A Mimbres Hiker's Journal of Misadventures

I love hiking in the Mimbres Valley. It is world-class hiking. It compares well with trekking through the valleys and mountains of the Sierras, Rockies, and even the Andes. The views are awe inspiring. The variety and change of terrain are challenging. The wildlife is diverse, abundant, and at times hair-raising. Given the current requirement for social distancing, I've been spending lots of time outdoors hiking alone throughout the river valley, mountains and ancient ruins of the Mimbres. I come across very few people.

The large majority of my trekking through the Mimbres Valley is soothing, enlightening and rejuvenating. A handful of misadventures have left me exhausted with effects of post adrenaline rush, and assorted body aches and pains; but also, exhilarated and renewed. I'm averaging one misadventure per month. I'm due for another.

A couple of months ago, I was hiking around the Bear Canyon Lake Dam area. I was excited and inspired by the beautiful, natural setting of the lake. I parked above the lake and hiked down to the water's edge to cool my feet. There was no trail down, so I bushwhacked down the rocky, cacti covered hill. Halfway down, I stepped on some shell-rock material and pebbles. They gave way, and, as I tumbled backwards, I tried to recover by planting my left foot. I did not stick the landing. My foot slipped and twisted my knee, tweaking the joint. I fell and bounced on my behind as I yelled, "Ahhhhhh!" Echoing through the canyon could be heard a painful curse and cry, "My kneeeee!" The cool water did soothe my

aching leg, but not my bruised ego.

One evening, four weeks ago, hiking in the upper reaches of the Mimbres Valley, I was almost trampled by a hungry

looking squadron of a half-dozen smelly javelinas — big wild pig-like animals that look like overgrown gophers. The herd was led by a hairy, muscular gray-brown, alpha male, followed by suckling females, and numerous stinky little ones. I yelled and threw rocks. They came too close, before turning and dashing off in the other direction. The odds were not in my favor: 6 to 1!

Last week, hiking down Palomino Trail in the Mimbres, a tarantula the size of my hand tried to "throw down on

When I approached
the critter, it
stopped, turned towards me and raised
two front hairy,
black legs and claws
in a menacing warning. My only offense,
attempting to take a
photo of the enormous black, fuzzy
hair spider. Before it

could flick its stinging bristles at me, I snapped the photo and "high kicked" out of there. But, without warming up and sprinting on the uneven rocky ground, I again tweaked and reinjured my left knee: "Ouch!" Tarantula 1 — Mungo 0. I did get a photo. You judge, was it worth it?

Where to go on my next hiking (mis)adventure? I'm headed to the northern upper reaches of the Mimbres Valley,

where it joins the Gila wilderness to explore landscapes and wildlife. People tell me there are hungry bears in the region. To repel those bigger than me, furry mammals, does anyone have experience using bear spray? Does it really work?





Since 2006, the Mimbres Valley Health Action League has organized the Harvest Festival to celebrate community, encourage local agriculture, showcase locally grown food and handmade products, promote tourism to the Valley, and simply have a fun day for Valley residents and visitors alike.

Sadly, this year we had to make the difficult decision to cancel the Har-

vest Festival due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Instead, on October 3 from 10 AM until 2 PM, we will hold a Grand Finale of the Mimbres Valley Farmers' Market to celebrate the end of the growing season.

The Finale will be held in the parking lot of the Roundup Lodge and feature agricultural growers and their locally grown, nutritious produce. Precautions to avoid the spread of coronavirus will include mandatory wearing of masks and social distancing.

We very much hope that next year we will be able to once again hold a full-scale Harvest Festival with music, dancing, games, local arts and crafts and the many other activities included in previous years. EVERYONE COUNTS in New Mexico ~ the 2020 U.S. CENSUS

Why it is so important - especially for seniors

The U.S. Census is a decennial count of people living in the United States and is mandated by Article I, Section 2 of the United States Constitution. The first census after the American Revolution was taken in 1790, under Secretary of State, Thomas Jefferson. There have been 22 federal censuses since that time.

The 2020 Census is happening now until September 31, and it is important that everyone participate. The U.S. decennial census is critically important to our democracy for a number of reasons.

