MIMBRES MESSENGER

Agriculture has played a major role in community building in the Mimbres Valley in southwestern New Mexico since the Mimbres Indians, living in large pueblos along the Mimbres River, cultivated extensive irrigated fields. Agriculture continued with the Apache Indians when they migrated to the valley sometime after 1600.

In the coming years small towns began to develop around *acequias* (community irrigation ditches), which sup-

plied water for agriculture, starting on the lower Mimbres and continuing up the river for 35 miles. This tradition of agriculture and community in the Mimbres Valley continues today in the many small communities of Faywood, San Juan, San Lorenzo and Mimbres.

Residents of the Mimbres Valley will come together to celebrate their life in the valley, inviting everyone to their 14th Annual Mimbres Valley Harvest Festival, Saturday, September 28th, 10:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. A daylong celebration is planned with a Farmer's Market for valley growers, artisans and craftspeople, best pie in the Mimbres contest and more at the San Lorenzo Elementary School on NM Highway 35, just off NM Highway 152. Prizes will be raffled, including a plane ride over the valley, gift certificates, cash prizes and more. There will be live music throughout the day starting with The River's Bend band playing gospel and folk, Brandon Perrault playing a mix and Jammin' Jeff playing blues guitar. There will be a workshop on raising bees, one on growing hemp and a solar oven cookoff. Enjoy breakfast and lunch by sampling from the Taste of the Philippines, Elk X-ing green chile burgers, the Living Harvest Bakery, the Duck Stop, and TGIFry Bread. You can



also purchase red enchilada dinners prepared by the staff of the San Lorenzo Elementary school.

A free health fair will be open from 9:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. in the school's Gymnasium and includes free private well water testing from 9:30am - 1:30pm. (for more information on this call 505-827-2900) Activities for kids and adults alike will be happening throughout the day, including a horseshoe tournament, corn hole toss, Bikeworks, raffle of two children's bikes and structured games and craft activities for children.

There is plenty of free parking at the Methodist Church on Hwy 35 and the Roundup Lodge on Acklin Hill Road with free bus shuttle service provided. For people who have difficulty walking there will be a free shuttle from the entrance to the Festival behind the school. Let the gate attendant know if you need to take advantage of that vehicle. The large entertainment tent will have plenty of chairs so you can comfortably listen to the music or just take a rest break during the day.

The festival is made possible through the continued generosity of local sponsors. This year **beWellNM** and **Tom Blanchard Insurance** come back as our event sponsors and **First American Bank** returns as our music sponsor. A generous grant from the family of **Nancy Coinman** will sponsor our Children's Activities and our transportation costs. 
Last month our front page featured a short autobiography from Elsie Roman that I had requested in honor of her turning 100 years old.

Learning how to cook with the sun is a great way to keep your house cool in the summer while you save on energy bills. Solar cooking demonstrations will be ongoing, all day at the harvest festival, outside the ag info booth on Growers Row (the farmers market section.)

Cooking with the sun is also fun. At home, you will attract attention from neighbors or passers-by. Or when camping, other campers might be tempted to follow their nose to your pot roast, gurgling away in the portable sun oven at your campsite, after your long day hiking. To help appreciate the sun, especially on those boiling-hot summer afternoons, you can invite friends and family over for solar cooked meals in your cool house.

Here in the sunny and more rugged Southwest, we have long done cooking outside on the campfire in black, cast iron Dutch ovens. There are a lot of similarities between this cowboy style of cooking and

cooking with the sun. Solar cooks also use black (dark colored or tarnished) pots and pans that keep the sun's rays inside the pot and oven instead of reflecting back out off shiny or light-colored cookware. Solar cooking can be slow cooking for hours at lower temps or high temp baking, when you keep the oven pointed directly at the sun.

This year we want to start a new festival tradition with the first annual Solar Cook-off. Solar chefs are invited to bring a solar hotplate or oven to cook together and show off their solar cooking skills. The solar cooks are welcome to a potluck of solar cooked food at 1 p.m. after the judging/prizes. Bring ovens to the ag info booth to register and set up outside it.

This Year at the Farmers' Market

Be sure to shop along Growers Row (the farmers market section) for this year's agricultural bounty from the Mimbres River Valley. Plan to pick out a pumpkin or two, or some apples, or select an exotic Long Island Cheese, Tahitian or new Triamble winter squash or some pinto beans, English walnuts or pecans. Pick up raspberry and quince jams or salsas as well as pecan fudge and pecan banana bread. Local beekeepers will offer their honey and chapstick.

Remember to bring a cooler with blue ice so you can take home fresh raspberries and just-picked fresh produce as well as raw milk from a certified Grade A Dairy and frozen range-raised beef from a valley ranch.

