EMS RETURNS TO THE MIMBRES VALLEY

After four years without EMS (Emergency Medical Services) in the Mimbres Valley, the October 17th arrival of a new Ford 350 ambulance, with lights flashing, marked the resumption of EMS in the Valley. Local EMS had been discontinued after the then volunteers moved away and no new volunteers came forward. The ambulance is now at home in the EMS building on Rte.35

During the years when the Valley had no local first-response available there were often long waiting periods before ambulance service could be dispatched from Silver City. If an emergency occurred up near the Cliff Dwellings, it could be an hour and a half before an ambulance could be on scene. Now there is a local ambulance which can respond far more quickly, a great benefit to all who reside here.

This vast improvement is largely because of the two new certified EMT's who are members of the community: Elizabeth and Bethany Coffey. They are members of the Coffey family, whose Living Harvest Bakery and Three Questions Coffee House are beloved and familiar to all who live here.

These two young women recognized the need, undertook training for certification and literally jump started the process. And it has been a process. Their education and training took place over two years, and the wait for implementation of EMS went through many layers of approval and implementation began early in 2017, when they were hired.

In their typically modest and generous fashion, Elizabeth and Bethany describe this exciting community development as a "work in progress". Their immediate plans involve continuing their education and training to the paramedic certification level, and express hopes that can occur soon. "We would love it by next year." They give extravagant praise and credit to the folks at Gila Regional Medical Center at many levels, their fellow EMTs in the

surrounding area, the Upper Mimbres Volunteer Fire Department and its Fire Chief, Ed Powers, who has worked hard toward getting EMS service back. And, by the way, Elizabeth and Bethany are also Volunteer Firefighters. Their brother, Benjamin, is an extra ambulance driver when needed and is also a volunteer firefighter.

The Upper Mimbres Volunteer Fire Department is making its VFO radio systems available for use in responding to 911 calls until the hospital can provide its own. These Volunteers also provide back up when additional emergency assistance is needed.

When asked what inspired them to undertake this serious new job, both young women say that it has been a labor of love, for the benefit of the community, and that they are thankful to be able benefit the community and glorify the Lord. They provide support for everyone, and it takes a community. It is all about the people and their ability to give His love to as many as possible.

Now in addition to shorter response time, the Coffeys will cover an area from the Cliff Dwellings, down the Valley to the intersection of Routes 152 and 61. The ambulance will arrive fully stocked with defibrillators, resuscitation bags and even a state-of-the art heart monitor. They will be able to transmit data to the Gila Regional Emergency Services Hospital, have a doctor assess it, and advise whether a heart attack has occurred and get a helicopter in the air to the site right away.

Since Gila Regional is not a trauma hospital, it will also be possible to determine whether an emergency flight to a trauma center is needed – El Paso being the closest trauma center, although there are others in Tucson and Albuquerque. The ability to assess serious trauma situations (heart attacks, auto accidents, broken bones, shootings, serious burns, etc.) and avoid the airlift to Silver City, where such care is not available and then further airlift to a trauma center can be a serious life saver. to a trauma center is now available.

If air transport is needed, whatever the cause, there are numerous local landing sites, all of which have and can handle helicopter landings. The local ambulance can provide transport to these landing spots.

In addition to pursuing additional training and certification the Coffeys are still describing the situation as a work in progress. They cite other needs and concerns, of which the community should be aware. While they know virtually everyone in the Valley, finding specific addresses can be a problem. They urge everyone to make sure their house numbers are as large and visible as possible, and that street signs are in place. (The latter for the benefit of residents, not the County.) While they know most everyone, and where many people live, that knowledge is not always tied to a specific street address, which is how calls from dispatch are routed.

People who visit the restaurant and bakery have been overwhelmingly excited and interested in this new development. The Coffeys are thinking of ways to assemble a map or notebook or something of the sort where everyone's address is identified. When you stop by the restaurant, let them know if you have a suggestion.

One of the benefits of being such well-known and loved members of the community is the comfort they are able

to extend to people in need of ambulance services. Seeing a familiar, kind face makes things more comfortable for the patient, although sadder for them.

