculture in the valley after migrating to the valley sometime after 1600. When the United States took possession of New Mexico from Mexico in 1848 military forts were established. Fields of vegetables, corn and grains were grown to feed the soldiers and their families. Over the following years small villages developed around acequias (community irrigation ditches), which supplied water for agriculture, starting in the lower Mimbres and continuing up the river for 35 miles.

As the growing season moves into fall we welcome the growers of the valley to share what the weather, soil and their hard work have produced. The people of the valley will hold the Tenth Mimbres Valley Harvest Festival on Saturday, October 10th, 10:00 am – 4:00 p.m. at the San Lorenzo Elementary School on NM Highway 35, just north of NM Highway 152. The festival is a daylong celebration of community where we all come to together to share our love for the valley. Over the past ten years the festival has expanded to support other "industries" of the people of the valley. Ever since the pottery of the Mimbres Indians was discovered, creativity and ingenuity have been another aspect of the people that live in this valley. We welcome the many artisans that live and create in our valley and in surrounding Grant County. You will find items of beauty and utility made from clay, glass, wood, gourds, paint, fiber, stones, gems and recycled scraps. Your eye will be delighted by the paintings, prints and photographs created by Mimbres neighbors.

A good variety of food will be available all day long on the grounds and in the elementary school. The "BEST PIE IN THE MIMBRES CONTEST" is back! Bring your entry for judging by a distinguished panel of judges. The stage will

feature old time gospel music by the River Bend Band, western swing & ballads by Guitar Greg and music with a Latin flair by Geli & the Heartbreakers.

A free **health fair**, provided by the Grant County Health Council will be available from 9:00 am - 2:00 pm. In addition to medical tests there will be well water testing and free flu shots, provided by Walgreens. The Grant County Extension Office will have a plant diagnostic lab to help solve problems with your plants. There will be vendor demonstrations of solar power, permaculture and sustainable living.

There will be activities for children and adults throughout the day. If you like horseshoes, come prepared to play. BikeWorks will provide free bicycle maintenance and together with Gila Hike and Bike have given the festival 6 children's bicycles to be raffled off near the end of the day. Take a tour of the San Lorenzo Elementary School greenhouse and garden project.

There is plenty of free parking in lots at the Methodist Church, the Mimbres Senior Center and the Mimbres Roundup Lodge. Shuttle service will be provided to the school from these parking areas. There is a safe drop off area for people with disabilities who may need assistance to access the school and grounds. Please leave pets at home.


receptions and non-profits. Members provide a meal for the Harvest Festival volunteers during set-up the day before the Festival; sponsor community dinners and celebrations; coordinate and produce the Christmas party and gifts for the San Lorenzo Elementary students; sponsor quarterly swap meets and monthly bingo.

AARP Sponsored Free Income Tax Preparation: A small local group, in conjunction with the national AARP Tax Aide Foundation, provides free income tax return preparation for seniors and low to middle-income residents during tax season each year.

Grant County Archaeological Society (in addition to its other many projects) have joined many other newly-recruited volunteers to restore regular access to the site, organized informative tours and continually expand the museum and educational facilities at the site.

Consider the population of the Valley and try to estimate the number of individuals who volunteer for the good of the community in these and other organizations. A wild guess would be that there are at least 200 active volunteer "jobs" being performed through these organizations at any given time. But those "jobs" are not being done by 200 people. In fact most of the active volunteers spread

San Lorenzo Elementary School: Parents volunteer periodically for school activities and events and others facilitate the literacy program which provides free books for students. Volunteers also read to the children at the school.

Mimbres Senior Center: Volunteers assist the staff in preparing, distributing and clean up after meals. Volunteers also maintain the thrift store and library at the Center.

Upper Mimbres Volunteer (UMV) Fire and Rescue: Everyone knows what these dedicated volunteers do! Through active recruiting, UMV has grown substantially and will soon have close to 40 members!

Mimbres EMS: Another all-volunteer group now actively working to restore badly needed EMS services to the Valley.

Mimbres Chapter of the Grant County Farm Bureau: All volunteers, who work diligently to educate, recognize and support young people in agriculture through education, scholarships and general assistance. They also pick up trash along our highways.

Mimbres Cultural Heritage Site: Newly rejuvenated at the Mattocks Ruin Archaeological Site, members of the their time between 2 or more organizations. The actual number of individuals who are actively volunteering is probably closer to 50 people.

Of course, in addition to the estimated 50 organizational volunteers, many of our neighbors perform volunteer services on an individual basis - neighbor helping neighbor. There are so many opportunities to contribute to the wellbeing and quality of life of us all.

PLASTIC

Plastic is humanity's best friend and arch nemesis. We are inseparable, yet it is the very material that's killing our planet. Do you remember a time when plastic didn't exist? I sure can't, but my grandmothers can. It is used so much in our daily lives that it's hard to imagine living without it. For

example, the pen I am writing with and the computer this story will be typed on and printed off of are all made of plastic that will outlive us. This material does not biodegrade like most, so it is out of the natural cycle, thus creating a cycle of its own. The cycle begins with throwing away our plastic. But where is away?

