## The MVHAL Monthly Food Distribution Program

Every third Wednesday of the month, MVHAL (Mimbres Valley Health Action League) hosts the mobile food pantry at the Roundup Lodge. Please be aware that despite mandatory isolation, the food distribution is happening as normal. There is one exception. Volunteers are preparing the food boxes inside the lodge and bringing them out to cars. If you come, simply wait in line in your car and a volunteer will bring you the food.



In this current climate of economic uncertainty, more food is needed than before, so the MVHAL board is trying to increase the amount of food we buy. However, this may not be logistically possible as the food distributor, RoadRunner, is currently operating at maximum capacity. In March, 20% more families participated in the distribution. The numbers were similar in April and we anticipate a increase next month. (FYI: The next Commodities Distribution will take place at the Lodge on Wednesday May 20 at 11 a.m.).

We urge readers to spread the word that anyone in the Valley suffering from food insecurity due to the virus, unemployment, being housebound, or any other reason, is welcome to participate. The income eligibility for a household of one is less than \$23,107 per year. If there are two in the household, the eligibility is less than \$31, 284 per year. (There are more income limits on the registration form itself—see pages 11 and 12). If someone has lost their job then his or her income is now zero and they

qualify. SNAP recipients automatically qualify. To be eligible for MVHAL's program, the recipient should live in the Valley and that includes Hanover, Faywood, and Lake Roberts. Due to the demand, there is only one box per family.

If you are a new participant, you need to register. The form can be find on pages 12 (English) and 11 (Spanish). Simply tear it out, fill it in and bring it with you to the Wednesday food distribution at the Roundup Lodge. If you have already registered, there is no need to fill out a form.

MVHAL would like to give a huge shout-out to Sonny Johnson and her team of valiant volunteers who do a great job organizing the safe sign-up and distribution of the food. She has been liaising closely with the RoadRunner Food Bank, which is the source of the food. Thank you, Sonny, and all commodities' volunteers! See Dawn Gray's article in this issue on her experience as a volunteer.



While the state of New Mexico provides some payment to RoadRunner, MVHAL contributes a monthly payment to purchase additional food. Of this, a portion of the payment is made possible by a grant from Single Socks, a thrift store at 111 College Avenue, Silver City. MVHAL

# One Volunteer's Story of Working with the Mimbres Food Distribution

I travelled to Faywood the first time I went to vote after we moved to the Mimbres. Little did I know that I was going to meet Paula Norero, who was working at the sign-in table, and what that meeting would lead me to over time.

Paula was an amazing lady, and active in most everything. One of those things was MVHAL's monthly commodities distribution. I went to volunteer for that, but due to age and physical problems was pretty much confined to sign-in duties. Over time Paula groomed me to take over her job, which I did when she was no longer able to do so. I really do not remember how many years ago that was, but it's been a few. I really look forward to seeing the people I serve every month. I am also happy for them if they no longer qualify for the program, as some do.

The program that MVHAL supports is called, "The Emergency Food Assistance Program - State of New Mexico, or TEFAP". It is not quite the same as a program such as SNAP (food stamps). It is an emergency stopgap program meant for people who have some sort of unforeseen problem that throws their budget into shortfall. This can be medical bills, car breakdowns and any number of other things you can imagine that come with life. For some, that is every month. Others I only see occasionally, and some only once or twice.

We get our food from the Roadrunner Mobile Food Pantry. They operate on donations of food and money from various sources. They are a 501-3-c organization, and all donations are tax deductible. If it were not for them it would be impossible to have this program. I talked to someone who had volunteered in the Roadrunner warehouse. He told me that there are many tons of donated food that comes in and goes out every day, and that to him it was a madhouse. The program is statewide.

Working at commodities distribution has gotten me thinking of many things. One of the first and foremost things I have learned is that I cannot just look at a person and decide that he or she is fit enough to work. There are many, many underlying medical problems that can affect a person's being hirable, both mental and physical. They may be very willing to go to work, but there needs to be an employer that is willing to take their problems into consideration and work

The staff of the *Mimbres Messenger* has been asking for articles from our readers, especially from the older generation that have been here most of their lives. Neighbor, Gene Stailey, has responded with his wonderful musings on the Silver City Rodeo (and more) back in the late 30's and early 40's.

### THE BIG RODEO - By Gene Stailey

For the last several years the news has all been negative, starting with the presidential election combat, the long investigation (resulting in costing the taxpayers millions of dollars), then the controversy over the "wall", the influx of immigrants that hit our county, and then the lengthy democratic party presidential campaign. Now we are hit with the Coronavirus. Throughout this period, it seems that all the people that we have sent to Washington, DC have done virtually nothing but argue back and forth, point fingers, and blame each other. I think it is about time we change the subject, even for just a few minutes.

With your permission I would like to attempt to do this by adding a little bit of local history and humor.

Recently, I read in the *Daily Press* that Don Turner was scheduled to give a presentation on "Old Time Rodeos." This prompted me to try to write a little of my feelings about rodeos. If he has already given his presentation, I am sorry. I know Don and he comes from a ranching/rodeo family and has spent a lot of time collecting history of all types, military, ranching, mining, you name it.

