I'm Proud of My Service



Last year on the eleventh day, of the eleventh month, at the eleventh hour, I went to a parade to commemorate Veterans Day in downtown Watsonville, California. It was more of a march than a parade. The march was preceded by two police officers on motorcycles with flashing red lights and sirens blasting. Leading the procession was a company of naval cadets dressed in starch white uniforms, marching in step, on time and in a straight formation. Then came the veterans. Most were older men, in their sixties and seventies with white hair and gray

beards. There was a sprinkling of women veterans, mostly in their thirties and forties. They marched out of step and off cadence. Many were limping, coughing and stooped over. The majority of the veterans wore caps with the name of their military branch of service. There was a huge Latino man, over three hundred pounds, in his thirties, a Marine Vet laboring to march. He heavily perspired, soaking his blue shirt with sweat.

I felt a little sad. There were more veterans marching than people watching in the streets. The veterans marched in silence. When they passed, a middle-aged man yelled, "Thank you for your service!" and


started clapping. The meager crowd took up the chant: "Thank you for your service." They continued clapping. The procession of veterans stiffened their posture, smiled, turned to the crowd and repeated: "You're welcome. Thank you." The parade ended with a troop of young Boy Scouts carrying flags.



me if the event was free. I told her that it was a celebration for veterans and the public was invited. She gave me a whimsical smile and moved unsteadily into the main hall. She appeared to be homeless. She was dressed in a mud stained, weathered, camouflage green army jacket. Her face was sunburned. Her auburn colored hair was greasy and unkept. Wet leaves were stuck to her torn canvas backpack, as if she had slept outdoors. She limped badly.

> Five minutes later, the woman came out with a bottle of water under her arm and several cookies in each hand. She looked hungry. We made eye con-

You might consider buying additional software to improve memory and performance. We recommend: Cooking 3.0.



USE CAUTION WHEN WALKING OR HIKING AND WATCH YOUR SMALL ANIMALS

The pictures to the left of three mountain lions were captured with a field camera on October 20 between 8:10 pm and 8:17 pm at Tim Abreu's property on Acklin Hill Road near the Roundup Lodge, the elementary school and Casas Adobe on the other side of the highway. Mr. Abreu has lost two cats to mountain lions.

There have also been reports of a mountain lion on Ortiz Road in San Lorenzo in the past two weeks.

It is excting to see these pictures, but please be cautious when out on foot. Stumbling upon a mountain lion <u>is pretty rare</u>, but if you happen to do a lot of stuff outdoors, it is good to be prepared just in case. Here is what you should do if you encounter a mountain lion in the wild.

It might seem counter-intuitive, but resist the urge to run. Running can encourage the mountain lion to chase you, and they are faster than you. Once you have gained your composure, make yourself look as big as possible. Use jackets, gear, and motion to give the illusion that you are much larger than you actually are. While you are doing that, make as much loud noise as you can. Keep your eyes trained on the mountain lion so it knows you are not prey, and **slowly back away**. Hopefully, that is enough to let you get away. If it attacks you, use whatever you can to fight back. Do not play dead. The mountain lion will give up if you put up enough of a fight.

The Bayard Public Library has begun curbside pickup of all library items while the **library is Closed to the public.**

The curbside service system is designed with the goal of reducing the spread of the Coronavirus.

Checkout limits are 4 items per person, 10 per household; and appointments are spaced out in intervals in order to make the service safer.

Four steps for checkout:

- (1) Reserve items. Reserves can be placed by those holding membership cards by logging in to the library catalog at https://bayard.biblionix.com/catalog, by email bayardnmlibrary@gmail.com, or by phone, (575)537-6244. New memberships can be acquired via a phone call with a staff member.
- (2) Make an appointment. Call or email the library staff to choose an appointment time for your pick-up, Monday Friday, 9AM to 2PM.
- (3) Pick-Up. Library staff will have the reserves waiting at a clearly designated pick-up zone located at the front of the library. Just drop by and pick them up. If you miss your appointment time, the items will be held for 3 days: call back to reschedule.
- (4) Return. Return books to the big silver Return Bin located outside the front door of the Bayard Library. The items will be placed in quarantine and sanitized before becoming available for future check-outs.

The Bayard Public Library is located at 1112 Central Ave., Bayard, NM 88023. (575) 537-6244. The library is closed Saturday and Sunday.

THINGS THAT MIGHT BE OF INTEREST TO YOU DURING THE PANDEMIC

If you, or someone you know, is struggling to keep food on the table during the pandemic, there is some help right here in the valley. The Emergency Fund Assistance Program (TEFAP), also known as the Food Distribution Program or Commodities Assistance is available. Even if you have never qualified in the past, or you are currently unemployed or your income is under the limits (see chart below), you qualify. If your household receives SNAP/FDPIR/WIC/CSEP OR NSLP, you automatically qualify.