Silver City beekeeper, Travis Kirkland, President of Grant County Beekeepers, will give a talk on bee keeping followed by Q & A in the farmers market picnic-tabled pavilion next to the ag info booth. This is your chance to ask

questions about Africanized bees or to contract him to relocate a swarm temporarily lodged in your attic.

Bring home some of the top 3 producing strawberry plants according to NMSU trials from Gabriel Feldman of **Honey Hawk Farm**. He will also offer his grafted-from-local-heirloom-fruit trees (apple, plum, apricot, cherry.) Find out how to incorporate more drought-tolerant, native trees, bushes and grasses with edible pods, berries and seeds, into your landscape and diet. His wife, Chelsea, will offer samples of mesquite baked goods as well as mesquite flour for sale and information about cooking with mesquite and native grass seed.

The local Farmers' Market will be outside at Valle Mimbres Market, 3739 Highway 35 every Saturday, 10 am to Noon until September 28th. On September 28th it will be at the Harvest Festival.

Lots of new produce is now available. Corn, peaches, squash, cucumbers, plums, tomatoes, etc. Plus delicious baked goods! Support the local growers!

CURIOUS ABOUT HEMP OR WANT TO GROW IT? By Valli McCaffrey



Stop by the **agricultural information booth** on Growers Row (the farmers market section) to learn about this hardy, drought-tolerant, ancient crop that is again legal to grow.

This year the ag info booth will focus on hemp, also called industrial hemp. Industrial hemp can't get you high. It includes all strains of the cannabis plant that contain no more than .3 tenths of a percent of THC (the intoxicating substance.)

Cannabis sativa, this much maligned, (for the past 80 years), premium food, fiber and medicine plant, has served mankind for thousands of years. Its fiber was valued for its strength and durability. Materials made from hemp have been discovered in tombs dating back to 8,000 B.C.

Hemp is very American. Not only did Christopher Columbus sail to America on ships rigged with hemp sails and hemp rope, but George Washington and Thomas Jefferson grew it. (Jefferson composed the Declaration of Independence on it.) Betsy Ross wove the national's first flag from hemp fabric and it covered the wagons that brought the pioneers here. Hemp's strength and endurance were utilized by Levi Strauss as a lightweight "duck" canvas for the very first pair of blue jeans made in California. Henry Ford even made a car out of the incredibly strong hemp fibers.

There is a huge potential market for hemp fiber (cloth, rope, paper, insulation, plastics, hempcrete and car parts) and hemp seed (as grain or pressed into CBD oil.)

Hemp offers farmers a profitable alternative to crops like alfalfa, corn and chile. It can be grown without pesticides, using half to a third less water and it is good for the soil.

Lots of handouts with information on hemp will be available, both for growers and the general public. Also, information about acequias, solar cooking and grants for small sustainable farmers resulting from the passage of N.M.'s Healthy Soils Act.

Doug Fine, a New Mexico-based goat rancher, hemp

farmer and author of books "Hemp Bound", "Too High to Fail" and "Farewell My Subaru" (set in New Mexico), will give a 15 minute talk about lessons he's learned from four years of planting and marketing farm-to-table hemp all over the world. He'll discuss genetics, cultivation, harvest and marketing options for independent farmers.

In his 2014 bestseller "Hemp Bound, Dispatches from the Front Lines of the Next Agricultural Revolution" Fine takes us on a journey to meet the men and women who are pioneering and researching hemp's reemergence and shows us why one of humanity's longest-utilized plants is poised to rejuvenate the U.S. economy. Willie Nelson, singer and president of Farm Aid, said in his review of the book, "...Farmers need hemp, the soil needs hemp, ...and humanity needs the plant that the good Lord gave us for our own survival ...Hemp Bound tells us with detail and humor how to get to the environmental Promised Land ... and create(s) a blueprint for the America of the future."

Fine's social media is @organiccowboy and his web site, (that includes National Public Radio appearances, United Nations Testimony, a Ted Talk and Conan appearance), is <u>dougfine.com</u>. Fine will do a book signing following his talk.

Let's celebrate New Mexico's introductory hemp year with 35 permitted growers planting some 3,000 acres of hemp. We invite all hemp growers or those interested in growing the newly, re-legalized hemp plant and those with hemp seeds and cultivars for our area or information about how to obtain them, as well as those with information about portable processors or seed mills, to hang out in the hemp booth.

Things You May Have Forgotten or Never Heard about 9/11

- 2,977 people lost their lives in the 9/11 attacks (not including the 19 hijackers)
- 2,605 were U.S. citizens, and 372 were non-citizens from 115 other countries.
- 343 firefighters and paramedics were killed and 72 law enforcement officers
- 9/11 was the single deadliest incident for firefighters and law enforcement officers in the history of the United States
- The New York Stock Exchange was closed for six days after the attack.
- An estimated 36,000 units of blood was donated to the NY Blood Center, but only 258 units was actually used.
- 1.8 million tons of debris was removed from the site
- An estimated 422,000 New Yorkers suffered from post-traumatic-stress disorder as a result of 9/11
- Fires continued to burn for 99 days after the attack.