By the way, Don and I are somewhat "redneck" kin. He is married to my cousin, Susan Lee and his brother, Jerry, is married to my little sister, Sally. Don and Jerry were raised in a little village called Turnerville (named after the Turner family), which no longer exists as it was covered up by the western part of the Chino Mine dumps. As I mentioned earlier, Don came from a rodeo family. I have seen his father, "Audie Turner," compete in rodeos as well as Don and Jerry as teenagers. Now, on to my stories and my feelings about rodeos.

Back when I was a kid, Silver City held a three-day rodeo. The rodeo was always centered around the 4<sup>th</sup> of July regardless of what day of the week it fell. It was always a big event for me, the biggest highlight of the year. It started back when I was ten or eleven years of age. I will be 93 years old on the 24<sup>th</sup> of April 2020, and I look back on it with fond memories just like it was yesterday.

On with the story. Three of my cousins, Bud and Coop Stailey, Kent Lee and I would get out of school the last week of May. Then we would go to work in the fields and work our little tails off to gather up a "few buck" to

go to the rodeo. I lived in Riverside and the cousins lived just over the hill in Bear Creek, near Gila, some 30 miles from Silver City.

This would not even be thought of today, or even allowed with the crime rate as it is, but with our parent's permission, we would catch or hitch hike a ride to Silver City. With a few bucks in our pockets and no place to stay to we set out to attend the BIG RODEO.

As mentioned earlier, we had no place to stay. You might say that we were the first "homeless people" in Silver City. We slept under the Broadway Street Bridge at night. I can remember one time that we pooled our money and bought a stalk of bananas from a little Chinese store named Hung Lees that was located on East Broadway between Bullard Street and the bridge. Many of you may not know what a stalk of bananas is. For those that don't, picture a stem/stick with bananas sticking to all sides of it about the size of a five gallon bucket and about as deep. Well, that is what we bought. It was so heavy that we could hardly carry it. These old "country" boys went "hog wild", we had never seen anything like that before. I ate so many bananas that I got sick. I could not even eat a banana for a long time.

The rodeo was held on what od now known as Swan Street about where the Army Reserve building is now. There were no houses in that whole area. What we call Swan Street was just a country dirt road going to a ranch which I think was owned by a family named Judge. To my knowledge, there was only one residence in that whole area and that was the Brown home located on what is about 2600 N. Yucca.

Temporary makeshift "bucking, roping chutes, and corrals" were put up. There was no arena fencing. The arena consisted of parked cars and trucks in a circle. Should the bronc rider be unfortunate enough to get bucked off on the "fence"—OUCH! After the rodeo performance was over, they would have horse races on the road, running south back toward town.

You may find this hard to believe, but where Silver, Swan and Yuca streets are there were no houses. Where the Denny's Café is now was way out of town then. Highway 180 which used to be #260 came into town on the street

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between the Moose Club and Griffin's Propane, then it went down to what is now Pinos Altos Road and went down to where the stop light is near McDonalds. There was only one home in that area and it still stands—the Henry Watson home. Where McDonalds sits was a bar and liquor store called The Limit which was way out of town.

To further explain the route of Highway 180, it went on down Silver Heights onto Pope to College turning left onto Bullard, then south on Bullard to Market street then right and straight out over the hill to Cliff.

If you wanted to take highway 90, you would take the same route on Market to Cooper Street, then left in front of the old Court House continuing between the two cemeteries and south on to Lordsburg.

The reason I go into detail on the highways is for the benefit of those that are "newcomers" to the area.

Now back to my rodeo story. I mentioned that we slept under the bridge. You might wonder, "weren't you scared or afraid?" No! What was there to be

afraid of? Times were different then. We would come to town the morning of the first show, spend two nights and go home after the rodeo on the third day. These were all day performances as there was no lighting.

There was a café in the building where the Buffalo Bar was named Grants Café and they stayed open all night, so we would go there, and grab a bite to eat. Then we would get back out of the way and listen to live country music and Frankie Little with his "cowboy poetry." As the night wore on and we got tired, we would go to the bridge, go down the embankment, smooth out a spot, and lie down and go to sleep. The next morning, we would go back to the café, go to the restroom, wash up and get ready to start another day.

What a great time we had. I can remember that on this venture I drank my first Pepsi Cola® --WOW—I liked the fizz it had when you opened one of those large glass bottles.

As I mentioned earlier, kids could not do this today for many reasons, but I will treasure these memories forever. I feel honored to have lived in that period of time.

## THANK YOU, MR. KOURY

Once again, we have reason to be thankful that we have Mr. Koury as the principal of the San Lorenzo Elementary School.

If you have started noticing the Cobre School buses going up and down the Valley, it is not a mirage. On April 7<sup>th</sup>, the two regular buses that come from San Lorenzo Elementary school started delivering packets from teachers as well as the free breakfast and lunches that are being provided for all children ages 1-18. Prior to this time, the lunches had to be picked up at the Post Office, and they were doing about 90 per day.