- It determines how many of the now 435 available seats (districts) each state is entitled to in the House of Representatives.
- The data from the census is used to distribute billions of federal funds for essential programs to local communities, including programs that assist older adults.
- The government will use 2020 Census statistics to help decide how to spend billions of dollars annually in federal funds on critical public services for the next 10 years.

New Mexico receives over \$7 billion each year through federal programs which benefit the entire community: health care, nutrition, highways, education, housing, jobs, and more that allocate funds on per a capita basis.

Everyone who is not counted and resides in New Mexico will mean less money and representation for the state. If New Mexico undercounts residents by **only 1%**, the state will loose \$780 million dollars per year for 10 years. Each New Mexican not counted equates to a loss of approximately \$3,745 per year for 10 years.

If you live in the United States, you are required by law to participate in the 2020 count.

Don't be afraid to get counted. It helps everyone. The 2020 Census is SAFE. The U.S. Census Bureau has a legal commitment to keep census responses confidential. The U.S. Census Bureau is required to protect your answers, and all employees take a lifetime oath to protect your information. It's against the law for them to publicly release your responses in any way that could identify you or your household.

The U.S. Census Bureau will NEVER share information with immigration enforcement agencies like Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), law enforcement agen-

cies like the county sheriff, local police, or the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), or allow this information to be used to determine eligibility for governmental benefits.

Here in Grant County, only 48.7% of residents have responded to date as compared to 50% back in 2010.

Thank you if you've responded to the census, but if you haven't: Our community needs you to get counted!

The easiest way to get counted is to go online to <u>2020census.gov</u> and fill out the on-line questionnaire. It takes about 10 minutes.

You can also fill out your paper questionnaire that you should have received in the mail.

Due to the coronavirus outbreak, all public locations for census taking are closed.

So if you do not have access to the internet or have not received a paper questionnaire, you can call the 2020 Census Assistance line at 1-844-330-2020.

Additionally, Belinda Jones of the El Refugio is offering to help walk anyone through the form. You can reach her at 575-538-2125 extension 17.

Again, to date only 48.7% of Grant County residents have responded, so please get counted today! That's 2020census.gov

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

Reminders while visiting the Gila National Forest:

While hiking be aware of your surroundings and carry bear spray.

Keep a clean camp. Keep your food and food-related items inside a closed, hard-sided vehicle or special bear-resistant container except when preparing or eating. Ice chests, coolers, boxes, cans, tents, and soft sided campers are not bear-resistant!

Change your clothes before going to bed—do not sleep in the clothes you cook in.

Store deodorants, toothpaste, soap, and lotions with food. Keeping these items in your tent may attract bears.

Keep your pet on a leash when visiting the forest. Pets can chase and harass wildlife, and could be harmed by predators.

TOBACCO AND TOMATO HORNWORMS

Did you head out to your garden one fine day this summer only to find that half of the leaves on your prized tomato plant were missing? If so, the likely culprit was either the tomato hornworm or tobacco hornworm. These two caterpillars look similar and cause the same type of damage. Both species are large and green with a projection (horn) at the posterior end. Tomato hornworm has eight 'V' shaped white marking on its sides whereas tobacco hornworm has 7 diagonal stripes. The horn of the tomato hornworm is black while the tobacco hornworm has a red horn. Both species feed on

plants in the family Solanaceae, which includes tomatoes, potatoes, peppers, tobacco and eggplants as well as several common weeds. So far, I've only seen the tobacco hornworm in the Mimbres Valley, so the rest of this article will focus on that species, although most of what I write applies to both hornworms.

Adult female hornworms, some-

times referred as tobacco hawkmoths or hummingbird moths, lay their small (about 1/16" in diameter) light green eggs on young leaves, often near the stem. The eggs hatch in 2-4 days, and the larvae begin feeding, passing through 5 larval stages (instars) in about 20 days, before they pupate. About 90% of the feeding of the tobacco hornworm occurs during the final larval stage which explains why they are usually quite large when found. The larvae can reach nearly 3" in length

when fully grown. Mature larvae migrate to the ground and pupate in the soil, and after about 20 days, an adult emerges. Adult tobacco hornworms have a wingspan of nearly 4", although when resting, the wings are folded over the body in a triangular shape. There are 6 yellow/orange spots on each side of the abdomen. Adults are nocturnal and feed on nectar from flowers. There are two generations per year, and they pass through the winter as pupae in the soil.