El Lobo, the Mexican Gray Wolf

The Lobo, also known as the Mexican Gray Wolf, was once found throughout southern New Mexico. By the



mid- 1900s, intensive poisoning, trapping and hunting campaigns by ranchers and government agencies had wiped out the Lobo in the state. Like other wolves, the Lobo is a sociable animal which lives in packs. Wolves raise their young to-

gether and work together to hunt prey such as deer, elk, and smaller animals like rabbits, squirrels and mice. Currently, small numbers of reintroduced Lobos live in the Gila National Forest. The Lobo is an endangered species and plays an important role in the ecosystem. Since prehistoric times up to the present day Lobos have been recognized by New Mexicans as part of our natural and cultural heritage. In 1889, when the University of New Mexico was established, the Lobo was chosen to be the school's mascot. Wolves are naturally shy of humans and present no significant threat to human safety.

Have you ever hiked in the Gila Forest? I like traveling up the Mimbres Valley to the headwaters of the river. Up in the high country, where the ponderosa pines and aspen trees grow, I sometimes see elk—bulls with massive antlers, and cow elk with their calves. 

GILA NATIONAL FOREST NEWS

Use Surveys Coming Soon on the Gila National Forest

Over the next year, many visitors will have the opportunity to let the Forest Service know how their recreational expectations are being fulfilled on Forest Service lands. This opportunity for input is the result of the 2016 National Visitor Use Monitoring (NVUM) survey which will be underway on the Gila National Forest beginning in October 2015. The purpose of this survey is to provide an estimate of forest recreation visits, the activities engaged in while visiting the forest, visitation trends and the economic impact of recreation visits on local communities.

Forest Service employees will be wearing bright orange vests and standing near "Traffic Survey Ahead" signs. The basic interview takes about eight minutes. Every other visitor is asked a few additional questions which may take another five minutes. About a third of the visitors will be asked to complete a confidential survey on recreation spending during their trip.

This will be the third time since 2006 that the Gila National Forest has conducted the NVUM survey. The Gila National Forest will manage surveys at various sites beginning with the Aeroplane Mesa Trail #705 in the Gila Wilderness on the Reserve Ranger District Saturday, Oct. 3. All information given by the public for these surveys is confidential and participation is voluntary. However, visitors to the forest are highly encouraged to participate in the survey because the more the Forest Service can learn about forest visitors, the better forest managers can meet their recreational needs.

The National Visitor Use Monitoring survey on the Gila National Forest is part of an ongoing process for measuring visitor use across all Forest Service lands. All Forest Service lands have participated in the NVUM process once already and are now on a cycle of participation every five years. The information from this nation-wide study will be used by the U.S. Forest Service, Congress, and the General Accounting Office for a variety of issues including forest planning and budget allocation.



PRODUCE OF THE MONTH

TOMATO (Solanum lycopersicum)

A member of the nightshade family, the tomato plant originated in the South American Andes a few millennia ago and was first used as a food in Mexico. A perennial in its native tropical habitat, it is grown mostly as an annual and in greenhouses in cooler climates. The fruit of a bush or a vine, its hundreds of varieties come in many shapes, sizes and colors, the most common being red today.

Selecting and Storing: Tomatoes should be firm and heavy, with smooth shinny skin, free of soft spots. Heirloom tomatoes usually have more tomato flavor. Raw tomatoes are best stored stem down at room temperature as refrigeration makes them mealy. Once cooked, refrigerate for a few days or freeze for a few months. A serrated knife is best used to cut tomatoes. Any recipe made with cooked tomatoes will taste even better the next day. To peel a ripe tomato, drop it into boiling water for 15 to 30 seconds, the peel will come right off.

Nutrients: Tomatoes are low in calories and fat and are high in Vitamin A, C and K as well as Potassium. It is also a good source of B-complex vitamins and Iron, Calcium and Manganese. They contain flavonoids antioxidants such as Lycopene, a unique and most powerful carotenoid phytochemical only found in tomato, and the phytonutrient Zeaxanthin. Tomato may increase arthritic inflammation in people with nightshade intolerance.

Serving Suggestions: The tomato is consumed in diverse ways, including raw, in salads, as an ingredient in many dishes, sauces, and drinks. Unripe green tomatoes can be breaded and fried, pickled, or used to make salsa. Ripe fruits can be dried. Heirlooms with their superior taste are usually eaten raw. Most fruits being acidic, tomatoes can be canned as is, or turned into sauce or paste. They can be grilled, roasted, stuffed, made into soup or stew. Very versatile, they go well with cheese, fish, chicken, beans, and other vegetables such as avocado, mushroom, onion, pepper and zucchini, as well as with fresh or dried herbs like basil, parsley, cilantro, thyme and oregano.

Recipe: Pico de Gallo

(Rooster's Beak, a fresh raw salsa)

1 onion, minced; a few ripe tomatoes, seeded, minced and drained; to taste: 1 to 2 Tbsp fresh lime juice; 1 to 3 jalapeno or serrano chiles, seeded and finely minced; 2 to 4 Tbsp minced cilantro; optional: 1 or 2 finely minced cloves of garlic. Gently mix all ingredients. A little salt will further develop the flavor but can make the salsa watery. Refrigerate for one hour before serving, draining some liquid if necessary. Serve fresh as a salsa with chips, or a topping for tacos, burritos, cold pasta, avocados or beans.
