Celebrate the Harvest at the Festival's Farmers Market

Celebrate the harvest season and take home some of the agricultural bounty of Grant County and our valley at the 13th Annual Mimbres Valley Harvest Festival on Saturday, September 29 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the San Lorenzo School.

This year the agricultural abundance from this river valley, where food has been raised for 2,000 years, will include lots of apples from historic orchards. Farmers and orchardists from up and down the river will bring their special varieties of apples (old fashioned Red Delicious, Golden Delicious, Jonathan, Winesap, Fuji and more) as well as delicious frozen apple cider. Apples galore to dehydrate for a healthy sweet snack and to make apple butter.

Choose pumpkins for carving as well as sugar pie pumpkins for pies, butternut and spaghetti winter squash or "exotic" long-necked Tahitian and Long Island Cheese varieties, hot and sweet peppers, sweet onions, tomatoes, raspberries, raspberry jam, honey, sweet corn, pinto beans and pecans. A local rancher will offer her "lean and clean", grass-fed beef as well as fermented foods such as sauerkraut, goat's milk and feta cheese. Try some lip balm made from beeswax.

Bring a cooler to take home these locally raised foods and support local food producers.

Want to raise bees for your own honey supply? Catch local beekeeper Susan Clair's informative talk at the harvest festival on beekeeping. Find out what you can do to support the life of bees as vital agricultural pollinators.

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

The big news this month is the upcoming 13th Annual Harvest Festival on September 29th. Browse through descriptions in this issue of the many events and points of interest to be found at this year's Festival to plan your visit and make sure not to miss any of the attractions.

In addition to hot, dry days, August brought a plentiful amount of afternoon rains – albeit none evenly or regularly distributed throughout the Valley. Despite some of the inconveniences caused by the thunderstorms (lightning strike disabling the cell tower, individual strikes wreaking havoc at personal residences, mud, mudholes, and more mud) how many times have you heard the remark: "I don't care, I just love the rain?" In a departure from my regular complaints about WEEDS, I will refrain from restating the obvious. Everything that grows has benefitted from the moisture.

I have noticed an interesting phenomenon with the frequency of afternoon showers. After a late start, the hummingbirds began showing up en masse fortuitously just before the Hummingbird Festival, which was a marvelous and successful event. Throughout August, they have continued to arrive in ever-increasing numbers. Anyone who has observed activity at a hummingbird feeder will recognize the hordes of hungry fliers that often appear. Traffic is particularly heavy when sounds of thunder precede showers, or when clouds cover the sun for any extended period during the day. It appears that the word goes out among the flocks that it is time to tank up, because rain is on the way. And they do.

We have three active feeders, which we refill a minimum of twice daily, and sometimes a third time. On numerous occasions, we have counted (and photographed) between 14 to 20 birds swarming a single feeder, which has eight feeding stations! They cluster around the rim, not always patiently, awaiting their turn to displace their fellow seekers to sip. Usually, the frenzy abates after rain begins. Some-

times, though when the rain starts, the really tenacious ones stay at and around the two feeders which are somewhat protected by the overhanging roofline. At this point, traffic seems to abate enough that individuals can sit and sip in relative peace. But even in the rain, fliers often brave the rain to come in from the protective tree where they nest.

These amazing creatures are an unending source of joy and up-close appreciation of the natural world. A friend recently suggested that perhaps we should apply for a non-profit status grant to subsidize the enormous sugar bills! Another opined that in his area (northeast shore) they have no hummingbirds, but do have a lot of crazy cuckoos. Our friends are as varied as the types of hummers we get to enjoy.

4th Annual Horseshoe Tournament

The fourth annual Harvest Festival will all about the game of "shoes", and a community meeting people and having a

good time. It will be a "double team elimination", with a drawing for partners. Sign up for the tournament between 11 and 12 o'clock. The court will be open for practice or trying out one's skill until the tournament begins at noon. Tournament prizes are donated by local merchants. All money raised from tournament fees will go to MVHAL community programs. This will be a low-key, fun event that will stay with you until the Fifth Annual Harvest Festival Tournament happens next year. Come join the fun at this all-American sport.

Horseshoes – A History of the Game—thought to have evolved from the ancient Greek sport of discus throwing, where a discus was thrown toward a stake. Many poor folks could not afford a discus, so they used cast-off horseshoes instead. Those horseshoes were actually round with a hole in the middle. This practice evolved into a game called "quoits" which uses a 4-pound iron ring in a manner similar to horseshoes. Quoits spawned the game of horseshoes.