Residents of the valley have been enthusiastic and happy about the new ambulance service. Everyone at the restaurant and at the fire department is spreading the happy news. Elizabeth and Bethany are only two people, only the beginning of what needs to be a cadre of local volunteers. Despite the wonderful support they have received from their co-workers in town, they acknowledge that more local volunteers are needed.

They remind Valley residents that despite the fact that everyone knows them, when in need of an ambulance, call 911. They are in radio contact and need to be officially dispatched on calls. And realize, when you have heard the siren and seen flashing lights in the neighborhood, EMTs are bound by patient confidentiality. They cannot dispense information about who made the call, what their problem was or other specific information. They can only respond, "Yes, we were there" or "No we weren't there. Do not question them for details, because they are duty-bound not to disclose such information.

As most everyone knows, the Coffey family has been in the Valley since 1996 and has grown up here. The newest EMTs are grateful for more than their physical presence here. They acknowledge the support of their parents and neighbors, who provide backup when necessary, as the unsung heroes of their prodigious undertaking. There are so many folks behind them who have provided great support and assistance, family and co-workers always striving to do better, and inspiring them to do so, too. While they eschew the hype and notice provided by publicity, that is not what it is all about. They are just doing a badly needed job for the benefit of the community.





Mimbres Culture Heritage Site Celebrates Archaeology Day and Mimbres History

On October 14th visitors and Mimbres Valley residents celebrated the past by taking tours of the Mattocks Ruin, listening to stories about the history of the Gooch and Wood Territorial adobe houses, and watching the reenactment of the infamous shooting that occurred at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site (MCHS) in 1902.

Bill Hudson, volunteer at MCHS, gave tours of the Mattocks Ruin and "unveiled" new models of the pueblo rooms and the Great Kiva from the Mimbres Indian time period. Bill spent hundreds of hours creating the models which will soon be installed along the interpretive trail.



Re-enactors Michael Barragree, Harold Markel, and Peter Crum brought the past to life as spectators learned about Benjamin Gooch and others who once lived at MCHS. The day ended with old-tyme music played by the River's Bend Band.



All was great until the end of the day when a mini-tornado took out the shade tarp, tossed over tables, and made a mess of things. So we shut down a little early. But, thankfully, no one was hurt.

Thank you to all the volunteers that helped; Leigh and Harold worked hard during the take- down on Saturday; volunteers returned the "Treasure Chest", games and all else to the MVHAL storage container on Sunday.

Mimbres Valley Gets Historic Marker By Marilyn Markel

On October 10th the Mimbres Community celebrated the placement of a new official New Mexico Department of Transportation historic marker located on Highway 35

near the Senior Citizen's Center in the Mimbres Valley. School children from San Lorenzo Elementary joined local community

Prickly Pear

Two species of prickly pear are common in the Mimbres area—Purple-fruited and Engelmann. These cacti have showy yellow, pink or orange flowers. The red/purple fruit, called *tunas*, are



eaten fresh and also made into jellies, syrups, and even wine. The cactus leaves or pads, called *nopalitos*, are peeled and the pulp eaten fresh, boiled, fried, or stewed. Animals like javelina, coyotes, and foxes eat the fruit; some animals take bites out of the pads.





During the ceremony, Marilyn Markel, volunteer education at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site (MCHS), thanked Tom Drake of the State Historic Preservation Office in Santa Fe, Miguel Garcia, NM Department of Transportation, and Kathy Hill, President of the Imogen F. Wilson Education Foundation, the organization that manages MCHS, for their work in getting the text written, and the marker funded and put in place. After the students took turns cutting the red ribbon and removing the paper that was wrapped around the marker, 6th grader Kaissa Villegas read the text aloud, sharing the information with the little kids just learning to read. The marker highlights what Michael Koury, school principal, called the "Amazing and rich history of this Valley" when looking at the new sign. The students had fun pointing out all the familiar places on the "Points of Interest" map on the back side of the marker such as Lake Roberts and the Gila Cliff Dwellings. The students held up a "Mimbreños" sign they made with letters decorated like the world-famous painted pottery made by the Mimbres Indians who lived in the Valley about a thousand years ago. Those long-ago people and their pottery is featured on the marker, along with the Mattocks Ruin located at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. Everyone had fun celebrating the new marker and being a "Mimbreño"- we are all so lucky to live in such a beautiful place with a wonderful history and remarkable people, past and present!



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