OTHER THINGS THAT HAPPENED ON 9/11

Sept. 11, 1609 English explorer Henry Hudson sails up the river that now bears his name, discovering the island of Manhattan on his way up to present-day Albany.

Sept. 11, 1792 During the early days of the French revolution, six bandits broke into the store room of King Louis XVI while he was under house arrest, and stole the famous Hope Diamond.

Sept. 11, 1857 The Mountain Meadows massacre occurs: Utah residents viciously attack a band of westward-bound settlers from the American South. The militia kills over 100 unarmed people, sparing 17 children who are taken to live with local Mormon families.

Sept. 11, 1941 In Arlington, Va., the groundbreaking ceremony was held for the building that would become known as the Pentagon. Seventy years later, the Pentagon would be struck in the same terrorist attack that brought down the Twin Towers.



SEPTEMBER COUNTDOWN By Kathy Overholt

It's finally here – what we've all been waiting for! No, it's not the start of school or Christmas – it's the annual Harvest Festival Pie Contest. No doubt you've been thinking all year about the type of pie you're going to

enter and now is the time to put thought into action.

Before you grab your rolling pin, you should know that this year there will be three bonus points for three types of pies: Healthy (such as gluten or sugar free); Unusual (like last year's Pear Clafoutis or Mr. Flander's Green Grape Walnut Habanero), or Local (using the natural bounty of the valley). Just note, the maximum bonus points awarded are three, so even if you make a healthy, unusual and local pie, you'll get only three extra points. You can enter as many pies as you like – just bring them to the pie tent before 10 am.

The pies are judged by three criteria: taste, crust, and overall impression. Each of these are awarded a score of up to ten points, so a perfect score is thirty, with


possible bonus points giving a total of thirty-three. Our discerning returning judges are Dale Streams, Ramona Orton, and Frank Waid.

Once again, Kate Brown is generously donating prizes



for the first, second, and third place winners. We're giving away six free raffle tickets for each pie entered, and there are some great prizes. 



Safety Tips While Visiting the Gila National Forest

The Gila National Forest wants all our visitors to have a safe and enjoyable time while visiting the forest. The Gila National Forest is 3.3 million acres with numerous entry and exit points, and most of it has very limited cell service. With hunting season here we want to remind you of a few important safety tips.

- · If possible, travel with a companion. Leave a copy of your itinerary with a responsible person that you know. Include details such as make, model, year, and license plate of your vehicle and when you plan to return. Be specific about where you are going to be with a starting point and an ending point.
- · Wear appropriate clothing for the season and be aware that the Gila NF ranges from 4,200 10,900 feet in elevation.
- · Bring enough water for your trip. Water is never a guarantee in the high desert ecosystem that compiles the Gila NF.
- Learn basic first aid so that you know how to identify and treat injuries, and illnesses. Carry a first aid kit.

We always hope for the best, but in the event someone you know is missing these are the steps to take:

- Call the New Mexico State Police Dispatch. That number is 575-382-2500. All search and rescue incidents in New Mexico are coordinated by the NM State Police.
- · Know the starting point of their itinerary, the make, model, year and license plate of their vehicle.
- · If you know of any pre-existing medical problems, please inform the dispatcher.

Are you Bear Aware?

Quick reminders for visitors to the Gila National Forest:

- Do not feed your pets outside
- Avoid leaving large amounts of standing water outside.
- All trash should either be in an enclosed area or in a bear-proof container.
- If you are hiking in the forest, be aware of your surroundings and carry bear spray.

NMDGF has several publications, which are available on-line and at the Gila NF's ranger stations, on "Living with Large Predators in New Mexico" and "Keeping Bears Alive and Yourself Safe."

From the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish EXPECT ROADBLOCKS STATEWIDE DURING HUNTING SEASON

Hunting seasons are underway and the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish will be conducting roadblocks throughout the state during fall hunting seasons to collect harvest data and to detect wildlife law violations.

Conservation officers may be assisted by other agencies such as the U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, New Mexico State Police or county sheriff's offices. As a result, the public may encounter minor delays.

At roadblocks, conservation officers also will check for compliance with the Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Act. Drivers of vehicles hauling wood products will be asked to produce documentation as required by the Forest Conservation Act. Everyone is encouraged to report any violations they may observe, such as shooting from a vehicle, spotlighting or driving off-road. For more information, please consult the Department's hunting rules and information books, available on the Department's website, at area offices and at license vendors.