The third Wednesday of every month from about 11:00 am until the food is gone, boxes of food are distributed by volunteers at the Roundup Lodge on Acklin Hill Road. The November food distribution will be distributed on Wednesday, November 18th at the Roundup Lodge.

The Mimbres Valley Health Action League sponsors this program, and they are working very hard to purchase more and better food for the community in need.

A lot of people are not getting out much due to the pandemic and do not get to pick up a copy of the Messenger, so if you know of someone in need, please tell them to come by and sign up on the distribution day.

You do not even have to get out of your car to sign up or collect your box of food. Just get in line and wait in your car until one of the volunteers comes to your window. PLEASE wear your mask when speaking to a volunteer.

MVHAL wants everyone to have food during this crisis and to have a nice Thanksgiving dinner. Please come by if you need help.

On-line Christmas Tree Permit Sales begin November 16, 2020 on the Gila National Forest



How would you like to be able to purchase your Christmas tree permit from the comfort of your home? With on-line ordering there is no waiting in line or driving to your local Forest Service Office. The Forest Service is in the process of transitioning Christmas tree permit sales to an on-line process that will allow for these benefits.

On-line options will be available beginning on November 16, 2020 via Recreation.gov. The cutting period for Christmas trees is November 21 – December 24 at sundown. The on-line sales include the \$5.00 any species Christmas tree, the free permit for pinyon and the Every Kid Outdoors Christmas tree. All transactions will include a small fee for using the Recreation.gov website. Online Purchase of Gila National Forest Christmas Tree Permits starts November 16 at: www.recreation.gov/tree-permits/Gila It is important to carefully read the overview and need-to-know information on Recreation.gov prior to purchasing the permit online.

Visitors will also need to setup or login to a Recreation.gov account to complete the transaction. Please be aware there is a transaction fee in addition to the permit cost. Details about designated cutting areas and Every Kid Outdoor initiative will be located on the Recreation.gov site.

If you do not have the ability to acquire your permit online, you can still visit the local Forest Service office.

The Gila National Forest has implemented new safety procedures for permit sales at office locations during the COVID-19 pandemic. Debit and credit card payments are preferable or bring exact change, as often making change can be a challenge. The Forest offers the same options as on-line which are the \$5.00 any species Christmas Tree, free permit for pinyon, and the Every Kid Outdoors free Christmas Tree. The limit is one tree/household. There are no refunds on permits.

Public Surveys on the Gila National Forest

The public will encounter contract employees working on the Gila National Forest in developed and dispersed recreation sites and along Forest Service roads. They will be out in all types of weather conditions, wearing bright orange vests and be near a sign that says "Traffic Survey Ahead."

The National Visitor Use Monitoring (NVUM) survey, being conducted on the Gila National Forest, will begin in October 2020 and will go through Sept. 30, 2021. The information gathered is useful for forest planning as well as local community tourism planning. It provides national forest managers with an estimate of how many people actually recreate in the national forest, what activities they engage in, and how satisfied people were with their visit. Economic impact to the local economy is also captured in the survey.

The survey gathers basic visitor information. Surveys are voluntary and all responses are confidential -- names are not included. Interviews last about 10 minutes. Questions asked include: where you recreated in the forest, how many people traveled with you, how long you were in the forest, what other recreation sites you visited while in the forest, and how satisfied you are with the facilities and services provided. About a third of the visitors will be asked to complete a confidential survey on recreation spending during their trip.

"Although the survey is entirely voluntary, participation is extremely important so we can assess visitor experiences in the forest and strive to make it a better place to visit," said Eric La Price, Acting Forest Supervisor for the Gila National Forest. "We would appreciate it if visitors would pull over and answer a few questions. It's important for interviewers to talk with local people using the forest, as well as out-of-area visitors, so all types of visitors are represented in the study."

Asian Giant Hornet

The insects and arachnids that I've previously highlighted in the bug-of-the-month column are found in New Mexico, and in particular, the Mimbres Valley. This month I'll stray from that focus and discuss an insect that made a big splash in the news this past summer,

the Asian Giant Hornet. This wasp, often reported to be the largest wasp in the world at 2" in length, is about the same size as the Tarantula Hawk, which occurs commonly in the Valley and was the topic of this column last February. However, the Asian Giant Hornet is definitely the largest hornet in the world, with hornets being members of the genus *Vespa*'.