Mr. Koury started calling the parents and realized that many of them were unable to utilize the pick at the Post Office. You know Mr. Koury, where there is a problem, there is a solution. Even though he encountered much resistance, now the school is distributing an average of 140 deliveries a day, and are reaching almost all of the children. By the way, San Lorenzo is

the only school using this common-sense approach. Keeps the children up-to-date on their assignments from teachers, keeps the bus drivers working, and keeps the school children fed.

The rules of pick up are:

- Remain in your vehicles until delivery has been made.
- Do not congregate with others at the pick-up area. 6 feet of distance must be observed at all times.
- Wash your hands before you leave your home and after you return
- If you are not feeling well or experiencing any symptoms of Covid-19, please remain at home and do not come for the pick-up.

Bus #40 Leaves the School at 10:45 and makes eight stops and arrives at the City of Rocks between 11:36 and 11:40. Bus #39 Leaves the School at 10:45 and makes 22 stops and arrives at Ponderosa at 12:30. For the exact times and locations of all the stops, go to the Cobre Consolidate website.

While the bad news is, we're all stuck at home; the good news is, that Give Grandly is going to proceed – but only online.

What is Give Grandly? For twenty-four hours, beginning at midnight on 5/9/2020, donations made to the Mimbres Valley Health Action League (MVHAL) will be

matched by the Grant County Community Foundation. This means that a ten-dollar donation becomes effectively twenty dollars, and a twenty-dollar donation becomes effectively forty. This is the 7<sup>th</sup> year for Give Grandly and over fifty charitable organizations in the county are participating. On the 'big day,' Give Grandly is going to stream videos in a live telethon from the Farmer's Market in Silver City. The site can be accessed by going to Givegrandly.org on Saturday May 9. MVHAL has a 4-minute video it will play

that features our organization and our activities. The video was made by Mitch Clinton and in my view, he did a spectacular job. Check it out and see if you agree. The online streaming will go from 8.30 am to 2.30 pm and will also track all online donations received in live time.


If you can and wish to contribute to MVHAL and Give

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## Honeybees ~ By "The Bugman"

This month's bug-of-the-month is the honeybee, one of my favorite insects. Not only do we benefit from stealing honey and various other products from honeybee hives, the pollination services provided by bees

are essential to agricultural production. Pollination by honeybees is valued at \$15-20 billion annually in the United States. The production of crops like almonds, sunflowers, grapes, apples, pears, sweet cherries, raspberries and many other plants would not be possible without honeybees.

Some may be surprised to

learn that honeybees are not native to North America, but were intentionally brought to this continent from Europe in the 1600s. In southern New Mexico, we not only have the honeybees that originated in Europe, but also bees that we call 'Africanized'. These bees are a genetic mixture of European and African bees. The African bees were brought into the Western Hemisphere by a Brazilian scientist in 1957 with the intention of crossing them with European bees to breed a bee better adapted to the tropical and subtropical conditions in Brazil. Unfortunately, the African bees escaped from the laboratory and began moving north, first arriving in the USA in Texas in 1990 and moving into New Mexico by 1993. The Africanized bees tend to be more aggressive than European bees, or looking at it from the bee's perspective, they are simply better defenders of their colonies. When a European beehive is disturbed, 10-20 bees might emerge and chase you for 20-30 feet, whereas thousands of bees will pour out of an Africanized colony and chase you for hundreds of yards. While the sting of an Africanized bee is no more venomous than that of a European bee, you are likely to receive many more stings from Africanized bees. Every year in New Mexico there are reports of humans, livestock and pets being attacked by Africanized bees, with some mortalities.

Honeybee colonies are a marvel of organization. Fertilized bee eggs become females, and develop into queens or workers depending on what they are fed. Unfertilized eggs become males and have the sole purpose of mating with a queen. Each colony has just

one queen. A queen may live for several years and lay up to 2000 eggs per day, while workers only live for about 6 weeks. Young adult workers stay in the hive where they feed the immature bees, tend the queen and keep the hive clean.

Once they are about 3 weeks old, the house bees graduate and become field bees with their main job being the collection nectar and pollen. Pollen is a protein source while honey is the bees' energy source. Nectar is transformed into honey by mixing it with enzymes in the field bee's stomach. The partially digested mixture is then transferred

from field bees to house bees by regurgitation and then deposited in the comb where it is dehydrated by fanning of the bees' wings. So, in a sense, when you're enjoying a spoonful of honey, it's really just very tasty bee vomit.



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


## Conejo Mimbreño Visits Chaco Culture National Historic Park

Chaco Culture National Park is filled with remarkable structures and landscapes; Pueblo Bonito, Casa Rinconada, Pueblo del Arroyo are some of the ancient places found in Chaco Canyon and the surrounding cultural area.

Chaco, a World Heritage
Site, dates from 850 to 1250
A.D. and is thought to have
been the center for sharing
traditions, knowledge, and
ceremonies among Pueblo
clans and people. The Anasazi or Ancestral Puebloans,
ancestors of present-day
Pueblo people, built Chaco.
Sites like Pueblo Bonito were
first excavated by archaeolo-


A canteen-shaped ceramic pot from the Chaco Canyon area was discovered by archaeologists at the Mattocks Ruin archaeological site in Mimbres. This