Tobacco hornworms have several defensive strategies. The most obvious is camouflage; their green coloration

blends well with the leaves of the plant on which they are feeding, making them extremely difficult to spot. The horn at the posterior end may also have a defensive purpose simply due to its menacing stinger-like appearance. But don't be afraid to pick one off your tomato plant, the projection is nothing but a Potemkin village — all for show. When disturbed, the

larvae often regurgitate, which is also a likely defensive strategy. I've read that if you happen to get hornworm puke in your eye (hard to imagine how that would happen), it can be very painful. Research has shown that when tobacco hornworms feed on tobacco, they utilize the plant's nicotine to deter predators. The nicotine, released through the caterpillars breathing system, was shown to ward off spiders – talk about bad breath!

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

Governor announces revised emergency public health order

Pursuant to the state's sustained progress on suppressing the **spread of the virus** in recent weeks, New Mexico will permit certain relaxations of occupancy restrictions while maintaining the essential public health framework for mitigating and responding to the incidence and spread of COVID-19.

The state's **revised emergency public health order** is effective Saturday, Aug. 29 and incorporates the following adjustments:

- Houses of worship may operate at 40 percent of maximum occupancy of any enclosed building, an increase from 25 percent, in accordance with COVID-Safe Practices. Houses of worship may, as before, conduct services outdoors or provide services through audiovisual means.
- Food and drink establishments (including restaurants, breweries, wineries, distillers, cafes, coffee shops or other similar establishments) may provide indoor dining service at 25 percent

- of maximum occupancy, in accordance with COVID-Safe Practices.
- ◆ Food and drink establishments may continue to provide physically-distant outdoor dining options, carryout and delivery services, in accordance with COVID-Safe Practices. Tables inside or outside must be spaced at least six feet apart, and no more than six patrons are permitted at a single table.
- While museums with interactive and/or immersive displays, categorized as "close-contact recreational facilities," must remain closed, museums with static displays may operate at 25 percent capacity.
- Mass gatherings of more than 10 individuals are prohibited.

The **order** is effective through Sept. 18.



TRAIL TO THE PAST

PLEASE PROTECT THE REMINDERS OF THE PAST

Trails can go anywhere—even into the past! This one will take you back over several hundred years, to a time when today's Gila Wilderness wasn't a wilderness at all—at least not to the people who lived here.

Known today as the Mogollon they found everything they needed along the rivers, in the canyons and on the mesas of this area in-

cluding food, clothing and shelter. They built many small communities, including cliff dwellings now preserved in the nearby Gila Cliff Dwellings National Monument. You will find other reminders of the Mogollon along this 1/4 mile trail, a leisurely, 15 minute walk. On the trail to your right you will see rock paintings and an outdoor work area; to your left, you will ascend a narrow canyon to visit a small cliff dwelling.

TAKE YOUR TIME AND DISCOVER THE PAST!

The Trail to the Past at the Lower Scorpion Campground, near the Gila Cliff Dwellings, is often missed by visitors on their way to the Dwellings themselves. This trail leads to a small Mogollon Indian dwelling that is a short hike up a small canyon, and to a rock art site featuring pictographs-- images painted hundreds, maybe thousands, of years ago.

Interpretive signs ask visitors to "Take your time and discover the past!" and to "Protect these reminders of the past."

Both the Mogollon dwelling and the pictographs provide visitors the opportunity to walk back in time and enjoy a glimpse into the lives of the people who once made their homes along the West Fork of the Gila River.

The Indians grew crops, hunted animals like rabbits and deer, gathered food and other resources, and painted images on rocks. Why did the people paint these designs? Do they tell a story? Mark a trail? Were they for a religious ceremony? We can only wonder. The rock art was important to those ancient people, as it is to us today. It is a part of our cultural heritage, to admire, enjoy, and protect.

The Gila Cliff Dwellings National Monument and the Lower Scorpion Campground are

open. Please call the Cliff Dwellings (575-536-9461) for information and restrictions due to Covid 19.




Trail to the Past pictograph