As their name would suggest, the native range of Asian Giant Hornets includes much of Asia, but they are most abun-

dant in the mountainous areas of Japan. One reason they made recent news was the discovery of Asian Giant Hornets in British Columbia and Washington State, first in 2019, and then with several additional detections in 2020. The discovery of an alien insect in the USA doesn't normally make for good press, considering that it's rather commonplace; an estimated 2,000 of the arthropods (insects, spiders and their relatives) in the continental USA were introduced. What makes Asian Giant Hornet a front-page item is its reputation as a killer.

Asian Giant Hornets kill a few people each year in Asia, although the exact number is difficult to determine. In Japan, 12-26 people are killed per year due to all bee and wasp stings, while in one region of China, 41 people were reportedly killed by the hornet in 2013. Much

like honeybees, the chance of a severe reaction or death due to the Asian Giant Hornet is a function of the number of stings. In one Chinese study, it was found that death resulted after an average of 59 stings. Perhaps surprising, the venom of honeybees is more poisonous than that of the

hornet, but the difference is in the amount injected. The Asian Giant Hornet can inject ten times more venom that a honeybee and they are capable of stinging multiple times, whereas bees can only sting once.

By far the most troublesome aspect of the invasion of Asian Giant Hornets into North America is their potential impact on honeybee colonies, which are already under serious threat from parasites, diseases, and insecticides. Groups of 30 or so hornets attack a hive, decapitating the de-

fending bees with their powerful jaws, stealing the brood, and then racing home to provision their young with tasty treats of honeybee larvae. Interestingly, the Asian honeybee has acquired an effective defensive strategy to counteract the hornet. The bees congregate in a ball around each hornet, which raises the temperature inside the ball, resulting in roast hornet. Unfortunately, our Western honeybees do not have similar defensive skills.

Finally, let's end with some good news. Scientists predict than Asian Giant Hornets are unlikely to find a suitable home in the southwest because of our climate - it's simply too hot and dry. The best prediction is that the hornets can permanently establish in the northwest, where they have been found, the southeastern USA, and perhaps further north along the Atlantic coast. Yet another good reason to remain in the land of enchantment!



Protect Yourself from Social Security Scams

Scammers are pretending to be government employees. Scammers will try to scare you and trick you into giving them your personal information and money. They may threaten you or your family and may demand immediate payment to avoid arrest or other legal action.

DON'T BE FOOLED! IF YOU RECEIVE A SUSPICIOUS CALL:

- 1. Hang up!
- 2. DO NOT give them money or personal information!
- 3. Report the scam at OIG.SSA.GOV!



What to look out for



The call or email says there is a problem with your Social Security Number or account.



Someone asking you to pay a fine or debt with retail gift cards, wire transfers, prepaid debit cards, internet currency, or by mailing cash.



Scammers pretend they're from Social Security or another government agency. Caller ID or documents sent by email may look official but they are not.



Callers threaten you with arrest or other legal action.

Social Security may call you in some situations but will never:

- · Threaten you
- · Suspend your Social Security Number
- · Demand immediate payment from you
- Require payment by cash, gift card, pre-paid debit card, or wire transfer
- Ask for gift card numbers over the phone or to wire or mail cash

Famous, Infamous, and Important People in the History of the Mimbres/Gila Country

- The Mimbres Indians lived in the Mimbres Valley and surrounding area and are world famous for the extraordinary painted pottery they left behind.
- Victorio, a Mimbres Apache, was a leader of the Red Paint People, a band of the Chiricahua Apaches of southwest New Mexico.
- Billy the Kid, the outlaw who grew up in Silver City, is thought to have had friends in the Mimbres Valley whom he visited.
- Geronimo, the Apache war leader, raided through the Mimbres Valley in the 1880s before being sent to Florida as a prisoner of war.
- Ben Lilly, a lion and bear hunter, lived in caves and at the GOS Ranch in the Sapillo Valley in the early 1900s.
- Adolf Bandelier, a pioneering archeologist, visited archaeological sites the Mimbres area in 1883-84, including the Mattocks Ruin.
- Teddy Roosevelt, known as the "conservationist president" to declared the Gila Cliff Dwellings a National Monument in 1907.
- Aldo Leopold, a conservationist and game manager, was one of the first forest rangers and is responsible for the designation of part of the Gila National Forest as the first Wilderness Area in the world. Thanks Aldo!

Keep in mind, behind all of these men were women who kept the home fires burning, raised the children, or supported the men in some way. For example, Ben Lilly, while living at the GOS Ranch had a large pack of hunting dogs. The wife of the ranch manager cooked for all those dogs, as well as feeding her family, the ranch hands, and Lilly.