Horseshoes in the United States probably originated with the early English settlers. Modern horseshoes might well be called "muleshoes" because it was practiced by Union soldiers during the American Civil War who played the game with discarded mule shoes.

In 1910 the first world championship of horseshoe pitching took place in Bronson, Kansas. The first organization of horseshoe pitchers was also in Kansas in 1914, making that state the home of American Horseshoe Pitching. Standards were set regulating the size and weight of horseshoes (2 pounds to 2 pounds 2 ounces). The stake was ordered to be 8 inches from the ground.



JENGA - Jenga is a game of physical skill, manual dexterity, eye-hand coordination, precision and strategy. Players take turns removing one block at a time from a tower constructed of 54 blocks. Each block removed is then placed on top of the tower, creating a progressively taller and more unstable structure. The name *jenga* is derived from *kujenga*, a Swahili word which means "to build".

Pecos Archaeology Conference



Held annually at a site in the Southwest, the Pecos Archaeology Conference started as an informal gathering of archaeologists doing field work in the region, the first conference was held in 1927 at Pecos National Monument near Santa Fe. Alfred V. Kidder of Harvard (the Peabody Museum)

excavated Pecos Pueblo from 1915 to 1927 and invited other archaeologists to Pecos to share ideas and information about pottery, and archaeology methods. About fifty archaeologists attended the conference including Burt and Hattie Cosgrove. The Cosgroves, from Silver City, excavated Mimbres Sites in Arenas Valley in the early 1900s and at sites along the Mimbres River in the 1920s. They worked at the Swartz Ruin

under the auspices of the Peabody Museum, adding greatly to what was known about the long-ago Mimbres Indians.

In August 2018, the gathering was held near Flagstaff Arizona on the Coconino Forest, continuing an enduring tradition in which avocational and professional archaeologists camp out, meet old friends and make new ones. Archaeologists presented the results of current research, shared new information and discussed the issues of today, including how best to preserve and protect America's amazing cultural heritage. They also bestow awards to the best in the field. See below!

In August of 2019 the Pecos Conference returns to New Mexico and is scheduled to be held on the Lincoln Forest near Cloud-croft. Anyone interested in archaeology can attend.

Marilyn Markel Receives Lifetime Achievement Award in Archaeology

As summarized from the Arizona Archaeological and Historical Society Newsletter, the Glyphs

During the Pecos Archaeology Conference held near Flagstaff Arizona in August, Mimbres resident Marilyn Markel was the recipient of the Arizona Archaeological and Historical Society's Lex Lindsay "Unsung Hero" Award. Marilyn, a native New Mexican and a graduate of the University of New Mexico, has long had an interest in the history and archaeology of the Southwest.

She has had a career as an educator and teaches archaeology at Aldo Leopold Charter School in Silver City as part of the Youth Conservation Corps program. She has worked on excavations, survey projects, and interpretive projects at numerous archaeological sites in New Mexico and Arizona including many Mimbres sites. She has worked with the Gila National Forest, the Museum of New Mexico, the National Park Service, the WNMU Museum, and others. For the past 13 summers, Marilyn has worked with the University of Nevada Las Vegas field schools on Mimbres area excavations, including work at the Harris site, and Stewart and Elk Ridge Pueblos. She is the Southwest Chapter Coordinator for the New Mexico SiteWatch site steward program, past president of the Grant County Archaeological Society (GCAS), and Education Coordinator at the Mimbres Culture Heritage Site. Marilyn has been the driving

force in turning GCAS into an active, well-respected archaeological society that emphasizes site stewardship and education and was highly involved in the development of the Mimbres Cultural Heritage Site, with the Mattocks Ruin, into a respected educational center. Her efforts in southwestern New Mexico over the past two decades have made major contributions to understanding the past. *Congratulations Marilyn!*



What is Wilderness?

Wilderness Areas are places where nature comes first, where animals have their homes and people are just visitors, places where you can see nature rather than any signs of human activity; no roads, no vehicles, and visitors can step back in time and enjoy the sights and sounds of nature.

Aldo Leopold worked for the Forest Service in the Southwest from 1909- 1924. He was responsible for land in the Gila National Forest being set aside as "wilderness." Leopold said, "I am interested in preserving wilderness for wildlife, but I'm also understanding the importance of wilderness for humans. I think it is important for future

generations to have opportunities to experience wild lands just as the early pioneers did."

The Gila Wilderness became the first designated wilderness anywhere. The Gila has three wilderness areas: The Gila Wilderness, the Aldo Leopold Wilderness and the Blue Range Wilderness Areas.

And most importantly, wilderness areas help protect the starting places of the rivers and streams which are extremely important to the land, the animals, and all of us.
